U.N. Faces Fight over Arms Talk

United Nations, N. Y., Nov. 14 (AP)—Japan and Canada today laid before the General Assembly a highly controversial list of 10 new nations which the western powers are backing for membership in an expanded U.N. Disarmament Commission.

The formal proposal was submitted after negotiating between the United States and the Soviet Union. It was a time for another critical examination of our entire defense system.

The President's talk here climaxed Oklahoma's 50th anniversary "Arrows to Atoms" parade. He headed back to Washington by plane immediately after the speech.

In his address, the President indicated some areas which increased spending loomed.

Administration Cool To Standby Controls

Washington, Nov. 14 (AP)—The administration gave a cool reception today to a proposal that Congress enact a standby control providing wage, price, credit and rationing controls.

Gov. Arthur Hays Sulzberger suggested the action yesterday at a 2-day conference of 120 businessmen and members of the National Defense Executive Reserve.

Government officials attending the sessions indicated clearly that they were cool to the proposal. Neither recommended nor requested the standby power.

Benjamin C. Frank, president of the National Industrial Conference Board, said that the administration is committed to a policy of "standby" controls if possible.

He said that "standby" controls along the same line declined to be quoted by name.

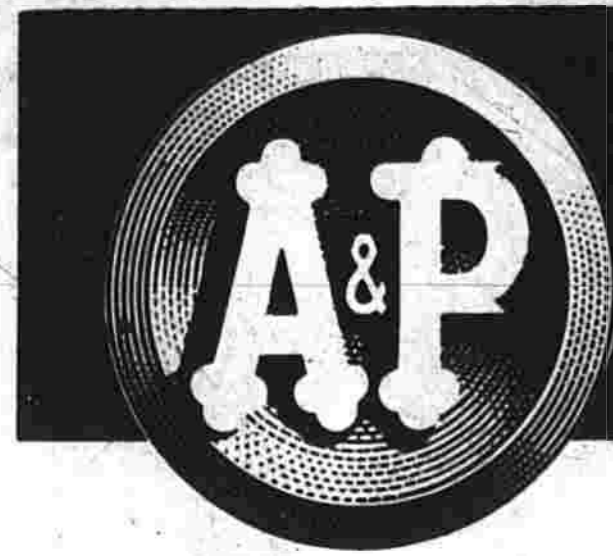

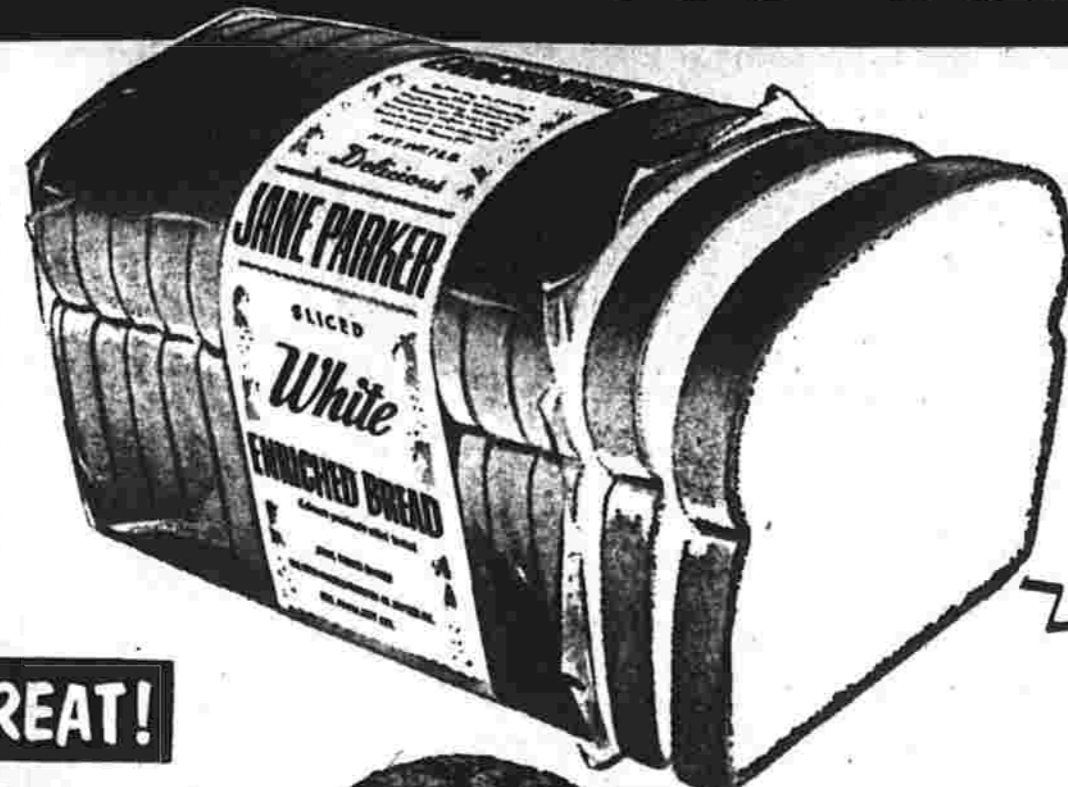

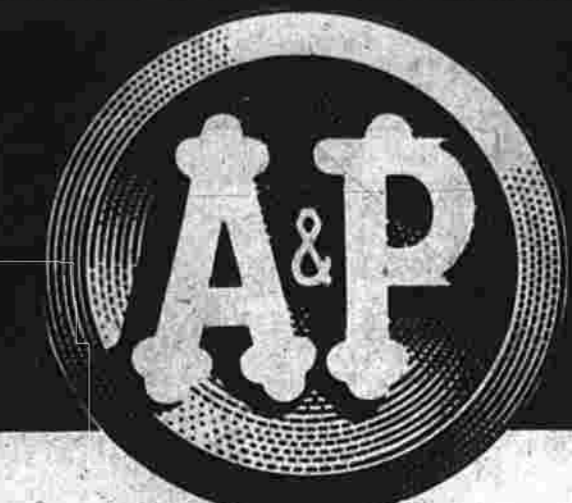

San Francisco (AP) - The Army is sending more and more men with emotional disorders back to duty with a method of treatment only now coming into widespread use: group therapy.
