Ellington Club Picks Officers

A newly named slate of officers and board of directors last night was submitted to form the Ellington Purchasing Corp., with a capitalization of \$300,000. The action culminated a 7-week drive by area businessmen to bring into being a new country club in Ellington.

Fifty-five of the 85 stockholders in the group, which will purchase a 200-acre tract off Abbott Road, met at the Red Ember Restaurant in Bolton and unanimously recommended the officers. The corporation will, according to Atty. Harold W. Garrity of Manchester, be set up within 10 days.

Officers include: President—Marjorie Brady of Ellington, secretary; and James McCarthy of Manchester, assistant secretary.

The recommended board of directors includes: Theodore Barry, Lawrence Scramton and Dr. E. M. Robbins of Manchester; William Clark of Glastenbury; and Atty. Stephen E. Keitcham, John Mason of Walling; Charles S. Burt of East Hartford; treasurer; Mrs.

land holding agency which will lease its land at a later date to a second corporation—a country club corporation. The country club company will not be established until the Ellington Purchasing Corp. is set up, its by-laws approved by the entire group and the land for the club purchased from Anton Sinter of Walling. Shares in the new corporation will cost \$1,000 each and a tentative maximum limit of 300 shares was set.

In referring to the expected increase in a share's par value, Barry pointed to a similar club recently built in Agawan, Mass. "Shares there originally cost \$2,000. Within a month, the cost was increased to \$3,000 and today, less than a year later, a share costs \$4,100," he said. The first stockholders' meeting will be held Nov. 26, at which time the corporation's by-laws will be submitted for the group's approval.

Geoffrey S. Corwell, architect, retained to draw up plans for the Ellington club, last night told the group of the proposed costs of the club. He showed them sketches of the proposed club layout. Preliminary plans call for an 18-hole, 6,800-

yard course. The markers will be placed so as to permit golfers to play 6,000 and 6,500-yard courses.

Corwell said it would not start until next fall. "However, because the corporation is not yet set up, it appears that work cannot be started until the spring. In that case, there will be no golf until the following year," he said.

Who ever heard of that? Why doesn't somebody tell us these things?"

Elected From Jail

The Turkish elections had something for everybody. The party of Premier Menderes won a big majority which enables it to continue in power. At the same time, however, the main opposition, led by the former Premier Ismet, made surprising gains, advancing from a total of 31 seats in the old Parliament to a total of 170 in the new.

The Republicans say they would have still more seats if all the votes had been counted right. But even as it is the existence of an opposition has been restored to Turkish politics.

But the biggest victory of all in the Turkish elections went to one Osman Bolukbasi, leader of the Nation's party. He was one of four deputies that party succeeded in electing. And he was elected from jail, where he has been languishing for four months on charges of "insulting the Parliament." He is, in short, one of the victors of Premier Menderes' rather contemptible censorship of tongues as well as newspapers in Turkey.

By selecting him, the voters of his district did him the technical legal favor of restoring him parliamentary immunity, under which he cannot be arrested for what he says. Having been handed this immunity, he is now to be released from jail. How long he can function without having Premier Menderes violate his parliamentary immunity again is a question, but at least he has a fresh start, and at least one district in Turkey clearly voted against the Menderes gag rule, and also succeeded in getting its voice counted.

Man's Aching Back

To the list of famous diplomatic illnesses in history add Tito's aching back.

A sudden attack of lumbago will prevent him from attending the celebration in Moscow, on Nov. 7, of the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution. His attack is so acute, in fact, that he will not be able to travel abroad for the next several months.

This sudden backache has occurred in an individual who should have as good lines into Moscow as anybody. But one has to guess that he is as much in doubt as anybody.

School Issue Coming Up

Some time within the next few months the voters and taxpayers of Manchester are going to come awake and alive to something that has actually been in the news a long time. They are suddenly going to realize that there is a proposition for a new junior high school before them.

This has already been in the news repeatedly. The need for the new school has already been explained, many times. Its location has been selected. Nevertheless, for all this, the proposition has never really engaged the attention, the reaction, the emotions, the pocketbooks of the people of Manchester. The day of our sharp attention to the question of the new school is still ahead of us. When we do finally become aware of it, we will be asking, many of us, why we were not told earlier, why the plans were not published, why the public was not given warning of what it would mean in the way of cost and in the way of its location of the Manchester system of education.

This is, in large part, the way of human nature, and of taxpayer nature, and perhaps not too much can be done to alter it. Town officials, and this newspaper, must perform their advance discussion duty to the fullest extent, and still there will come the moment when people will begin talking of the project as if it were a startling bolt from the blue. And then they will begin asking the questions that may already have been answered, and whatever the answers, begin developing disagreement with some of them.

There will, in short, be public controversy, in all probability, a hot fight over the new school.

One part of the fight, as always, will be over the dollar figure. Some people will say that it's almost a fortune another school, even though the enrollment statistics say we have no choice about it. Others will maintain that the school is not going to be built cheaply enough.

This town has already achieved the low school construction costs now being set up as goals in so many of the sudden rash of magazine articles hounding for economy in school construction. But that won't stop us from having those who want school built still more cheaply.

Some others are likely to maintain that we have all the school plant we can afford to build, and that the thing to do is to put to full use, by going to double sessions, in the high school, and wherever else we need to. We have so far gone through a mammoth school building program in order to get away from double sessions. But there will be those who, confronted with one more expenditure, will say we now ought to give up on the battle we thought we had won.

In addition to such potential arguments, one other controversy is likely to attach itself to the forthcoming junior high school proposition.

This particular building, if and when we get it, will make possible the introduction of the complete junior high school set-up to Manchester. We now operate with a six year grammar school, a two year junior high school, and a four year high school. With this building, we will go to a three year junior high school set-up. This will reduce the high school to a three year proposition.

Ellington Light Bulb Causes \$40,000 Barn Fire

(Picture on Page One)
Ellington, Oct. 30 (Special)—An exploding light bulb was thought to be the cause of a \$40,000 fire which razed the Spelman barn in less than half an hour last night and injured six cattle which had to be slaughtered.

Initial aid in receiving high praise today for saving the house and dairy building of John and Walter Spelman, West Rd., from the ravaging flames only 20 feet away.

Although the 52 head of cattle were led from the barn last night by falling hay and had to be slaughtered, lost in the sudden blaze were 100 tons of hauled hay and a stainless steel pipeline milking system. The Spelmans' estimated the loss at \$40,000, and said it was only partially covered by insurance.

The surviving cattle have been put up at the corner Grand and Main streets with the permission of Donald Wallace, head of the Farm Bureau, and the State Farm Exchange, and at Donald Moore's old barn. Five men were still at the scene this morning, wading down a road and clearing debris with bulldozers and trucks.

Negotiations are continuing, spokesman said last night.

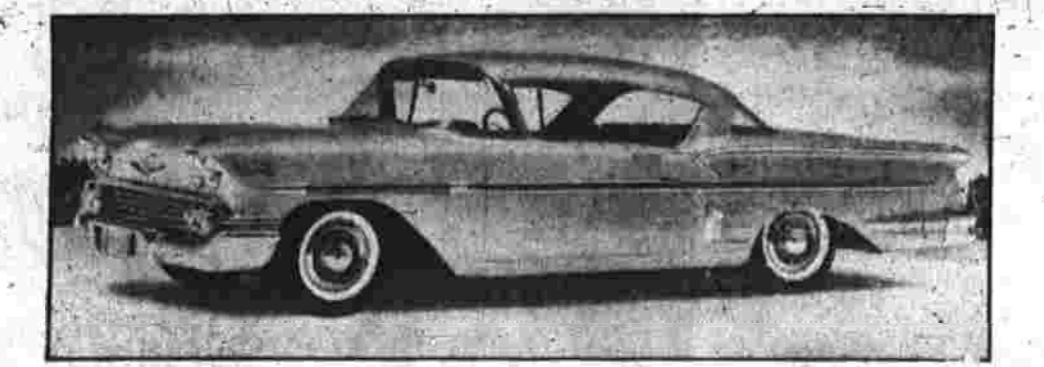

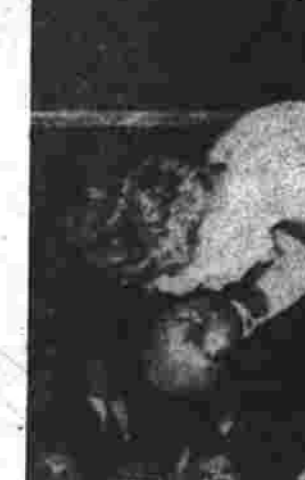
