**Mobile Hospital Treats Sick Pets**

The Irish Blue Cross Society operates a mobile dispensary for sick animals to fill a gap in a society that wants to keep pets but cannot afford the fees of a veterinary surgeon to treat their malady.

### The Doctor Says

Mumps Virus Appears to Spread with Great Ease

Mumps is probably the most highly contagious of the so-called childhood diseases. It is caused by a virus which appears to be spread with great ease to susceptible persons of a healthy person from one child to another.

Mumps is more common in children than grownups. It is so common that it is often considered a part of life. The most feared complication is what is known as "meningitis" or "inflammation of the membranes of the brain." This is much more common in men. It does not occur before the age of maturity, which is an argument for having children vaccinated.

Stooler have been made on this complication. In general, it seems that it is comparatively unusual. When it does happen, one side only is usually involved. Both testicles are involved, sterility is a possibility.

It is curious that this virus disease should have such a liking for the salivary glands lying on the sides of the jaws. It is also strange that, though highly contagious, it often attacks the gland on one side only, leaving the other susceptible to mumps later. One can expect the first symptoms of mumps to appear about eight days after the spreading has gone down or later than eight days after the appearance of the first symptoms. There is now a skin test available to determine susceptibility to mumps or to confirm a diagnosis. It is not yet recommended under special circumstances.

Apparently it provides protection against the disease for less than a year. It does not give the same degree of resistance as does the disease itself.

However, this may be perfected in the future. If it could be used effectively, one parent who had never had mumps but were exposed by their children, it would certainly be a boon.

force that might have been represented by a spirit trained on each one of them. They were men supposedly living in covered fear of all the capacity to kill them, which was massed around them.

But what suddenly appeared, out of these men—sudden in its precise appearance, but actually long nurtured and almost inevitable in human nature itself—was the resolve not to be afraid, and the instinctive decision to place their will in the battlefield against the guns of the commissars.

When they heard this unbelievable thing, the little commissars scratched their heads, and sent for the big commissars. And the big commissars came down from Russia, who in disbelief, to see if such a thing was really happening, and if it was, happening, to end such nonsense then and there.

The thing was true, and when the big commissars saw it, and ordered it to disappear, and it did not, they themselves turned tail, and went back to Moscow.

Strangely, the commissars did not arrest. The guns did not shoot. The force did not move. Never, in fact, were guns so useless as those guns which gave the commissars their overwhelming force superiority inside Poland.

They had, in something in the minds of men, come up against the ultimate weapon.

Before this did happen, the world, which often tends to forget where the really decisive weapons of history are located, had the situation in Poland appraised very realistically. It would, the world knew, take a massive superiority of force to get the commissars out of Poland, atomic bombs at least, unless a Sputnik, before the commissars would know they were beaten.

But this was not true. There were no guns in the hands of the men who forced the commissars out of Poland. There was only something in their minds, some capacity of thought and resolve and courage which had the effect of a buck Rogers neutralizer on the awesome military force which held them in satellite slavery.

Today, Poland's partial revolution still stands, still holding its security not in force but in the minds of men. The fruits of that partial revolution are a measurable increase in freedom of politics and freedom in speech; the restoration, in freedom, of the religion the Polish people want; the escape from economic regimentation the Polish people did not want. None of these gains goes all the way. But none of this could have happened unless it had been the ultimate weapon which was put into use by the Polish people: if they keep their reliance on that ultimate weapon, they can go on to future victories, no matter how many times they are defeated.

This was, of course, almost a clinically perfect demonstration of the use of that ultimate weapon—the human mind. As a demonstration soon afterward in Hungary, courage is not always accompanied by coolness, and resolve is not always free of vulnerabilities like hatred and thirst for revenge. So that in Hungary, the commissars did move their fingers to their triggers, and force obtained a temporary victory. Nevertheless, in a yielding to what is still in the minds of the Hungarians, the commissars have, in the intervening months in which not a shot has been fired, retreated on many a point. They know that there is, in Hungary also, something which, if it finds the right expression, is faster than their guns, and their Sputniks.

"If I may be able, in these talks, to set out in proper perspective the truth and the facts of these matters, no personal inconvenience too great."

**By Town Board of Finance**

Bolton, Oct. 23 (Special)—The Board of Finance made plans last night to seek approval of the town for adoption of the so-called Uniform Fiscal Year, as defined by State statute.

The fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30. The town has traditionally been an October to May, when taxes are paid.

The Uniform Fiscal Year would coincide with federal and state years July 1 to June 30. Since taxes would be due on July 1, at the beginning of the year, the town would immediately operate on a pay-as-you-go basis and eliminate the cost of borrowing in anticipation of taxes.

The change would also make the town's fiscal year coincide with the school year and would provide benefits in budgeting and accounting since the school budget represents about 60 per cent of the town's total budget.

The vote was 18 to 12, with a 30-year lease of 300 acres of town land to a country club being turned down by voters in the town of Bolton.

During the day, voters were very light in the morning but gathered after 4 p.m. The voting was not completed until 8:30 p.m.

The Rev. Percy Smith of South Church and William R. Adams, Jr. were present at the meeting. The Rev. Smith presided.

Dr. Moran, who started the referendum movement, before the ordinance was passed, said that he would be willing to see the club given a lease of one year or two years "at the very least."

"I don't think anyone wants to treat them that way, but I think they are naturally very generous and they will give them plenty of time to buy land and have their own course," Dr. Moran said.

# Ribicoff Starts Tour Of New State Turnpike

129 Miles, 464 Million Dollars

Magnitude of the project may be judged from the fact that the state was required to acquire 4,000 acres of property totaling 4,000 acres at a cost of 71 million dollars. A total of 2,309,544 barrels of cement went into the concrete for the various structures and the pavement. Additionally 200,000 tons of bituminous concrete binder, 322,900 tons of asphaltic concrete, 608,700 tons of broken stone and 712,308 tons of broken stone bituminous macadam base were used.

More than 16 million cubic yards of earth and more than 9 million cubic yards of rock were excavated and moved for the road bed. More than 15 million cubic yards of borrow fill brought from elsewhere were used.

All grades are 3 per cent or less and no curve exceeds 3 degrees. Each lane is 12 feet wide and the outside shoulders are 10 feet in width.

In a pre-tour statement, the Governor said: "This turnpike will meet a pressing traffic need and be of great benefit to the state. It will relieve heavily congested Rt. 1 of both truck and passenger car traffic and will ease the load on the Merritt Parkway."

The turnpike will benefit existing industries and stimulate the industrialization of areas seeking new plans by providing quicker commuting to their jobs for workers as well as facilitating shipments.

He said the State Highway Department "acted through this job despite an unprecedented work load" which included a \$4 million dollar flood recovery program and an interior road building program which increased from 16 million a year to 60 million for the present year.
