Regional District Board to Hire New Custodian at High School

Hebron, Nov. 6 (Special)—The custodial staff of the new high school will be increased from 2 to 5 full-time men as a result of action taken by the Regional District Board of Education Monday night.

The Board voted its approval of hiring a third man after hearing a report from a 3-man subcommittee. The committee members are Alfred Goldstein, Hebron; Clinton B. Home, Andover; and William Coffey Sr., Marlborough.

A survey by the committee revealed that 170 man hours per week are required to maintain the building in its present stage of completion. On the basis of a 44 hour week they estimated that 18 full-time men would be needed.

In order to meet the problem the Board recommended that the third man work 8 to 12 p.m. adult and Saturday from 8 to 10 a.m. and returned to work from 8 to 10 a.m. each school day and four hours on Saturday.

Including \$247.50 previously spent for part-time help, plus the present staff and other workers will amount to \$122,225. This sum does not include custodial supplies and equipment.

No indication was given as to who would be hired to fill the new opening.

Israeli Aide Blames Arabs For Tension

The conflict in the Middle East is not between people, but between a Jewish national movement based on democracy and a band of feudal rulers afraid of the growth of democracy, or of a weakening of their power, said Morris, Israeli vice consul, told the Manchester Evening Herald today.

Morris, Irish born and educated, spoke at the Civitan's luncheon meeting on the crisis in the middle East and on the background of Israel.

He said that Russia's propaganda efforts were one of the factors which helped to keep the tensions between Israel and the Arab states at a fever pitch, and said that the average person in the Arab countries was not aware of the complete situation.

"As long as the Russians can continue to fish in these troubled waters, and can continue to supply arms to the Arab leaders who are people's minds away from the real face of the matter," he said.

"The Arab states are dedicated to the idea that Israel must not be allowed to exist, said the diplomat, and he felt that they engaged in this process of condemning Israel to build themselves up.

He cited as an example of this the large number of war scars on the face of the Arab states which have blocked every Israeli attempt to harness the Jordan River for power, even though it runs through Israeli territory.

Morris also spoke of Israel's gains since achieving its independence in 1948, citing the technical and agricultural progress which have enabled it to absorb 100,000 immigrants.

"This absorption of immigrants," he said, "is an essential factor of the human movement behind the state of Israel—providing a home for a people dispersed for over 2,000 years."

Asked about the Israeli reaction to Russian infiltration in Syria and recent Russian accusations regarding American and Turkish interests there, he said:

"We have been demonstrating the fact that the Israeli-Arab conflict is not the essential Middle East conflict, rather it is the whole cold war, East-West conflict.

"Also our people are concerned with the uninterrupted flow of arms into the hands of irresponsible rulers, many of whom have expressed their intentions of using them against us. And these arms are coming from both the East and the West."

This is Morris' first visit to the United States. He arrived three weeks ago to take up his new post at the Israeli consulate in New York. In addition to his duties as consul, he also acts as the director of research and publications within the consulate.

Rockville Judge Postpones Tuxbury Hearing

Rockville, Nov. 6 (Special)—A hearing on a motion by Edwin Tuxbury, who is seeking permission to build a mobile home park on 53.85 acres of land in Rockville, was postponed today by Judge John E. Flaherty, state court judge.

Whether Mobile Homes are a commercial enterprise or constitute a residential development may be the ultimate question arising from Tuxbury's action against Dr. John E. Flaherty, Kingston, Conn. Flaherty's motion asks the court to order Dr. Flaherty to hold a

hearing on Tuxbury's request for a writ to erect a mobile home park. Atty. Donald C. Fish, Town Counsel for Ellington, filed an answer and several special defenses. Flaherty has not called a hearing because Tuxbury's application is incomplete.

In a special defense he contends that a trailer camp of the size Tuxbury plans is a commercial enterprise, and therefore not permitted in a rural residence zone. In which Tuxbury's property is located.

Atty. Timothy O'Neil, Fanning, representing Tuxbury, states that the 100 homes planned for the park will have sewage facilities in the ground—in the trailers, and that, he contends, makes it a mobile home park, rather than a trailer camp.

\$8,500 Voted to Plan Washington Addition

An appropriation of \$8,500 to plan an addition and alterations to the Washington School was approved by Town Directors last night.

The 4-classroom addition with a kindergarten, kitchen and cafeteria, alterations to the old school building, and equipment are estimated by cost \$265,000, according to General Manager Richard Martin.

Martin estimated the construction cost per square foot at \$17. That's a high price for schools in the construction business. In view of the long period in which the school has been considered, however, Cummings said that he would agree with other Directors in approving the planning appropriation.

Washington School parents have charged that they have been waiting for improvements and an addition for four or five years.

The square footage cost may be less when bids are taken, Martin said.

Opposition to the estimated cost was expressed by former Mayor Sherwood Boardman, who said that the project could be accomplished for a lot less, probably \$100,000 less, Boardman said.

No other opposition was voiced at the hearing which was adjourned for a \$150,000 appropriation.

The plans are now estimated to cost \$44,000 and \$60,000 has been paid, leaving \$8,500 to be allocated, Martin said. Architect William Wilkins of Hartford has been working on them for some time.

Part of the estimated cost will be included in a bond issue referendum to go before the voters in December or January.

Plans call for use of the new addition next fall.

he has not been a party to a deal with Knight.

Brown said he was not disappointed by the removal of Knight from the gubernatorial nomination.

He said he anticipated the Knight switch at least five weeks ago. He pointed also to a newspaper report of Los Angeles county publisher Chas. E. Young as the leader over either Knowland or Knight.

"When I got into this race," Brown said, "I was not a Republican operative."

Brown said the Knight "return" on the White House step" has given a new lease to the government.

"That's what I said," he said, "that the Republicans are afraid of a free democratic primary in California, and I think they're right."

Calls for Explanation

"The people of California are entitled to an explanation from Sen. Knowland, Gov. Knight and Vice President Nixon exactly how this thing was worked out," Brown said.

Brown interpreted the victory of Democratic Gov. Robert B. Meyner in New Jersey as a definite indication of the fact that people are completely disenchanted with the Republican administration and frightened by the complete lack of leadership.

"If Knight had waited 24 hours he might not have wanted to have his picture taken with Vice President Nixon who campaigned for the Republicans in New Jersey," he said.

Brown said he believes the Democrats will continue to gain strength in California next year, possibly picking up two or three seats in the House of Representatives now held by Republicans.

He identified what he called the "vicious" Republican "deal" as Souder, Traugott, Wilson and Baldwin.

Brown said he does not believe Knowland will continue to make an issue of Knowland's advocacy of a right-to-work law in California. He said he believes such problems will dull the appeal of "class warfare."

Speaks to the Issue

The Republican spokesman will be campaign issue, Brown said, and added:

"I think the Senate Minority Leader should be back here conferring with the President instead of being out running for another job. I think the people will resent it."

On His Side

On his side, the shift by Knight represented a Knowland victory in a war of nerves, and showed the GOP Senate Leader is likely to be a tough opponent if he seeks the 1960 presidential nomination.

The Doctor Says

Scurvy Devastated Crews Of Old-Time Sailing Ships

The expression "limber," as applied to the British, and particularly to British sailors, has an interesting origin.

Years ago, many sailors in the British navy and merchant marine had to be sent for many months at a time, during which they were often completely deprived of fresh fruits and vegetables. As a result, many suffered from a disease known as scurvy.

Sometime ago it was discovered that if a sufficient quantity of lime (or lemon) was carried on board ship, and the sailors required to suck them at frequent intervals, scurvy became less frequent. Hence the name "limber."

The vitamin deficiency disease known as scurvy has been known for centuries and is not yet a condition which we should forget.

It was recently pointed out again, in an interesting article by a physician in Winnipeg, Canada, that when Vasco de Gama sailed around the Cape of Good Hope in 1498, 100 of his men perished from scurvy out of a crew of 160.

On this continent in 1850 scurvy broke out among Jacques Cartier's men. One of the sailors learned from the red Indians of a decoction from the needles of spruce trees which cured the complaint.

Captain Cook made his men eat fresh food to keep them free from scurvy. Regulations enforcing the consumption of daily rations of lemon juice were introduced into the British navy in 1804 and to the merchant marine in 1862.

Scurvy comes on slowly. Loss of weight, a feeling of weakness, vague pain in the legs and pallor of the skin are typical. Soon the gums begin to become swollen and spongy, and bleed easily when brushed or rubbed. The changes in the gums may become so marked that the teeth loosen and fall out. If vitamin C is absent from the diet for a long time, the jaw can actually decay.

The breath becomes foul and the tongue is swollen and red. Bleeding under the mucous membrane of the mouth is common. Gradually the skin becomes dry and rough. Swelling around the ankles is common, the heart palpitates and the heart becomes feeble and irregular; mental depression is characteristic. These symptoms come with advanced scurvy and are not seen often now.

In mild forms there may be only such inconspicuous signs as poor healing of wounds, a tendency to certain infectious diseases, easy bleeding when cut, and increased susceptibility to ulcers of the stomach. This type of scurvy can be discovered only by making chemical examinations of the blood or urine for ascorbic acid (vitamin C).

Scurvy can be prevented by citrus fruits. Vitamin C is also present in green vegetables, grapes, fruits, juices, tomatoes, some root vegetables and in small amounts in milk. The disease can be avoided by including enough of these foods in the diet.

"Am I just being silly, or is there a possibility of such a thing happening?"

Be a Diplomat

The point is the wife who feels she ought to urge her husband to slow down, have regular physical checkups and see that he eats properly has to be a diplomat.

She should base her plea that he take things a little easier on the grounds that his job is demanding and that he is carrying a heavy load than any man ought to carry.

She should be careful in dragging him away from parties not to act like a mother hen nagging over a chick. She doesn't have to explain that they are leaving early so that her husband can get his rest.

She doesn't have to do a lot of talking about his cutting down on eating foods, etc. She can do more by planning menus carefully and not tempting him with fattening foods than by a lot of talk.

It might be dangerous for a wife to make a middle-aged husband begin to feel old by making a big fuss over his health. But with a little tact she can look after his health without making him determined to prove that he is just as young as he ever was.

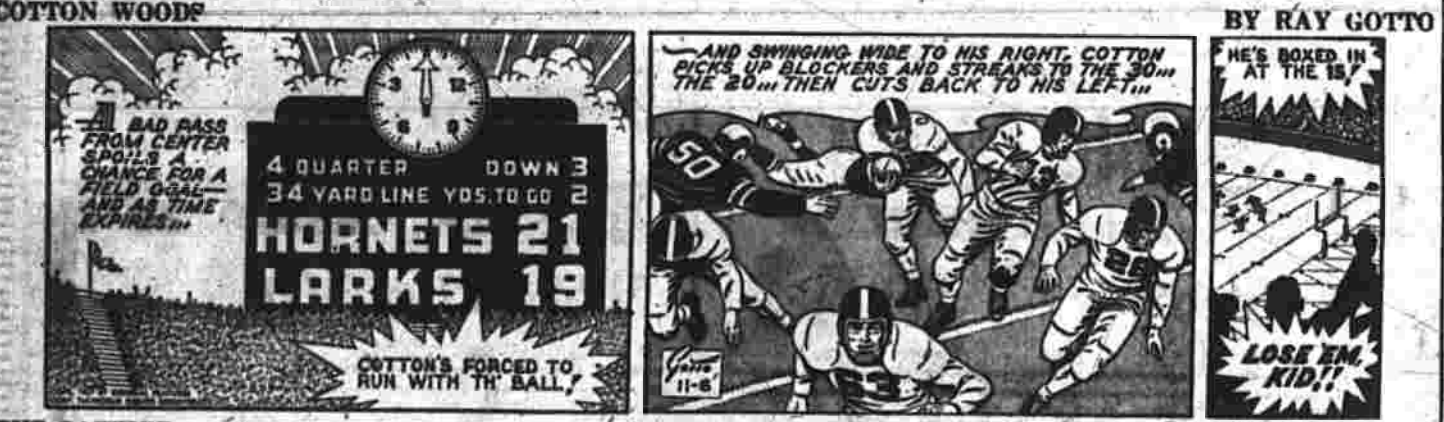

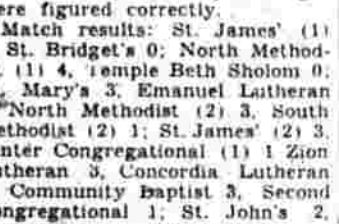
