Most Dixie Officials Deplore Ike's Action

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Most Southern officials here deplored the action of President Eisenhower in sending federal troops to Little Rock to enforce school integration...

Gov. Earl Warren of California, who returned yesterday to Little Rock from Sea Island, said state authority would have settled the integration problem in the Arkansas capital without violence if the President had left "law and order" to us.

Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) termed the action illegal and accused the President of slapping totalitarian rule on the people of Arkansas.

Sen. Olin Johnston (D-SC) talked of armed resistance. "If I were governor and he (the President) came in, I'd give him a fight such as he has never been in before."

Gov. Frank Clement of Tennessee proposed a committee of seven governors from the conference to confer immediately with Eisenhower to seek a solution to the school problem without recourse to federal troops.

Gov. Luther Hodges of North Carolina, conference chairman, proposed a compromise under which the President would not use federal force "so long as state and local authorities are able properly to perform this function."

Gov. Marvin Griffin of Georgia and James Folsom of Alabama charged that Eisenhower "is a captive of the Republican political strategists, who are more interested in the minority Negro vote than the welfare of the people."

Folsom saw the move as reflecting a desire by the President to take over the National Guard and run it from the capital.

Rep. Bob Sikes (D-Fla.) said Folsom should close the schools "in protest at this invasion of States' Rights."

Gov. Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut and Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.) agreed that the President did the right thing.
