The Girard Verdict
The decision in the William Girard case is finally in. For killing a woman brass picker on an American ship flying in Japan last January, the 22-year-old Army cadet received a life sentence, given a 3-year suspended sentence. This ends—unless an appeal is taken—the celebrated case that had dominated the front pages of two nations, involved the President, the State Department and the United States Supreme Court, and brought the status-of-forces treaty under new fire.
Actually, the shooting itself was a relatively minor, if regrettable, incident, similar to others that had occurred on American flagships in Japan. It only became an international incident after the news of the shooting was made public. Girard was tried by a Japanese court and a certain number of Americans who feel that American justice is the only kind there is, are protesting, just as loudly as he is being tried by a Japanese court.
Actually, Girard and his brother, who led the fight against a Japanese trial for the soldier, should be thanking their lucky stars William was turned over to trial. If he had ever faced an Army court martial, it's a sure bet the sentence would have been far stiffer than the one meted out by the Japanese court.
And although the shooting and the pulling and hauling over jurisdiction provided anti-American elements in Japan and elsewhere with new ammunition, the trial and the authority it received may have served some useful purpose. For one thing, it proved a Bulwark Court ruling that the United States can waive jurisdiction over its servicemen under the status-of-forces treaty if it has with nations where American forces are stationed.
For another, it demonstrated that Americans need not fear cruel and inhuman punishment from a foreign court, even one in far Japan. As a matter of fact, there are hundreds of American servicemen who can attest to the leniency of Japanese courts. But not only now has a case involving a serviceman ever received so much attention in this country.
As for Girard, Americans have no reason to be proud of him or to cheer about the up-and-down-wrist type of sentence he received. Even if he did not intend to kill the woman scoundrel, and no one says he did, his action in entering her within range of his grenade launcher and then firing a spent cartridge at her was criminal to the degree of stupidity and childish cruelty it reflected.
We fervently hope his home town of Ottawa, Ill., does not give him a hero's welcome when he returns. The kindest thing could be to let him try to forget.

A Thwarted Convention
Sixty-five of this country's most prosperous gentlemen, all driving or being driven in Lincoln, Imperial and Cadillac, converged on the town of Apalachicola, Fla. Thursday for a special convention. A distinguished host, who happens to be one of those franchise-less-for-a-famous soft drink brand had opened his mansion to them for their discussions. But, among all the franchises represented at this convention that was probably the only one which was legitimate. Nevertheless, the meeting was peaceful in intent, as was proved by the fact that all 65 had checked into their rooms before their journey, and its purpose was, by all guesses, a constructive program, one and the interests of peace and conservation of human life. For all such innocents, however, the convention was broken up and its guests told to leave town. It seems that this was a convention of gangsters, from all over the country.
And the best guess as to what they were trying to do has to be that they were about to discuss a potential partition of the empire left leaderless by the lamentable death of Albert Anastasia in a barber's chair.
In fact, one of the convention's publicity representatives managed, before he was chased out of town, to plant the idea that these gangsters had come to the civilized conference that too much murder was being done for business, and not live and let live and prosper?
Here it seems to us, we had a somewhat touching example of that "togetherness" which is so often labeled the solution of our modern problems. All these lonely, desperate gangsters, in their Cadillac, Imperials and Lincolns, were making an innocent effort to find a common denominator, a formula for peaceful coexistence. It may have been the finest moment of all their lives—or might have been, if the rude forces of the law had let it materialize. Whose fault will it be, if they now back-slide and start murdering each other again? They tried their best to make gangsters, a legitimate, responsible profession, and the world just didn't understand.
Volcano Eruption Gauged
Evidence has been found by New Zealand scientists that the crater on Rangitoto Island in Auckland harbor erupted less than 100 years before the British settlement of the island. Offshore Oil Again
The Eisenhower administration is seeking partial repudiation of a campaign pledge the President never should have made in the first place, but a pledge that has already been implemented by an Act of Congress.
It concerns the question of offshore oil rights beyond the low water mark and who should have those important rights—the federal government or the free citizen states. During the 1952 campaign, when the so-called tide-lands oil dispute was in full swing, General Eisenhower first opposed and then endorsed the state's position. Hal Boyle A Veteran Producer Diagnoses Hollywood

New York (AP) — One of the favorite jokes as Hollywood producers is that after a hard day of wrestling with the problems of turning out a movie, they come home to meet his question from one of their own children: "Pop, what do you really do?"

Producers, who aren't sure on some days themselves just what they have or haven't accomplished are a bit at a loss as to how to explain their job.

The children and other movie fans know what a star, a writer, or a director does. But a producer is to a movie what an editor is to a magazine, said Arthur Hornblow Jr., a real pro in his field. "He puts it together."

Hornblow, who is 64, balding, dark-eyed and quite vocal, has been an Army lieutenant, a writer, a First World War and a lawyer. But he has also produced some 40 to 50 pictures. They range from "Ruggles of Red Gap" to "The Light in the Piazza" and "The Sign of the Cross."

He has some strong opinions about the role of producers and the present plight and future of Hollywood, which he loves and thinks has a real impact for good in the world.

Let us start with the public's attitude toward producers, which annoys him.

"Too many people have the idea that producers are foreign illiterates... and their objective is vulgarity," he said.

"This is probably our fault. Hollywood can sell pictures, but it can't sell itself. It suffers from the poorest institutional publicity I know of."

"A producer doesn't aim at vulgarity. He tries his damndest to make the best picture he can."

Actually, there are 143 members of the Screen Producers Guild, and they make 80 per cent of the movies made in this country.

"Of that number more than 100 have been to college, and 37 are American-born."

"Only three never went beyond grammar school, and one of them is in my opinion, as cultured as any man I ever met."

"All races, religions and political points of view are evenly divided among producers as in any representative segment of the American community."

Ann's producers phone-mad, luncheon-addicted, party-crazy?

"I have only two phones on my desk," replied Hornblow. "And one is private. It is for the use of my wife."

"The number of your phones isn't as important as the efficiency of your secretary."

"We do go to a lot of lunches, but we use luncheons as we use phones—to conduct business. The same is true of Hollywood parties."

"The reason for a Hollywood party is not to hold an orgy—but to do business."

"It's more like a Quaker meeting. The men and women separate immediately."

"The women talk about their children, their cooks, their plans to visit Europe. The men talk business, make contacts, settle business."

"It's 15 minutes at one party, when I was preparing to make 'Kismet' I got Ingrid Bergman and Charles Boyer to play, too."

Bridge Authority To Pay Overtime

Hartford, Nov. 20 (AP) — The Greater Hartford Bridge Authority yesterday authorized payment of overtime on a state highway department job in order that Founders Bridge may be opened this year.

At the same time the authority announced it expects to open the new Windsor-South Windsor span Dec. 16.

Right or wrong, Hornblow feels that has come this way from Hollywood in a long time.

**Regional District 8
Heisler Asks
School Board
For Teacher**

Hebron, Nov. 20 (Special). — The problem of an additional teacher and the need for additional teaching assistance was brought before the Regional District 8 Board of Education tonight at the home of Christopher Heisler, superintendent. Dr. Heisler reported that the school board has already reached an agreement with the regional board that the teachers are carrying a heavy teaching load which allows them very little time for study and preparation.

He presented two examples: Nathan Gatchel, an English and social studies instructor, has only two free periods per week and also supervises nine classes; Miss Vera M. Taylor, home economics instructor, has 147 minutes for courses and has no free periods.

Dr. Heisler asked the board to authorize the hiring of an additional teacher, stating that a mathematics instructor was available. The recommended teacher has been substituting at the regional school and is qualified to take over junior high school classes in math which would free another teacher for the oversubscribed senior high school classes.

The additional teacher would also provide some relief for other teachers from their heavy schedules. At present the budget for the teaching staff is \$3,600, an additional sum of \$3,600 would be required for a substitute teacher.

Following a suggestion by the treasurer, Stephen Dugan, the board voted to refer the matter to the regional board for their consideration and to be discussed at the next meeting.

One reason for the oversubscribed and heavy schedules is the fact that the school is taking five courses. Hebron who said that it had been estimated that the school would have five students would be taking five courses rather than four.

However, a recent study of the class assignments has shown that approximately 60 per cent of the students are taking five courses.

The board also reviewed and approved recommendations for Home Economics equipment totaling \$7,848.35, presented by subcommittee members, Mrs. Peter Crawford of Marlborough and Mrs. Raymond H. House of Andover.

The estimates had originally been submitted by Mrs. Taylor, who was commended by subcommittee members for her selection which she said would show ways to help in several areas.

The board also approved the installation of additional fluorescent lighting fixtures in the multi-purpose area of the Home Economics department since this room will be used for instruction. Joseph Carroll, clerk of the works, was authorized to request the architect to obtain a firm bid on the electrical fixtures and to prepare a change order.

Extra Janitor Hired

Dr. Heisler announced that William Porter of Hebron has been hired as the third full-time janitor for the school. Porter had served as a part-time janitor previous to the Board's approval of an additional full-time man.

The board voted to hire William Leary for snow removal on the school driveway. Leary will also be hired by the town of Hebron to clear the school road built by the three towns with State road funds. He will be paid \$10 per hour for a large truck and two men for snow removal and also for stashing, plus whatever cost may be involved for gas.

Blackboards to Be Replaced

The board also voted to have the blackboards in the school changed to conform with the architect's specifications. Those that have been installed are of a light-green color. A credit of \$8,290 was given to the architect for the fixtures and to prepare a change order.

Chairman John H. Veonans said he expects to have all the data necessary for the State hardship grant submitted by this weekend with the exception of the official enumeration of children from each town.

Doctor Says**

Retirement should be given advance thought. By EDWIN R. JORDAN, M.D.

Although everyone grows older at the same rate of speed, the signs of advancing years generally appear gradually, unobtrusively and differ from person to person.

Some activities, for example, which come easily at 25 are impossible or unwise at 50. Others which can be performed at 30 are undesirable at 50.

It seems to me that there are two aspects of aging which everyone should consider. One is the recognition of physical changes and the need to adjust to them in daily living. The other is the conscious preparation for certain changes in living patterns in the later years.

From the physical point of view, age brings some slowing of many functions. One is the loss of a lessened ability for some of the body tissues and functions to withstand stress.

For example, the muscles, including the heart muscle, no longer stand as much strain in later years as they do in youth. Therefore, it is foolish to take as strenuous exercises as was possible in youth.

Such special care as hearing and vision become more acute and adjustment of varying degrees to these changes is needed. It is also characteristic for the memory to weaken, particularly for memory of recent events. Many older people show this by repeating stories to the same audience simply because they do not remember that they did so before.

Assuming that one lives long enough, the older years are a challenge to everyone. Mothers who have been with their children are inevitably relieved of this line-of-concerning memory. Some planning on what they will do when this time comes in order to occupy themselves in a sane manner is in order.

The prospect of change in the habits of work and play. Retirement can be a welcome relief from a heavy duter or it can be a blow which some men and women have to overcome.

More generally believed that more thought should be given to retirement advance. There are many books, pamphlets, most of which can be found in the nearest public library, which should prove of great assistance when consulted years before expected retirement.

The simple matter of growing older is so inevitable that it should be taken philosophically. But drawbacks as it does have can be lessened by careful planning and better understanding of what the advantages which it also can offer.

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3 State Papers Cited On Coverage for AP

New Orleans, Nov. 20 (AP)—Three Connecticut newspapers won national citations today for outstanding news and newspaper coverage of three big stories—each a tragedy in a different setting. The awards were made at the annual convention of the Associated Press Managing Editors in New York. They went to the Danbury News-Times, the Hartford Times and the Meriden Record. The News-Times and Record for news coverage and the Times for picture coverage.

Respectively the story which associated Press papers throughout the country told of death on a highway; death in line of duty; death in a crowded tenement house.

The awards were for the year beginning Oct. 1, 1956. The Danbury-News Times went outside its normal area to provide coverage of a murder. The award-winning story, moreover, made the story immediately available to fellow Associated Press members long before the News-Times itself could publish its own edition. The citation praised the News-Times for "splendid cooperation on Dec. 5, 1956, in the deaths of six students in an auto accident at Patterson, N. Y."

Editor Stephen Collins was first AP fully and rapidly from across the state line when the News-Times went outside its normal area to provide relay point to the AP bureau in New Haven. With Lauff at the accident scene was his brother, Robert, who helped gather material for the story. Is It Highway or Building? Artful Tokyo Pairs Them

By REVE GEORGES INAGAKI

Tokyo (AP)—The longest building in Tokyo is a road—and the city's only expressway is a building.

The Oriental paradox is the result of combining a two-story building with an elevated highway; the road runs on the roof and the building curves as dictated by the course of the road.

Arising from the bed of a drained canal, the building-highway will run for almost a mile through the heart of downtown Tokyo.

While construction of the new highway has created criticism and some accidents, no one argues that the shopping center and elevated highway are anything but a great asset to this metropolis which is the world's largest city.

This is also the view of the city planners who visualize this short, elevated highway as a model network to be constructed at an estimated cost of 200 million dollars in the next ten years.

Planners Will Hear Subdivision Request

At the same time, property owners in the adjacent Bowers Tract have asked that their property be divided into a 20-foot building line.

The Bowers tract homes were built on lots with 90 foot frontage. Since they were built, the street frontage has been changed to 100 feet. Frontage required in AA Zone is 120 feet.

Atty. Harold W. Garrity, representing Bryan, said that his clients plan to develop the property in 100 foot lots in compliance with the existing A Zone of adjacent property that houses in AA Zone. The Orchard Hill Assn. representing homeowners in the area, has submitted an application asking that property of Deming St., Avery St., Filbert St., Concord Rd. and Baldwin Rd. be upgraded to city lots at the latest in 35 years.

Scheduled to be heard tonight are applications by Alexander Jarvis for a change from AA Zone to C-1 on property at W. Center St. at Broken Rd.

Jarvis has also asked to change to Business Zone II property at W. Main St. and Adams St. now in Residence Zone A.

Highways Blamed For Industry Ills

Hartford, Nov. 20 (AP)—The president of the New England Shipper-Carrier Conference says that the industrial growth of the State's major cities will be stunted unless steps are taken to meet the traffic needs of highway freight shippers.

The prediction was made last night by Sidney B. Maras of Somerville, Mass., before a session of the city carrier conference, which ends today.

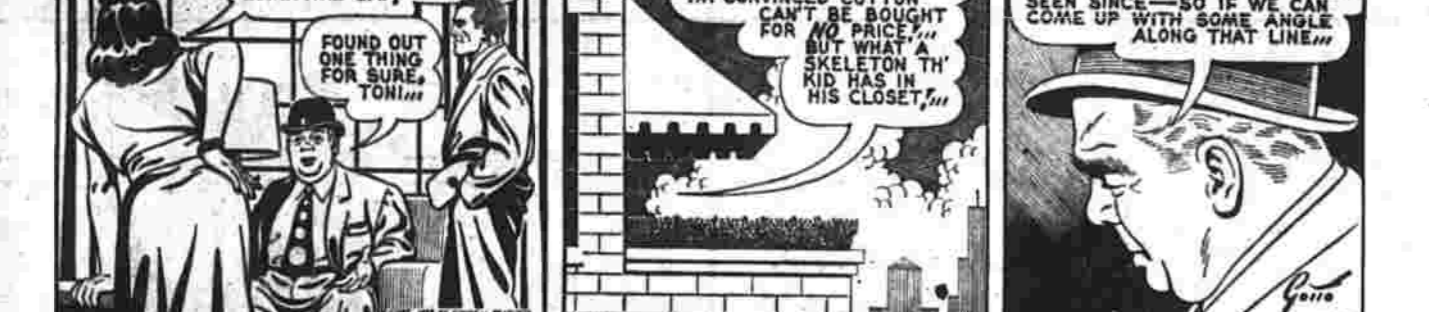

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U. S. Moves to Jail Waste Carting Boss

He is reputedly the head of one of the biggest rackets operating in New York City, and he is being investigated by the district attorney, Irving Neumann, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in New York, Manhattan, New Jersey and Connecticut. He is a racketeer and a criminal."
