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**Bureau lowers Insurance Rates**

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 8.—State Insurance Commissioner Thomas J. Spillacy has announced an agreement with the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters that is expected to save Connecticut auto policy holders under 25 years of age about two million dollars annually.

Spillacy said yesterday that the agreement would reduce the monthly cost of negotiations to reduce rates for bodily injury and property damage to policy holders under 25 years of age.

The Commissioner said the new rates would become effective in about 10 days. He said all other auto insurance companies generally follow the rates set by the Underwriters Bureau.

All other rates will remain unchanged, Spillacy said, as the agreement did not find the other rates excessive.

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**Trowel Used in Cornerstone Rites At St. Bridget's 61 Years Ago Found**

A 61-year-old mystery has been solved.

On Aug. 2, 1896, the cornerstone of the new Roman Catholic Church in St. Bridget's Parish was placed in position by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Tierney as a crowd of more than 2,000 persons looked on.

The silver trowel used by the Bishop is now in the possession of the Rev. John DeLoach, present pastor of St. Bridget's.

He said the trowel was found in the basement of the church, where it had been hidden for so long that it had become a mystery to many of the parishioners.

DeLoach said he had been looking for it in addition to many other facts concerning the church's history.

It seems that the trowel was to have been presented to the person who made the largest donation toward the erection of the church, St. Bridget's, which was placed in their vault and which has remained there ever since.

That day more than 81 years ago, all the Roman Catholic societies of the town's two churches met at the St. Bridget's Church on N. School St., and headed by the Rev. Richard J. O'Connell, pastor of the church, they marched to the site of the new church.

After the cornerstone had been placed in position, the Rev. Thomas W. Broderick, rector of St. Peter's Church of Hartford, delivered the invocation.

The Rev. John A. Mulvihy, vicar of the Hartford diocese, gave the invocation.

**TPC to Hear Request for Subdivision**

The Town Planning Commission will hear a request for a new subdivision at a public hearing Nov. 20.

Atty. William Fitzgerald is representing the Orchard Hill Area. Atty. Harold W. Garrity, representing Bryan, said that his clients are requesting the rezoning of the property to A Zone because of its proximity to the A Zone Highway and adjacent property.

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Also scheduled for the hearing will be applications by Alexander Harris for rezoning of property in Zone A from A-2 to A Zone.

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**No Giant Step**

President Eisenhower missed the point last night as apparently he was also going to miss it in all the special speeches which are to follow.

This is the first time that he, confronted with issues of major proportions, has failed to make any routine thinking and reaction of the men around him, and has failed to lead the American people, and the world in a positive direction.

That he has failed to do this does not mean he is less qualified than other men on the scene. What he has failed to do is to be different—to see the real issues behind the superficial external—to pose the real question we Americans and all human beings, have to answer. That is what he has previously done on notable occasions. That was what he did not begin to do last night.

Two of these previously notable occasions are easily recalled. In 1953 after he became apparent that the Russians had become a full-fledged atomic power, President Eisenhower, for many subsequent weeks, was besieged with routine advice recommending that he call the American people to an annual "national alert" order that they might prepare themselves more fully for the horrors of hydrogen war. But in the end the President threw all this out and went before the United Nations with his historic and positive atomic peace proposal.

The fact that that proposal won out and now has Russia cooperating in it has done more for peace and security than all the atomic armaments race that has also been going on. That is at least to lessen the world's dangers. The armaments race merely increases those dangers.

A year ago when the world was in a policy torture over events at Berlin and everybody was wondering what loyalty to follow, it was President Eisenhower who raised the standard of the one loyalty that could command respect of all and solve the crisis—loyalty to the law and justice of the United Nations.

Last night, however, the President missed the point. And the point he missed is that the area of insecurity and alarm is not based on the particular fact that happens to be Russia which has launched a space satellite. We should feel much the same and be facing the same problem if our allies had been the first with the satellite.

And the question to be answered is not that of how we may need ourselves into catching up to Russia. That we can do, as even Russia herself admits. The question to be answered is that of how man shall live in the space age now dawning.

The level on which President Eisenhower did try to assure us was a low and pitiful level. The naming of a missile car, the virtual exhibition of a second-hand space huddle of our own, the shallow acceptance of the idea that what we need to do is turn more human and produce more scientists—those left us where we came in. And the exhortation to that amounted to nothing more than the note of not security, but of doom.

At the end of his speech, President Eisenhower took a brief glance at what might have been his theme.

"What the world needs today is more than a giant leap into outer space," he said, "is a giant step toward peace."

Then, in what amounted to a refusal to take his own words seriously, he suggested that the way for such a step to begin would be for Russia to accept a rigid set of disarmament proposals which have been carefully tailored to preclude any acceptance of these Russian ideas. The voice which would meet the

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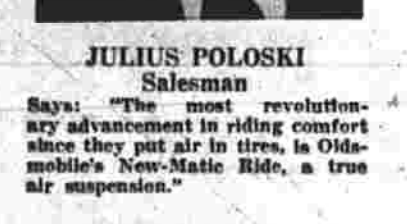

Bolton, Nov. 8 (Special)—Andrew Ansaldi of Manchester today announced plans to build this town's first shopping center. It will be located on 20 acres of the former Anthony Ansaldi farm on Rts. 6 and 4A.

Ansaldi designated as the "Bolton Shopping Center," the project is now in the planning stage. A plot sketch, drawn by Ralph Scuderi of the Manchester architectural firm of Scuderi and Manley shows an L-shaped main core of retail shops at ground level. Charles Lepore, exclusive agent for all retail shops in the lack of professional offices in this town may lead to inclusion of second floor facilities for doctors, dentists or lawyers.

Because the town has no shopping center at the present time, provision is made in the preliminary sketch for a wide range of shops. Suggested are a super-market, grocery store, drug store, liquor outlet, dry-cleaning shop, barber shop, clothing and equipment outlets.

Lepore revealed there is a possibility that a Manchester financial institution will establish a branch office in the project. The main business block will sit at least 100 feet back from the main highway providing about five acres of parking space in front of the shops.

Other business buildings are shown on the layout for which no definite plans have been announced as yet. The plot will be bounded on the south by the proposed new state highway if present plans for relocation of Rt. 6 are effected. Lepore feels this will be an advantage to the shopping center since access and exit from the highway will be provided within the immediate area.

Work on the shopping center will begin in the near future. Eventually both the Ansaldi and former Manley houses will be removed from the site. A buffer strip will be created between the shops and the Ringhoffer property situated on the corner of Williams Rd.

The area is already zoned for business use to a depth of 200 feet from the highway. The land beyond 200 ft. is zoned for industry which presents no zoning barrier for the proposal. Building permits will be all the town requires before construction is begun.

Local officials and residents welcome the news that a shopping center is planned for the town. The area picked by Ansaldi has long been pinpointed as an ideal site for such a project.

Its location is just west of Bolton which is actually the gateway to the east for the upper half of the state.

Thousands of commuters from this town, Coventry, and Dover, Columbia and points farther east, travel the highway twice daily. Five and six miles a week it is also the route for University of Connecticut traffic and for interstate travel to Providence and Cape Cod.

Both recommendations had as their objective removal of the road from the Oak Grove paper plant and water supply. This objective has been accomplished by moving the road slightly to the north and moving an interchange slightly to the east, the Commission believes.

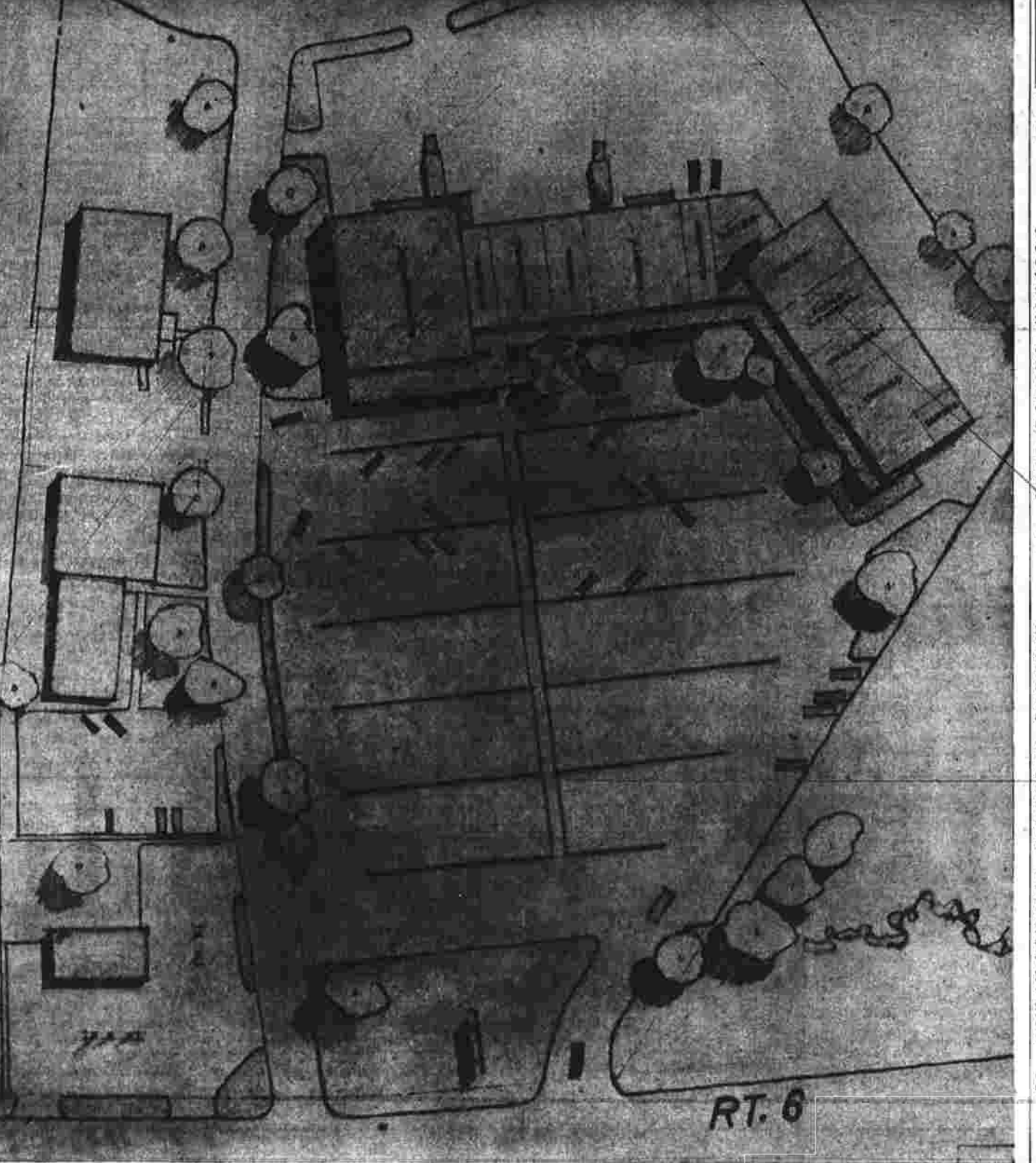
The Express Highway Committee's report called for a much greater change in the State's present plans for construction of the highway.

At the same time, the committee added endorsement of Planning Commission proposals "concerning interchanges, relocation, and improvements in local streets to integrate with the new highway" to the end of its report.

Reconciliation of the different ideas expressed in the report may be confining to the highway department, Kelly believes.

He thinks the Board should make it clear that the Commission ideas now have its approval.

"I think we should consider the conflict and revoke our blessing upon the Express Highway Committee report," the Director said.

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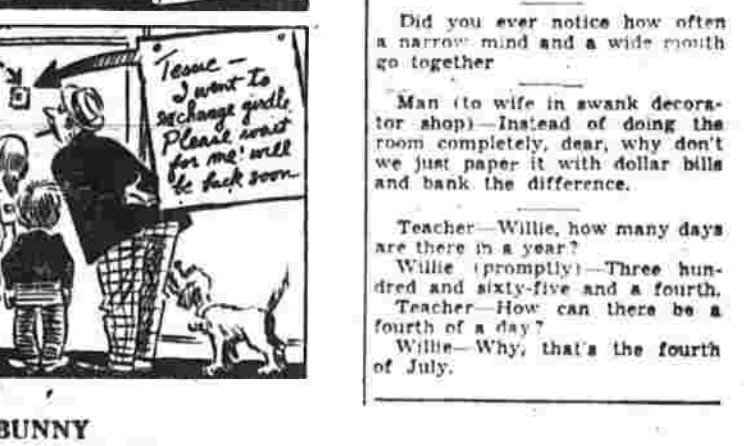
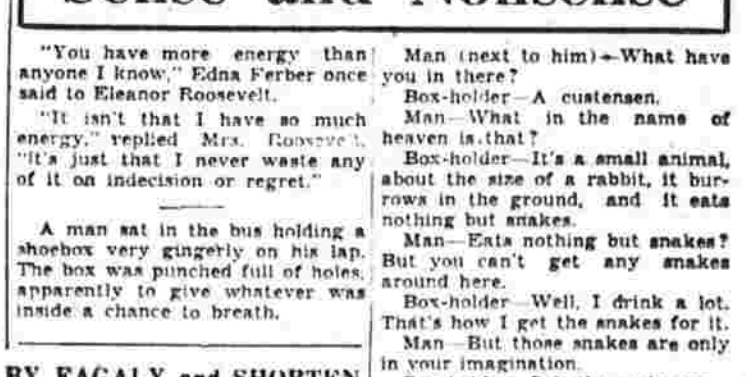
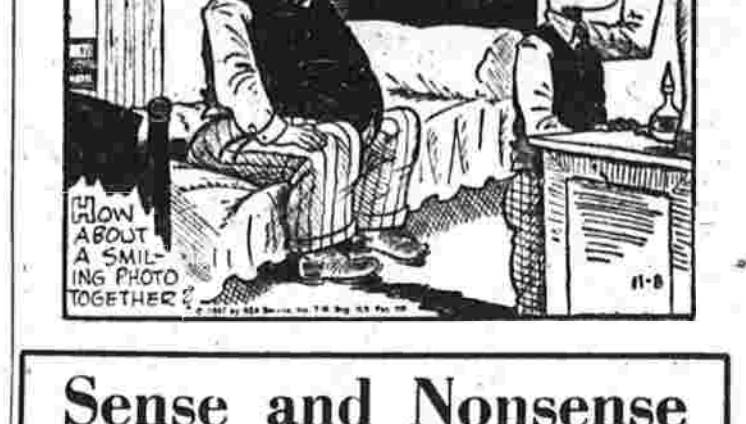
