**Little Rock Is America**  
How fortunate it is that when serious crises in Little Rock there are some comfortable assumptions to make and handy villains to label.  
The comfortable assumption most of us run it in our thinking and feeling is that what is done in Little Rock does not represent America, but only the violence of a discredited minority.  
The heavy chain is Governor Faubus, that slippery, double-tongued demagogue.  
We describe the Little Rock situation as one in which a military mob and a villain of a governor are playing ball together, and then we are free to make judgments upon it, as though we ourselves were safely outside it.  
We call the mob "poodle white trash." We dissect Faubus and prove that he is an ugly, dangerous breed of rabble rouser.  
Having done this, we bring ourselves to the hopeful theory that something we call the decency of ordinary people in Little Rock and Arkansas, will come to the rescue.  
Perhaps it will. But, if we can manage to be realistic, we begin to prepare ourselves for a more unpleasant appraisal of the situation.  
This is that the people of Little Rock, and the people of Arkansas, support Governor Faubus and sympathize with the feelings of the mob, even if they do not approve its methods.  
To be realistic, we must expect that if Governor Faubus goes to his legislature for steps which will cancel out integration at Central High School completely, by sending his assistance as a public school, then the legislature will support him, and do so overwhelmingly.  
When and if that happens, it is very likely to happen, the unrealistic part of us will beat another retreat. We will say, then, that this is Arkansas, which is something something of a special case. We will still insist, although from a somewhat diminished assurance, that this is not America, and these people are all there is of the American people.  
We will have to keep feeling that way, to keep reaching for hope and self respect. We have to believe in our own capacity to surmount this crisis, because if we do not recognize it, then it will conquer us.  
But there is one fatal flaw in all this desperate optimism. It encourages us to look for the answer in Little Rock and Arkansas when we should also properly look for the answer in ourselves. The answer from Little Rock and Arkansas is likely to be the same answer that would be given if we were in Little Rock, and if we ourselves were giving that answer.  
The people of Arkansas are not a strange and different breed of people. They are, more likely, exactly what we would be if we were brought in Arkansas. And the editor who put their newspapers on the side of the President's action has, in Little Rock, regardless of the sympathies they could profess among their own readers, regardless of their own qualms regarding the use of federal troops in any part of the South on a racial issue.  
The number of those who did this has been surprising, even though there were still enough publishers and editors whose stand was automatically that of Governor Faubus.  
And it was not easy, we can be sure, for any of them. The Arkansas Gazette, in Little Rock itself, had already been threatened with boycott. And when any newspaper goes counter to the opinion and prejudices which are deep-seated in the hearts of its readers, it is likely to be more abused than praised.
