The Tolland County Medical Society last night rejected a plan for a polio clinic proposed by the Junier Chamber of Commerce.

In a statement released today by Dr. Roy C. Ferguson the Society says it feels a clinic is not necessary in this area, and based its stand on the following points:

"1. Free polio vaccine is avallable for all persons under 20 years of age. 2. The charge for polio inculations is for the physician's service and not for the vaccine, and 3. Any persons who cannot afford to pay for the service can obtain golio injections from their family physician free of charge."

The doctors state that it is urgent that all persons up to 40 years of age receive the polio vaccine.

Darling's Handmade Ship Models On Display in Vermont Museum

From time to time, a good many people get the idea of building a ship model. A look at the detailed plans, the fittings, and rigging is usually enough to discourage them. dea continued to fascinate him and so he built a ship model, and another, and another. In fact, over a dozen of his handmade ship models are in the St. Johnsbury.

t., Museum.
Leonard Darling, 8 Waddell
Rd. is a carpenter by trade, but
his spare time is devoted to the ainstaking hobby of building de-isled models. Since he started his obby in 1828, he has built models address of the country's major sailing and steam ships and models of cars, trains and planes.

His tools consist of a jackknife, His tools consist of a jackknife, a razor blade and a small dentiat's drill. The results are worthy of exhibition in museums.

Among some of the ship models he has built are the Great Republic, one of the fastest of the clippers, the U.S.S. Constitution, "Old Ironsides," the U.S.S. Hartford, Farragut's flagship, and the formous H.M.S. Bounty.

Works from Plans

Darling, who has lived in Manchester since 1942, said that he
started building his models when
Popular Science Magazine began
running detailed plans. Working
from the plans only, and not from
pre-cut kits, he builds his models
on a scale of one-eighth of an
inch.

His ship models are constructed from the bottom up, in almost the same order that they would be built in a shipyard. Darling builds the hulls first, then the deck and fittings, then the masts and, last, the rigging.

Working in pine, he laminates the hulls, shapes them, fits and finishes the deck and then paints the superstructure. The masts are made of birch and pine and are fitted and assembled next. The last steps are the blocks and rigging. These tiny blocks and 'deadeyes,' (devices used to tighten rigging) are all carved by



"Redeyes," (devices used to tighten rigging) are all carved by hand from blrch, with the sid of a destint's drill. The rigging is of linen thread.

A complete model of a fully rigged ship takes about two years of part-time work. Darling says they cost very little to build because they are made from scrap lumber. But that when finished they can be worth up to \$500.
