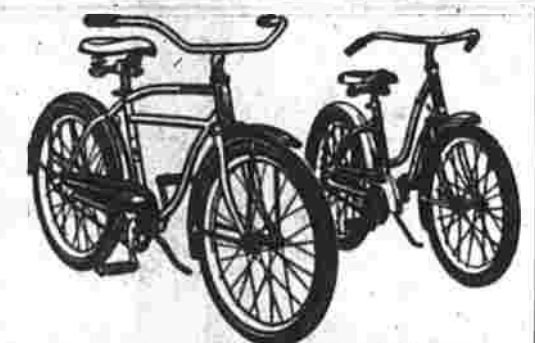

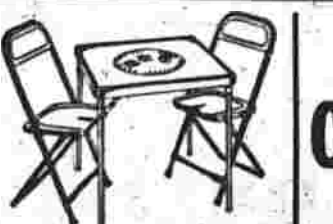

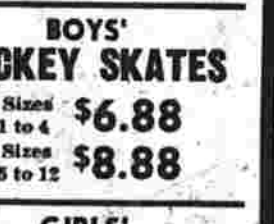

Whisper Magazines were guilty of conspiring to publish obscene material. This was another of the charges in a grand jury indictment against the "expose" magazine. Judge Noble has indicated he will rule on this Dec. 10.

Among those involved in the dismissal action were Confidential Publisher Robert Harrison of New York City and Fred and Margorie Maude, who operated Hollywood Research, Inc., a listening post on the West Coast for Confidential and Whisper.

The magazines announced in newspaper ads yesterday that they will "admit the expose stories on the private lives of celebrities" beginning with the March 1956 issue of Confidential and the April 1956 issue of Whisper.

The ads said the magazines "never felt that such stories violated any laws," but nevertheless agreed on the formal change with the state attorney general and county district attorney.

"We are confident," the magazines said, "that our millions of readers will find the new format interesting and exciting."

After the ads appeared in print, Superior Judge H. Burton Noble dismissed a charge of conspiracy to commit criminal libel brought against 11 individuals and 3 corporations connected with the publication of Confidential and Whisper. The prosecution did not object.

A 2-month trial of the case ended last summer with the jury deadlocked 7 to 5 for conviction.

**Adlai Finds His Voice**

For the first month of the space age, the voice of Adlai Stevenson was not to be distinguished from that of general yawning. Stevenson, calling, disaster-mongering, and sharp-edged partisanship which seemed to rise from the whole American scene in response to Sputnik.

Then, Monday night, Stevenson found his voice. The occasion invited it. He was addressing a dinner sponsored by the National Conference of Christian Scientists, where the theme is always brotherhood. And in the background, as perhaps another explanation for his eloquence, was the persistent report that the Eisenhower administration was seeking to bring him into some official responsibility, as it went ahead with the kind of crash answer to Sputnik he and everybody else had seemed to be calling for. And so it could have been that, if only to safeguard his own position as outside critic, he had to shift himself toward higher ground.

At any rate, he found the higher ground, and what he said Monday night was what President Eisenhower should also be saying.

"Last month," said Stevenson, "a new star flashed across the skies. I wish it had been the one which lit that new star. It disturbs me greatly, as an American, that it was not. Yet I know, as a citizen of the world and as a member of tomorrow, that the basic issue is no longer the supremacy of nations. It is the supremacy of man for good or for evil, for survival or for suicide.

"The significance of what has happened lies not in which nation has first reached into outer space but in the fact that man has now obliterated for better or for worse, what we used to call time and distance.

"I deny that the satellite is a portent of disaster. I think rather of John Donne's marking of the times in history that 'are pregnant with those old times. Hope and Fear.' Surely this is such a time, a time not of catastrophe but of choice, not of disaster but of decision, a time when the preferences of our aspirations over our fears become the duty of citizenship in civilization.

"A very large part, I suspect, of the maturing of mankind in its present state has come from adversity, or the threat of adversity. More frontiers of what we call progress have probably been crossed under the pressure of necessity than by the power of reason. Prophets have appeared all through history to proclaim an ethic, but humanity has not heeded them and the world has wandered its way until the hard steel of survival itself has been pulled against our too soft mouths.

"Now, once again, science has forced humanity to a crossroad from which there is no turning back, no escape -- and just one road that leads upward. The choice is either extinction -- or the human brotherhood that has been the vision of visionaries since the beginning of time.

"I deny that human fulfillment cannot keep pace with material advance. We know and must insist that what was heralded by the splitting of the atom, what is now proclaimed by the earth satellite, is nothing narrower than man's complete genius -- not to exterminate himself, but to control himself.

"What that 'bleep-bleep' is saying is that now the world has no choice, that it must turn from narrow nationalism, sectarianism, racialism, that the only conceivable relationship among men is one based on men's full respect -- yes, their love, if you please -- for each other.

# Garcia Easily Leads In Philippine Voting

(Continued from Page One)

The Philippine News Service said the Nacionalistas apparently would take at least 70 of the 102 House of Representatives seats. Five Nacionalistas, two Liberals and a Progressive lead the field in the eight senatorial races. At stake, Senators are elected on a nationwide basis.

The President's party held 86 House seats and 23 of the 24 Senate seats in the last Congress.

With the 54,000-man Philippine Army on the alert to prevent violence, the election was one of the quietest on record. Only one political killing was reported.

But nine persons were killed Tuesday in a clash between police and bandits in Cavite Province south of Manila. And 11 persons were reported dead or missing as a result of typhoon Kit, which moved northward today through the mountains of northwest Luzon.

Victorious in every election of his 31 years in public life, Garcia succeeded to the presidency last March when Magraway was killed in a plane crash. He immediately set out to win a 4-year presidential term, pledging to continue Magraway's pro-American foreign policy.

The strongly-pro-American stand of the 47-year-old Macapagal was regarded as one factor in his big lead over Laurel, who was charged during the campaign with being anti-American. Laurel's father, retiring from the Senate this year, was president of the Philippines during the Japanese occupation.

Jose P. Enxona, Jose M. Laurel IV, also was trailing in his bid for a congressional seat in the Batangas Province. He had only 208 votes to 1,231 for Artemio Lohrin, Nacionalista-Citizen candidate.

In addition, one bear was decelerated at 20 Gs. or 20 times its body weight.

"None of the subjects, human or animal, was adversely affected."

The scientist explained a bear was used because its bone structure — particularly the back bone — is similar to a man's.

### What Has Happened To Photographers?

New York, (AP)—One of the recurrent incidents of civilization is having one's picture taken.

The tubal savage often dreads a camera for fear this magic box will imprison his image and also capture his soul.

The civilized man has an even more morbidly fear—that the camera will reflect his soul. He feels the camera always looks into his soul.

One of the major differences between men and women in the 20th Century is their attitude toward having their picture taken.

Practically as much as she says "I know this will turn out awful," the woman secretly hopes she actually by some miracle of modern chemistry, the photographer will manage to make her look as right. She actually enjoys the experience.

The man, on the other hand, goes to the photographer as he does to the gunsmith. He knows neither art nor science can save him. How can he end up looking right when he knows he is looking wrong and out of place to begin with?

It is hard to say when man's fear of the photographer starts. Probably in the childhood when, during the taking of a snapshot, some family onlooker calls facetiously:

"Be careful. Your face may break the camera."

The small boy aware that every remark by a grown-up has a vague possibility of truth, stares self-consciously at the camera. Will it actually explode or fall apart? For the rest of his life he will never again look hand-on into a camera without the same uneasy feeling.

A man's deep disillusionment with the camera, however, comes after he sees his first real portrait in the yearbook when he graduates from high school. He never quite recovers from this experience.

"Not bad... not bad," the family murmurs sympathetically.

"Not bad... Are they crazy? Is this the way you really look to others? Are your ears really that big? Is your face really that lumpy—half-anthropoid—half-ape?"

For the rest of his life the boy will regard a photographer as a conspiracy in league with the devil to make him look ridiculous to the rest of the world.

However, he won't mind his wedding pictures so much, so matter how they turn out, because a man honestly expects to look somewhat ridiculous on his wedding day. Nor will he complain overmuch against his fiancée's pictures as women do, for he recognizes that even customs officers are too kindly to gaze critically at them. Passport pictures, he knows, are universally recognized as horrible and unfair. Some people even send copies to their friends at Christmas with the notation, "Christmas Who?"

### Czech President Dies; Top Red Ill 2 Years

(Continued from Page One)

Zapotocky was born Dec. 19, 1884, into an atmosphere of industrial area, near Klidno, was one of the founders of the first Socialist party in that part of what was then the Austro-Hungarian empire.

Zapotocky became an apprentice stenographer and joined the Social Democratic party, rising to membership in its Central Committee. He was arrested several times before World War I, in which he fought.

Zapotocky sided with the Extreme Left when the Czech Socialist party split in 1920, leading to founding of the Communist Federation and began to build a popularity with workers that later helped him to the presidency.

Imprisoned by the Germans from 1938 until 1945, Zapotocky returned to Prague after World War II and worked with Klement Gottwald, virtual boss of the Czech Communist party. With Russian backing, he seized power in 1948 and turned Czechoslovakia into a Soviet satellite.

Gottwald became president and Zapotocky was premier from 1948 to 1953, when Gottwald died.

After 1953 Zapotocky remained in the background of Czech public life. With collective leadership the Communist, by word after Stalin died, no "cult of personality" was built up about Zapotocky.

He died at his home in Prague, aged 52, on Monday.
