Flu Deaths Up, Incidence Dips

Washington, Nov. 7 (AP)—Deaths from influenza and pneumonia continued to climb in the nation last week, apparently to new highs for 1957. The public health service said today that the number of deaths from influenza and pneumonia in New York City dropped to 151, as compared to 181 for the previous week. Deaths were reported from 11 states, including Connecticut, Michigan, Wisconsin, Alabama, Mississippi, Wyoming, Arizona and Texas.

Galliard's confirmation by the National Assembly represented an act of confidence in him that is a far cry from the alternative—a prolongation of the crisis, already the longest since the war, leading to economic ruin and a collapse of French democratic institutions.

Furthermore, the cabinet he formed is not a confirmation of the internal contradictions, including as it does members of the right and left. The representatives of these factions cannot be expected to live in harmony for very long.

As a result, it does not seem that the Galliard government will be permitted to survive beyond the time necessary to handle the most pressing economic problem facing the country. And these are considerable—a treasury almost drained dry, a budget deficit that requires new taxes, mounting prices and a demand by workers for higher wages.

But with the Algerian problem, which hangs like an increasingly dark cloud over each successive French government, it is doubtful if Galliard will have any more success than his predecessors. The program for Algeria which he submitted in broad outline to the Assembly was similar to the one presented by the preceding government of Bourges-Maunory, and that was the issue on which Bourges-Maunory was defeated.

But perhaps it is asking too much of any French premier to provide a solution to the Algerian problem. The French have demonstrated in three bloody years in North Africa their inability to handle the issue by themselves, though they may have yet to concede that fact.

Perhaps the friends of France should merely be thankful that there is a new premier at the helm who has the intellect and vigor needed to tackle the vexing problem of French finances. That, at least, is something.

The 5 Per Cent Layoff

The announcement of a five per cent layoff at Pratt & Whitney is a small but perhaps healthy reminder that nobody has a larger share of a smaller market than Pratt & Whitney. It is a reminder that not even miracles can last forever.

There has been a post-war miracle at Pratt & Whitney. It has been the last throes of the industry that was stream-lined on the miniature mud flats of the world in its own pocket. "We're real," he said. "That if the Soviet Union has succeeded by the efforts of its scientists, engineers and workers in creating an earth satellite then other countries, too, especially such a highly-developed country as America, are able to create the same."

When he asked for a high meeting to try to end the cold war, and the armaments race, he abandoned the previous Russian idea that such negotiations should be between the United States and Russia alone, which we have always rejected out of deference to our allies, and he now suggests a full-scale conference of many powers.

Much of the world will hear such things with at least the wish that something could come of them.

Washington will study them with many tortured considerations. We have no instinct to believe Khrushchev means what he says. Our instinct is to believe that he is merely making propaganda.

Even if we resist our first impulse, which is always to scoff at such propaganda plays the moment they are made, and decide to consider a response, what shall we do? We have no instinct to believe Khrushchev, for all his disclaimers, really wanting the satellite at all. If so, would it not be a confession of weakness if we should be willing to negotiate now? Would it not be better to wait until we have answered the satellite, and created a new situation of strength for ourselves?

Our routine answers to such questions are almost predictable. Yet that does not mean they are necessarily realistic or right. Even if we consider the situation from the power aspect alone, realistic analysis might say that we now have, in the moment before the space age is fully opened, as favorable a situation as we shall be able to achieve once everybody has entered the space age.

A sound policy behavior, on the part of Washington, will bid us at least do something more than kick the Khrushchev effort under the rug before we consider that positive and compelling test we might put it to.

Types of Action

Hood listed the types of dramatic action as the two-dimension action, area, mime, ballet, free interpretation, dance, clown, mime, and silent film. He explained that each type of action has a different type of rhythm, which must be handled differently.

But there is a new meaning in the action of a play, in the rhythm he has as a great passion, as in "The Young Man in the Hat" for his people attempt to discover the cause of a plague in "Hamlet" the young prince wants revenge.

The passion progresses to the end of the play, or to a person or a person's action, or to a new level.

Audience Participation

The rhythm of tragedy is based on the rhythm of the audience's participation. The audience participates in the drama by reacting to the situation enacted on the stage. In a way the audience must be capable of believing in some absolute value or there is no tragedy. There is some defect in today's audience and for this reason, "We have a vision of tragedy, but we don't have the real thing."

The Greek and the medieval Christian attacked religious infidelity to drama, and got a lot more out of drama for this reason. The hero of their dramas was a symbol of a race, and in being "joined to the mass" for his own sake he made a statement for his people.

It is hard to find a play that has a drama that doesn't really have an integral attachment to society.

Hood said.

In speaking of the rhythm of drama, he said that today's audience is "estranged" because of its remoteness from the full range of comedy.

Types of Action

Hood listed the types of dramatic action as the two-dimension action, area, mime, ballet, free interpretation, dance, clown, mime, and silent film. He explained that each type of action has a different type of rhythm, which must be handled differently.

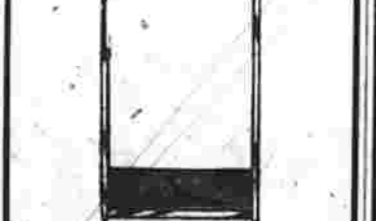

President Holds Expanded Security Council Session

(Continued from Page One) In the Eisenhower speaking program followed a special cabinet meeting yesterday and an announcement by Senate Democratic Leader Johnson of Texas of plans for a "searching inquiry" into the whole missile and satellite program.

Tonight's address also was limited, at least to some degree on purpose, to coincide with Eisenhower's speech today at the 40th anniversary of the Red Revolution. Eisenhower's speech, which was carried live by all national radio networks and the CBS television network, will be carried on WNCN-TV at 10:30 p.m. and by NBC-TV at 11:30.

Hoping to take some of the propaganda drive away from the Soviet moon, the U.S. Information Agency yesterday issued a statement and USAID officials said they would get the President's text as soon as possible for speedy relay to foreign newspapers and radio stations.

Eisenhower announced more than a fortnight ago that he intended to strike out around the country and make a series of speeches to build national confidence in America's foreign policy, national defense, economic strength and the foreign program.

The White House gave no clear-cut reasons for the scheduling slip. But both criticism and concern have been building up about the American job being done in missile and satellite.

Sen. Kennedy (D-Mass.), criticizing "the complacency and the confusion" he said about in the U.S. program, also called on Eisenhower to "tell us exactly where we stand today and where we go from here."

Eisenhower's 40th anniversary commemorative program was scheduled for a meeting at the White House Dec. 5. He spoke in Tokyo, Korea, in each year before a new session of Congress for discussions which would be held in Washington.

But this year's session has been expanded, apparently by Eisenhower's questions of government, finance and tax policies since last year's session. He also has called on the members of the House to propose and enact legislation.

As usual, Eisenhower has called on the key men of the Atomic Energy Commission, the State Department and the Army to appear with him at the annual address.

The State Department in its comment today in effect accused Khrushchev of having lied in the past-war period. "The German unification that President Eisenhower believed in," Dulles said, "was the result of the agreement with Soviet leaders at the Geneva summit conference in 1955."

White said that there have been Soviet achievements "not the least of which are scientific and technical." "But these achievements must be weighed against the dramatic cost and sacrifice in the welfare of the Soviet people in their own punishment."

White said that the "main point" about Russia's future behavior is whether after 40 years of Soviet regime is "really going to dedicate itself to the welfare of its people. He said the dominant theme of the Red Revolution is the glorification of the individual."
