Concern Expressed Over Money Policy

Chicago, Nov. 22 (AP)—Rep. Rains (D-Ill.) expressed concern today that the administration's hard money policy might bring on a recession.

"The reaction of the Federal Reserve Board in lowering the re-discount rate is a heartening sign that the money managers may be coming to their senses," Rains said.

"I am fearful, however, that their action may prove to be too little and too late."

Eight of the 12 district reserve banks have announced cuts in their discount rate from 3 1/2 to 3 per cent. The other four are expected to do likewise. The rate is what it costs member banks to borrow from the federal reserve.

In a speech prepared for a convention of the United States Savings and Loan League, Rains said:

"Frankly, I am afraid that too many executives in high places, both in business, government, and the financial world, have a pre-occupation with the inflation side of our economic situation which amounts, in my judgment, to a monomania."

School Troops Proved Costly At Little Rock

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 22 (AP)—A source close to Gov. Orval Faubus today estimated that the Federal Government spent \$4,326,000 to keep troops on duty here for the first six weeks of the school year.

Right now, out of every 100 children entering first grade, only 50 finish high school, 13 graduate from college, and only 3 become engineers or scientists.

He calls for more research to find embryo scientists early, for more women to become scientists, for teaching that awakens rather than deadens interest and curiosity, for financial aid for capable students, better pay for teachers.

"We must help kids overcome a fear of studying science," says Dr. J. Allen Hynek, of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass.

"We are in peril of ignorance long before we are in peril of high places in government," says Dr. Joel Pritchard, of the University of California.

Citizens generally and statesmen, too, must be more aware of what science is and does, others declare.

Politicians who wouldn't dream of linking with an alarm clock do not hesitate to recommend the removal of all sorts of gears and governors from the complex mechanism of society," says Dr. George R. Harrison, dean of technology at the University of Massachusetts.

Military defense or survival de-

pends more and more on science. New ideas, new weapons, science is the cradle for methods of defeating communism in continental Europe.

Today and tomorrow's challenge is as great for the social sciences as it is for the natural sciences. More basic research is needed to win this knowledge.

This is critical. How will men and nations use their powers and knowledge from science—for good or bad, to destroy or to build the new things yet to come by good or bad?

No one can say, remarks Dr. Lee DuBridge, president of Caltech. Things aren't good or bad, it is only people who are bad, and some of them certainly always will be bad.

Dr. DuBridge declares these new things are going to come anyway, for no force on earth can keep men from thinking, from inventing, from exploring.

Nigeria Educator Drops In On Bolton Teacher Institute

By DORIS D'ITALIA

Bolton, Nov. 22 (Special) — An unscheduled visitor provided a memorable closing for a special education event held at the local school yesterday.

He was Dr. Ben Okaba, provincial education officer from Eastern Nigeria, who spoke briefly to the Elementary Institute for Eastern Connecticut, instituted by the Department of Classroom Teachers of the Connecticut Education Assn.

Speaking in flawless English, a tongue he had admitted he used as a foreign language, Dr. Okaba displayed a facility and ease of manner that could be the envy of many who use English as their native language.

He opened his remarks with humor as he hooked his thumb through his suspenders and remarked that he didn't know if anyone present was from Texas but, here he paused, his country was as big as Texas and Oklahoma combined.

Dr. Okaba explained he was in the United States on a UNESCO fellowship to observe the principles and practices of education here. He has visited in Michigan, Illinois and Pennsylvania and is now concluding his observations in Connecticut.

Heads School Systems

Dr. Okaba, who comes from a country of 35 million people, in charge of 400 elementary schools in Eastern Nigeria, has just finished a 300 square mile, roughly the size of the state of Connecticut, before the assembled audience.

He said that he had more experience than his record of six years.

Asking that "you do a little more thinking about the so-called under-privileged children of this country," he said that he was very richly marked by his children, don't come to the conference at this time if you are at the local school and you have seen your own children don't appreciate what they have."

The teachers enjoyed his remark that if the children were to go back to Nigeria with him for 20 months, the teachers' job would be much easier. He said he had told the teachers they could be teachers in the children, and he developed in the children, and he contributed under "through education like this."

Nigerian teachers, he said, maintain a high standard of living in this country. He said that he had about time you people came over to my country."

The wind filled the air over Los Angeles with a gray dust that closely resembled the mantle of smog often seen over the area.

Services Have Lot to Learn at South Pole

McMurdo Sound, Antarctica, Nov. 22 (AP)—The Armed Services have much to learn about building and operating stations in the frigid Antarctic, says a veteran explorer, Sir Hubert Wilkins, after a month's inspection of the U.S. Naval Air Facility here.

Sir Hubert, who spent considerable time talking to the 300 men inhabiting the main American operating base 820 miles from the South Pole, found it lacked the neatness of a military camp, was below average in morale and needed changes in living conditions and efficiency in both Arctic and Antarctic operations.

The explorer, who at 69 will keep pace with younger men, is a consultant of the U.S. Army on cold weather operations and survival. He came here seeking ways to improve living conditions and efficiency in both Arctic and Antarctic operations.

Although a native and citizen of Australia, Sir Hubert has lived in the United States more than 20 years. He makes his home in New York City.

No Improvement

So far as human comfort is concerned, he said, McMurdo is no improvement over the camp at Roud Amundsen, the Norwegian who reached the South Pole in 1911, and of Robert E. Peary's British explorer who reached the pole, behind Amundsen, but perished on the return trip.

Sir Hubert said he found cold floors and hot ceilings in the huts used for living quarters at McMurdo. He also found the temperature 42 degrees above zero. The floor in itself was at or below freezing. At the same time the temperature at the height of a double bunk in that building neared 90 degrees, he reported.

McMurdo also is wanting in group recreational facilities, the explorer said. He noted the absence of a recreation hall where men could participate in card games. The camp also needs a library with a quiet reading room, he added. The present library is in the main room of the busy administration building.

One of his findings was that the food, although plentiful, is on the starchy side and too wet, with excessive water in some vegetables and meat. He said this probably was unavoidable because most food is the frozen type which can be left outdoors in packages.

Morale, he added, is somewhat below average, or "about what might be expected in this transitional stage when new men are arriving and those who overwintered are pinning to get home."

The base is not exactly in an apple pie order that one might expect in military establishments in this or a more temperate zone. But the work goes on under a good administration. Crowded quarters lack comfort an obvious convenience, and the hygiene is no better than it should be.

"But undoubtedly value lies behind the experience that is being gained at this Naval Air Facility Base and in its operation."

Laboratory Aide Gives Fatal Dose

Houston, Tex., Nov. 22 (AP)—A 45-year-old laboratory technician last night sobbed that she mistakenly fed a woman patient 20 ounces of deadly sodium cyanide thinking it was a solution for diabetes tests. The patient, 51, died.

Mrs. Emily Nash said she administered the solution to Mrs. Margaret Van Alstine, 67.

Mrs. Van Alstine had called on Mrs. Nash's employer, Dr. Joseph H. W. Rodgers, and returned for the tests at his direction.

Detective H. W. Rodgers said no charge would be filed but the case would be referred to a grand jury.

Rodgers said Mrs. Nash told him she prepared what she thought was a diabetes solution Wednesday with crystals from a bottle which she discarded in a waste basket. The bottle was covered and found to be labeled sodium cyanide.

He said Mrs. Nash told him she took a blood sample from Mrs. Van Alstine and then poured two ounces of the solution into a glass for her drink.

She quoted Mrs. Van Alstine as saying, "Oh, that tastes horrible." The patient then drank the rest of the solution and fell from her chair, Mrs. Nash told detectives.

"I depended on me that I might have given her the wrong solution," she wept.

Dr. West arrived a few minutes later and administered an antidote. "But she was already dead," he said.

Mrs. Van Alstine made her home near Big Rapids, Miss., but spent the winters with relatives here. She was a widow.

Sweden Plans Reactor
