Sheinwold on Bridge

PICKING THE RIGHT TIME FOR A HOLD-UP PLAY By Alfred Sheinwold South made an educated guess in today's hand. He knew just enough to be defeated.

West captured the five of spades. East put up the queen, and South unwisely refused the trick. This hold-up play with two stoppers in the enemy's suit is often a very fine idea. What you must often refuse the first trick rather than a later trick. This just didn't happen to be the right time.

East counted his own points. He had 13 to 15 points for his credit for 15 to 18 points for his jump to two no-trump. Since there are only 40 points in the entire deck, it was clear that West had a really ghastly hand. East had to rely on his own hand to defeat the contract.

East Defeats Game—East shifted to the queen of clubs and managed to get two clubs and one trick in each of the other suits. This was enough to defeat the game.

South should win the very first trick and lead a low heart at once. If dummy's queen should hold, South can go after the diamonds to make sure of nine tricks.

As the cards lie, East would win the first heart trick with the ace. If East now shifts to clubs, he has nine easy tricks. If East, instead, leads a second spade, South must hold up. This is the right time for the hold-up play. Now neither black suit can be developed and run, and South is safe.

Lease Election Query Drafted

The final wording of the town referendum on the Country Club issue has been completed, Town Clerk Edward Tomkiel said today.

The question upon which voters will decide in the Oct. 22 vote is: "Shall the town of Manchester adopt an ordinance entitled, 'An ordinance for the lease of land to the Manchester Country Club, Inc.'?"

According to Tomkiel, a vote "yes" is a vote in favor of the ordinance already passed by the Board of Directors. He said that a vote "no" means that the Board will have to come up with either a new lease or a new plan of disposition for the Globe Hollow land now occupied by the Country Club.

The voting will take place at the following places:

District 1, East Side Recreation Center; District 2, West Side Recreation Center; District 3, Waddell School; and District 4, the Community Y.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Tomkiel said that so far, the country Club issue was the only matter to be decided at that time, but that other questions could be put on the ballot before Oct. 22.

Polish Students Return to Class

Warsaw, Oct. 9 (AP)—Students trooped back to Warsaw Polytechnic School today for the first time since their demonstrations last week against censorship and police methods.

Rector Wladyslaw Araszkiewicz told them they must maintain absolute quiet in the school and their hostels.

Warsaw was quiet last night. It was the first night free of clashes between demonstrators and police since last Thursday.

However, unrest was reported among students at Wroclaw, former German city of Breslau. The youth newspaper Biuletyn Mlodziezki said the university faculty had to call a meeting to head off a strike of students disturbed by rumors that their scholarships would be cut.

Prosecuting authorities continued investigation of arrests made during the demonstrations and the riot which followed.

Trials are expected to start by the weekend. It was reported the majority would be charged under a section of the legal code providing sentences of from six months to five years.

Judge Smith denied a motion to dismiss an indictment which charges Miller with taking part in a scheme to sell an advertisement to a New York organization by telephone.

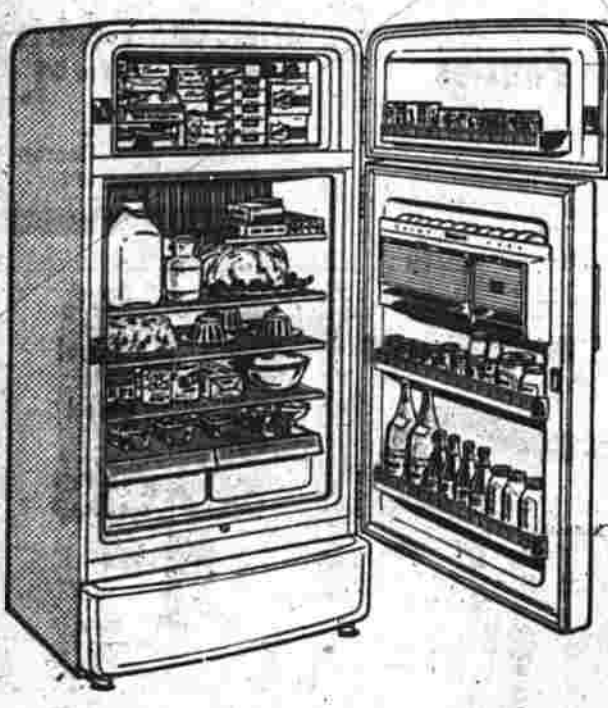

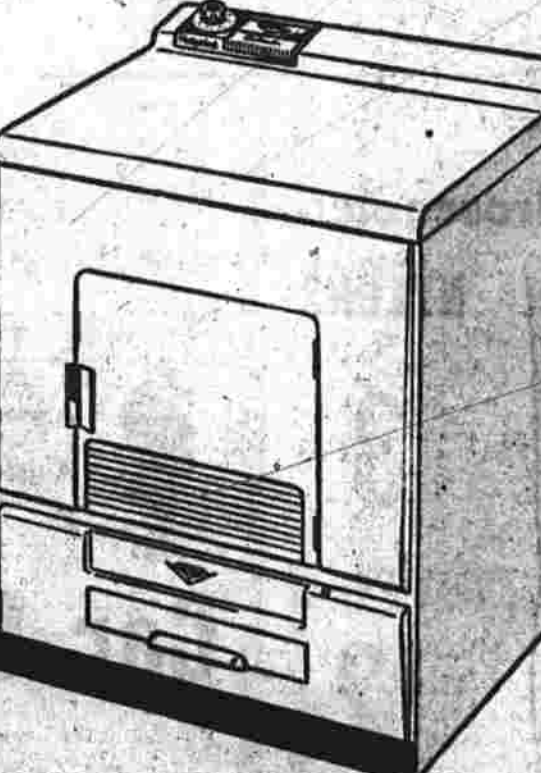

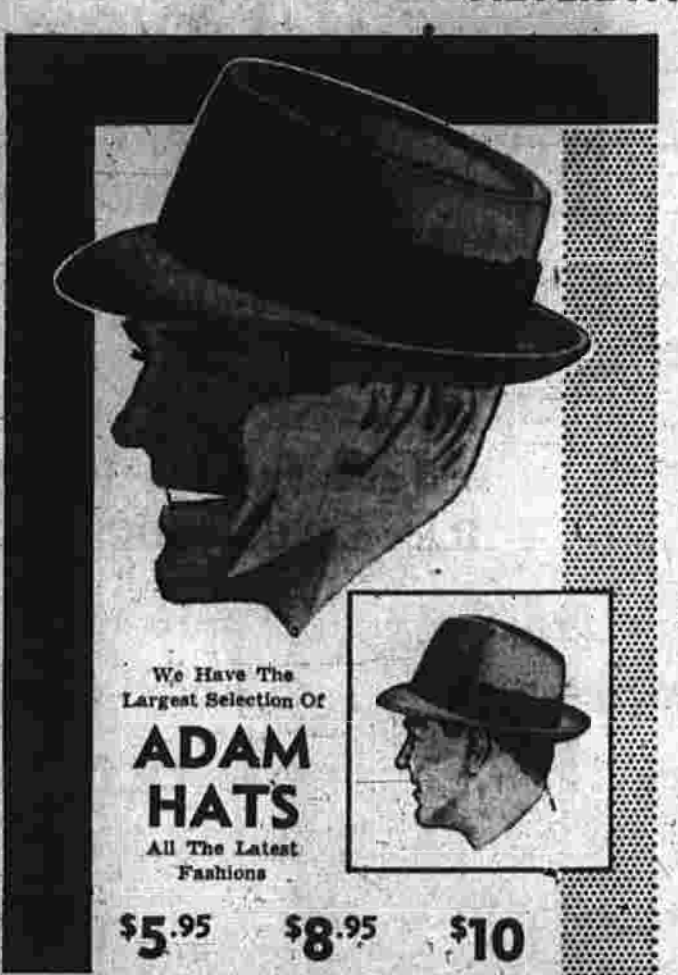

Will "Strength" Negotiate?
 The recent series of Soviet scientific achievements—most notably, the launching of the first man-made satellite—has raised the question as to what effect these achievements will have on future relations between Russia and the West, particularly the United States.
 Ever since the Baruch Plan for the control of nuclear energy was rejected by the Russians in the United Nations right after the war, the United States has hovered in the policy line of dealing with Russia only from a position of strength.
 First, this strength was represented by the atom bomb, which, in what now seems the very long ago, we once held the exclusive patent. Then, the hydrogen bomb was added to our arsenal of strength. And always, there were the American air bases circling the Soviet Union.
 But in spite of this strength—perhaps because of it—the past few years have seen a decrease rather than an increase in the number of unresolved and potentially explosive conflicts existing between West and East.
 The Russians, naturally enough, instead of accepting Western strength as an insurmountable fact of life, began taking mighty strides in an effort to catch up with and, if possible, exceed the development of weapons of mass destruction.
 They developed their own atom and hydrogen bombs and planes capable of delivering them. Then this year they announced they had produced and fired the latest in "ultimate" weapons—the intercontinental ballistic missile—something the United States has not yet been able to do. And as if this weren't enough, they have now beaten the United States into space with an earth satellite.
 Surely, this dramatic demonstration of Soviet brains, energy, resources and technological skills should remove any inferiority complex the Russians might have had with regard to Western military might. Surely, the Russians should now have the self-confidence necessary to deal with the West on a rational basis. They must realize, too, that for all their awesome power, they could not escape colossal damage in a nuclear war with the West. Nikita Khrushchev acknowledged as much in his interview with the New York Times this week.
 However, the question remains as to whether Soviet technological advances, which have won worldwide respect for Soviet science, will have a salutary effect on Russian foreign policies, or whether Russia now will decide the time has come for it to deal with the West "from a position of strength."
 And the corollary to this question is this: Will the West, particularly the United States, accept the fact of Russian scientific and military might and negotiate from there, or will it insist first on chasing another position-of-strength shadow?
 Many of the initial reactions in and out of Congress to news of the Russian satellite would seem to indicate that the second avenue will be followed. These reactions indicate that this country has been badly shaken by Soviet advances and that the United States might now still in negotiations until those advances are at least matched in our laboratories and on our firing ranges.
 If the Russian successes have shattered American complacency about American "know-how" being superior to anyone else's that is all to the good. But it is to be hoped that the state of near-paranoia exhibited in some quarters since the satellite was launched will be realized that the United States can and will match the Russians in the missile-satellite

Flu Hits Hundreds Of School Children

Hartford, Oct. 9 (AP)—Hundreds of Connecticut school children stayed home today as the rash of flu outbreaks increased in the state.

The flu spread through schools in Ansonia, Bridgeport, New Haven, Naugatuck and Stamford. At the same time, the state health department moved to pinpoint the spread of the Asian flu epidemic in Connecticut.

Only in Naugatuck had the flu been reported beyond the school, Dr. Robert H. Curran, the borough health officer, said an epidemic of almost 2,000 Asian flu cases had hit there. 800 of them were reported in the last week.

Dr. Curran said the number of flu cases for this time of year was "a very sharp increase" over past years.

Dr. Stanley H. Osborn, state health commissioner, sent letters to 140 local health directors asking them to report flu reports on a day-by-day basis, giving classification of cases.

This is a departure from the routine of reporting such communicable disease cases by name, age and address. Osborn said this would be impractical in many communities because of the number of cases.

Ironically, the health department issued its weekly report on flu cases for last week.

With the streamlined system and the flu onslaught, it was apparent that the score will go up sharply in next week's reports.

A sampling around the state showed the following:

Ansonia—Public schools reported a 20 per cent absentee record. Afternoon sessions were called off at elementary schools, but present plans call for schools to re-open tomorrow.

Bridgeport—Of 21,000 students, 2,000 were absent from the public schools, an increase of 1,300 over normal and of 800 over yesterday.

Naugatuck—2,000 persons ill, including 600 school children.

New Haven—Almost half the 1,500-pupil student body at Wilbur Cross high school was absent.

Stamford—24 per cent of all students absent. City health officer Dr. James J. Costanzo says it is a definitely dangerous Asian flu, but hundreds of cases of uncertain variety.

There were fewer cases in Hartford and Waterbury. Some 30

Two of Trio in Stolen Car Returned to Massachusetts

Two of the three youths caught here yesterday afternoon after escaping from a stolen car in Manchester, Mass., have returned to Massachusetts with their parents. The third youth is being held in the local jail awaiting the arrival of his state police, expected today to bring him back to that state.

Alfred H. Sparichino, 17, and Richard Irwin, 16, both of Cambridge, Mass., appeared before Judge Wesley C. Cook in Town Court yesterday where charges brought against them by local police, as a matter of formality, were "nolled." Sparichino was charged with reckless driving and failure to obtain an operator's license and Irwin was charged with breach of the peace. Both youths waived extradition, opening the way for their voluntary return to Massachusetts.

Sparichino Held

Irwin, still a juvenile under Massachusetts law, and the third youth, aged 15, went back to Massachusetts with their parents who came here and got them today. Sparichino will be brought back by Massachusetts authorities. The 15-year-old boy, also from Cambridge, did not appear in court, but was handed over to local juvenile authorities for detention pending the arrival of his parents. Local police said that two of the boys were on probation from Massachusetts juvenile authorities.

In Massachusetts, Sparichino will face a charge of auto theft. Whether the other two who were with him in the car, will be charged with auto theft or just violation of probation is not yet known.

About one o'clock yesterday afternoon, State Policeman Richard Bellows and his partner, noticed the three youths driving the new model car on Rt. 15, becoming suspicious he began following them, whereupon they turned off the highway and sped away. At the Manchester Green, in front of Manchester Mills, the car was a stolen one. The vehicle the boys had been driving belonged to Maurice Leonard of Brookline, Mass. It had been reported stolen the night before by Massachusetts police but Connecticut police had it in their possession. Sparichino, Irwin and Schwanz were not aware of the car's status until after the crash. Sgt. George Dent, who had been driving his cruiser in the area, found Schwanz in the front seat

Police May Alter Dress Next Month

Regular members of the Manchester Police Department may have a "new look" by Nov. 1.

According to Police Chief Herman O. Schendel, the appearance of the local officers' uniform may undergo a change by then. He said, however, that the contemplated alterations would be made on the existing uniforms and that new uniforms would not be purchased.

During the past few days, Schendel has been working on "new look" ideas brought to him by several members of the department.

Although nothing is as yet definite, the change will be in the form of a royal blue stripe on the policeman's trousers and the introduction of a shoulder patch, royal blue with gold lettering. This patch will include the word "Manchester" above a state seal. "Police" will be written in gold letters on the collar.

The chief is also contemplating putting gold service stripes on the policeman's jacket sleeve and gold piping around the pocket flaps.

"With several new men joining the force at Nov. 1, that date is as good as set to introduce a uniform change, Schendel said.

Temporary Stay Bid Dropped in Globe Suit

The request for a temporary injunction against the town and against Danah and Trebal, the plaintiffs dropped in view of the Oct. 22 referendum on the ordinance leasing the land to the Country Club. A hearing on the injunction request was to have been held in Hartford in County Superior Court tomorrow.

Town Counsel Charles Crockett, in reporting on the temporary injunction request, said today that the remainder of the suit brought on by the lease ordinance is being held over until the referendum is held. He said that the referendum would be held on Oct. 22.

Challenge Constitutionality

This hearing will involve requests for a permanent injunction barring the town from leasing or leasing to the Country Club or anyone else any of the 1,000-acre Globe Hollow tract and for a declaratory judgment that the special act permitting the sale or lease of the land is unconstitutional.

The action was brought by former Town Director Helen Pitts and by two other local residents, Franklin H. S. Parker of McKean Dr. and Rudolph P. Carron, of 53 Walker St.

The Country Club's General Manager Richard Martin and the members of the Board of Directors of the Country Club, including George Danah, of 12 Bruce Rd., and John A. Trebal, of 20 Bruce Rd., about a half acre of Globe Hollow land was sold to Danah and Trebal by ordinance in June.

Agro Hearing Postponed

Crockett said the parties involved in the suit agreed that there was no point in going ahead with the hearing tomorrow on the request for a temporary injunction. If the voters override the lease ordinance in the Oct. 22 referendum, many of the cases involved in that request will be rendered futile, he said.

He added that it was felt advisable just to go ahead with the hearing the permanent injunction. There's no sense in arguing the merits of the case twice," he said.

Crockett said no date has been set yet for the hearing on the request for a permanent injunction. He expects the date to be fixed in about a week.

He also said the case is "privileged" and is sure of getting on the court docket in November.

In the meantime, Crockett and the other attorneys involved will sign a stipulation that the agreement that married persons in Canada have a greater life expectancy than single ones.
