Hartford, Nov. 29 (AP)—Albert Newfield, 72, business and civic figure and chairman of the board of directors of the Hartman Tobacco Company, died suddenly this morning at his home in West Hartford. He was a representative in the Legislature from the city in the late 1920s, a director of the Hartford Chamber of Commerce and a member of the city's original Field Control Commission. Newfield had lived in Hartford for 30 years and had headed the Hartman Tobacco Co. since 1928. He came here from Danbury. He had been active in the tobacco business since 1920. He leaves two sons, Albert Jr. in Newfield and Richard A. in Newfield, both of West Hartford; a daughter, Mrs. Marian Newfield Grad of Elmhurst, N. J.; and seven grand-children. The funeral will be held Sunday.

**18 Farmers Soon to Get Relief Loans**

State Treasurer John Ottaviano Jr. has reported 18 approved applications for loans under the state's new drought relief law in his office.

He said the applications are from farmers in Tolland County and four of the first approved from New London County.

The State Treasurer said that the Tolland County applications are broken down this way: Four from Hebron, three from Columbia, and one each from Andover, Bolton, Coventry, Ellington, Somers and Tolland. No applications have yet been received from Willington, Union, Mansfield or Vernon.

The loans will be granted, Ottaviano said, as soon as notes and certificates of loan are printed. He has drafted copies of both and put them out to bid.

**Low Interest Loan**  
The new law, passed in a special session of the Legislature in September, allows a farmer to borrow up to \$5,000 at 1 1/2 per cent interest over an 8-year period, provided he can show a 40 per cent loss in hay, grain, corn silage or cash crops.

The loan application is approved the farmer will enter into agreement with the State Treasurer, signing a loan and a certificate of lien against his property.

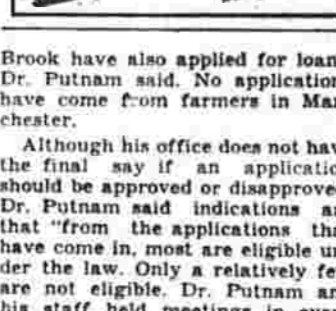
To apply for the loan, a farmer must fill out a 3-page form available in the office of his county agriculture agent. The form is returned to the agent's office and turned over to a 3-man county committee, appointed to study the merits of the application. The form is sent to the University of Connecticut where it is studied by Dr. Paul Putnam, head of the Agriculture Economics Dept. and returned to the county committee. If approved, the form is then sent to the State Treasurer, where the loan is made.

**Apprehensions Mount**  
Dr. Putnam's office has received a total of 223 applications from Windham County. The highest throughout the State. The highest number, 81, came from farmers in Windham County. Dr. Putnam said, as the area hardest hit by last summer's drought.

Although his office does not have the final say if an application should be approved or disapproved, Dr. Putnam said, indications are that "from the applications that have come in, most are eligible under the law. Only a relatively few are not eligible."

**Two More Held In Morals Case**

Storrs, Nov. 29 (AP)—Two arrests yesterday by State Police investigators alleged moral violations on the University of Connecticut campus have brought the total of arrests to eight.

The most recent arrests were Mrs. Benninger, 68, Mansfield, charged with causing delinquency

of children; and Mrs. Helen Sikora, 19, Storrs, charged with contributing to the delinquency of minors. Both women were released under \$100 bonds for court appearance next week.

The first arrests Sunday followed complaints by parents of two girls, aged 14 and 15. Authorities said no university students were involved.

Mrs. Benninger was identified by police as the wife of one of six policemen arrested previously, Joseph Benninger, 39.

The alleged offenses took place in the Storrs area, where a police station's kitchen help, police said. The youngest of the persons arrested was 17.

**Rebels Set Fires To Cuban Sugar**

Havana, Cuba, Nov. 29 (AP)—Fires were reported sweeping over a wide area of sugar cane fields last night in southeast Cuba—set by rebels trying to bring down the government by ruining the sugar crop and causing economic hardship.

The fires were reported in Oriente Province, center of rebel forces. Rebels have been led by Fidel Castro who launched the first offensive several weeks ago. Sugar industry spokesmen in Havana predicted that the burning would fail to ruin Cuba's main export crop.

**Blaze Under Control**

Los Angeles, Nov. 29.—The big brush and timber fire in the San Gabriel mountains, which burned for four miles of foothill country, munitis 20 miles from Los Angeles, has been brought under control. The announcement was made yesterday as turkey dinners were being served to some 1,000 men still on the lines. Some of the men were flown by helicopter to crews on remote ridges.

**White House Fumbled Again on Ike Reports**

Washington, Nov. 29 (AP)—After each President Eisenhower's three illnesses, the White House first gave wrong information or only part of the truth and let it stand for hours. Later it told the full story.

This happened after his heart ailment and little attack and now this time when the White House attempted to tell the real story at last, it made a mess of it.

Eisenhower had his heart attack in Denver early on Sept. 24, 1955. At 2 a.m. the White House physician, Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, was called to Eisenhower's side.

At 8 a.m. Snyder announced the President had a "mild digestive upset." At noon that day Snyder said the President's condition was "good" and again said he had a "digestive upset."

At 2:35 p.m. Murray Snyder, then Eisenhower's assistant press secretary, told newsmen the President had had a heart attack.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, on vacation, flew to Denver and took over. He did a masterful job thereafter.

Eisenhower had a history of letter inflammation in the small intestine. He felt a stomach upset "slight dose of milk of magnesia."

Eisenhower felt no improvement. At 2 a.m. Dr. Snyder went to the White House and stayed all night.

At 8:30 a.m. Hagerty announced and headed his "upset stomach" Eisenhower died of pneumonia.

When he was asked if he would have handled "White House" announcements on Eisenhower's illness differently than Mrs. Wheaton, Hagerty said: "No, I don't think so."

**U.S. Missile Status Poor--Not Hopeless**

The CIA was quoted by one source as reporting the Russian subs could launch missiles while still submerged. The weapons were described as of the "cruise" type—a guided missile slower than a ballistic missile.

The U.S. Navy has a small number of submarines equipped with the Regulus, a submersible missile capable of carrying a nuclear warhead up to about 800 miles.

In addition, the Navy is developing the Polaris, an intermediate range ballistic missile (IRBM) designed to be fired from beneath the surface of the ocean. However, development of the Polaris has been described as being behind that of the Army's Jupiter IRBM and the Air Force's Thor IRBM.

Secretary of Defense McNamara announced Wednesday that orders had been issued for production of the Jupiter and the Thor. He said this while testifying before the subcommittee which later released its hearings until Dec. 13. This decision appeared to have received an Army-Air Force rivalry. Both services had sought to gain acceptance of their own missiles.

McNamara said he was confident, as Vice President Nixon told several news President Eisenhower, who

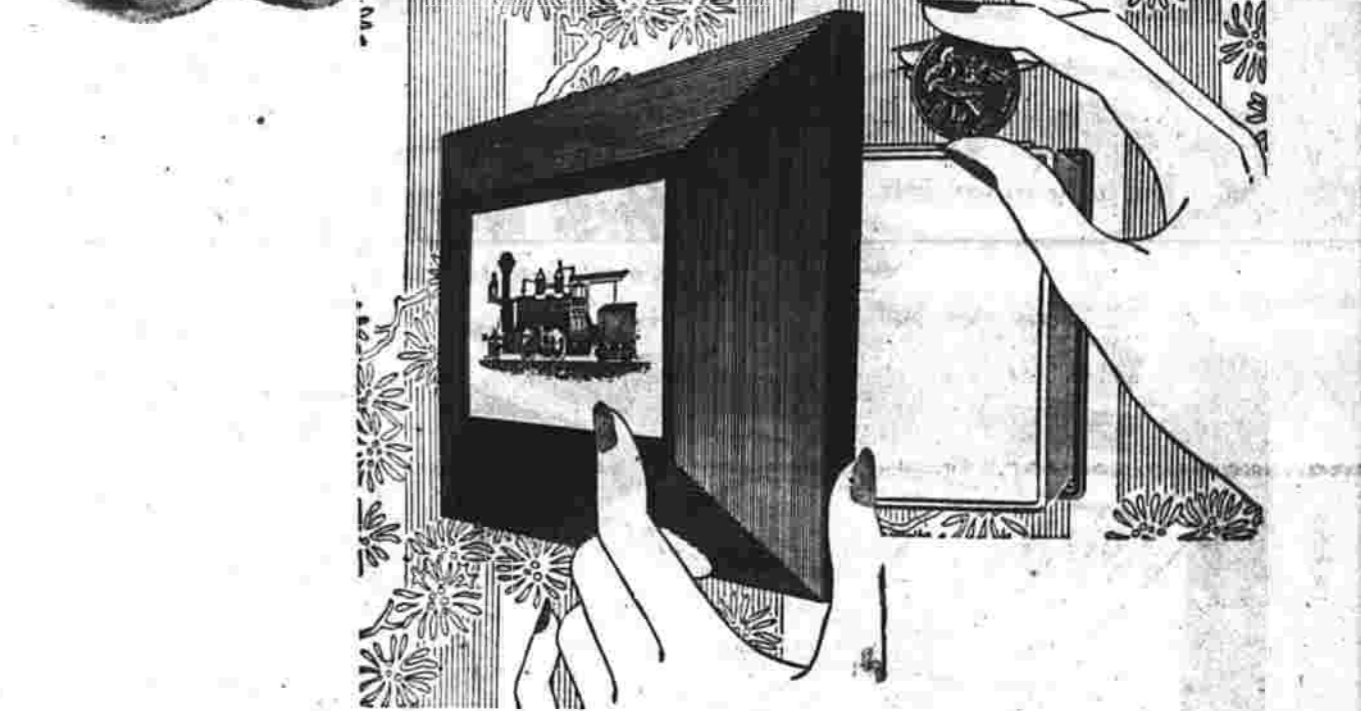

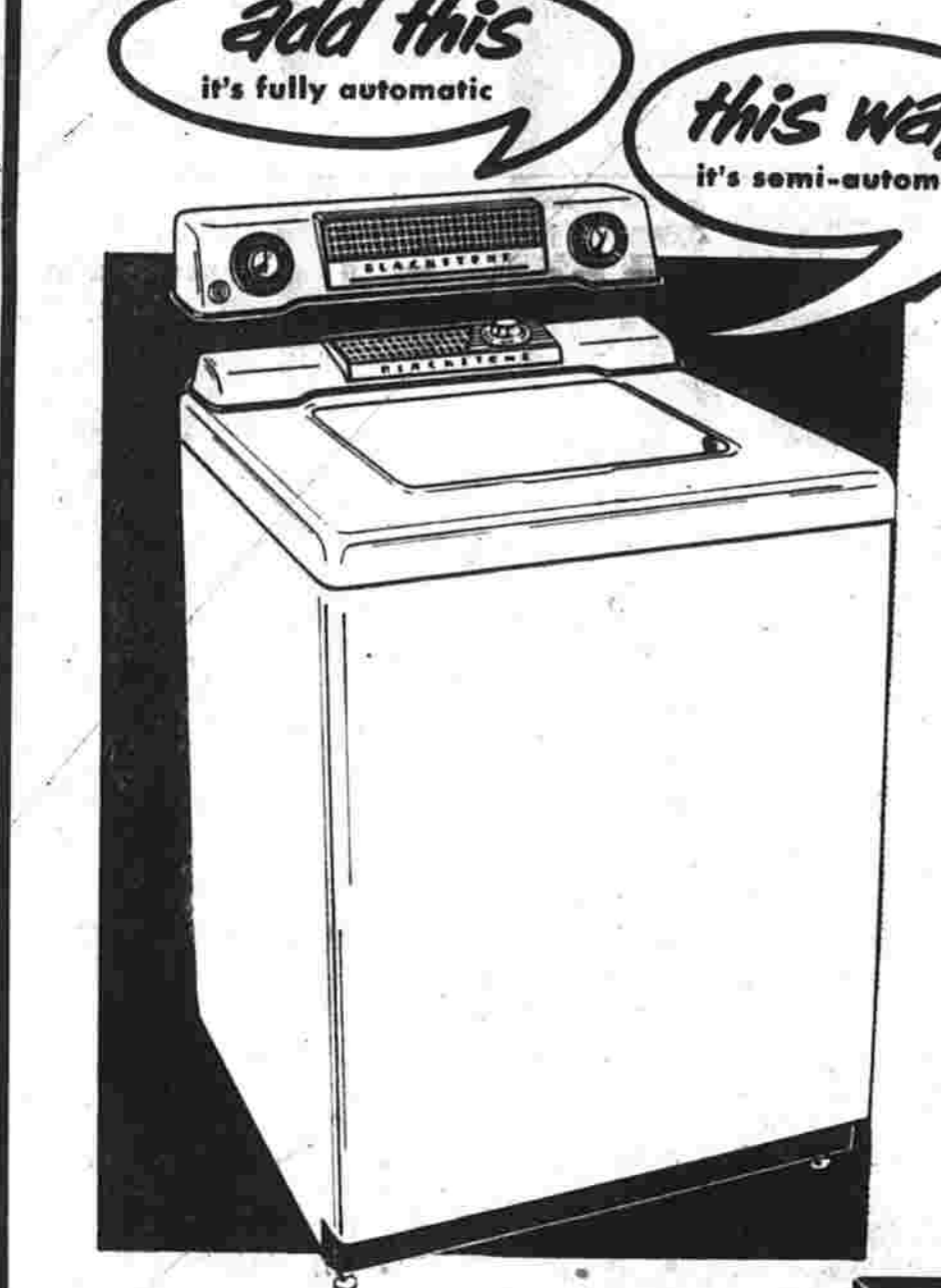

## Next Move Undecided In Judgeship Issue

Counsel for Atty. Gen. Karp, who failed to appear at the Court bid to unseat Judge Westey Gryk from the Manchester Town Court bench, has not yet decided whether to seek a reargument of the case.

Atty. Gen. Lesner, who represents the law partner in the suit, said today he had not yet seen the high court decision which said that Gryk was the true judge of the local court.

"As the judge is one who is legally appointed to the office, it is the duty of the court to see that the person who is acting as a judge and whose decisions have the same force as those of a 'de jure' judge," Lesner said.

He said he would decide whether to file a motion to set aside the decision, which was issued Wednesday.

Although declaring Gryk the de jure judge of the Manchester Town Court, the State Supreme Court ruled that none of the six other judges involved in the minor court judgeship controversy had a lawful right to be appointed.

Recognizing Appointees

However, Chief Justice Kenneth Wynne said later that, as administrative officers of Connecticut's court system, he will recognize Governor Blodgett's 1957 appointees as city judges in Hartford and Meriden.

The court said that the statute base on which Gryk's interim appointment could be made by the Governor, it also ruled that Gryk's term of office, as set by subsequent statutes, runs for four years, ending in 1960.

The court decided, there was no vacancy to which Karp could be appointed. Karp and the other 1957 appointees contested that the 1955 appointments expired last July 1.

In the case of Meriden and Hartford, however, the court held there was no provision in the statutes creating those courts for any interim appointments.

The court did not say who the legal judges were in those minor courts or how new appointments could be made.

But the court barred any state-wide interpretation of its decision by saying, "We do not hereby answer any questions pertaining to the offices of any judge other than the parties to this action."

If a motion for reargument in the Hartford and Meriden cases is filed, it will have to be filed by Atty. Gen. Lesner, counsel for the 1957 appointees in those cities.

Atty. Gen. Lesner, who represented the 1955 appointees, said today he does not plan to ask for a reargument.

New York (U. S. P. S.)—This is a lonely town for people who are alone. Mostly people who come in for people alone but this is the town I know.

Believe me, the bigger the town, the lonelier the lonely are. A man alone, the only human being on a desert, may feel lonely. But he will feel more lonely among 5,000,000 human beings if he has nobody to talk to.

If you have nobody to talk to except a cactus plant and the cactus plant won't talk, you may feel lonely. But if you don't take it personally, if you can find somebody to talk to among 5,000,000 human beings, you do take it personally. This is the way of the lonely—loneliness—painful, profound, abiding.

I have made sort of a study of loneliness in this town—along the streets in the libraries, in the public parks, in the restaurants, and in the cafes which follow have the single virtue of fact. They are lonely. No novelist dreamed them up. A reporter found them.

To the library at 42nd St.—That's the one called the lions in front. A man called Harold came almost every night, after work. He made a slight pretense of consulting technical journals but mostly Harold talked with the ladies at the information desk.

City officials in New Delhi and the not-so-sacred bullock, and the streets in the city are a scene of suffering for humans and even worse for the cattle just wandering about with their poor, wretched, and where they can find it, and some are mired in the mud of the countryside, outside New Delhi.

Low Founds Used

City officials continued to sound out strays put them in "cow pounds" similar to "dog pounds" in other countries. The pounds housed 9,000 animals last year, and it seems almost every cow, bull, or water buffalo gets caught up there.

In the pounds, the cows get food of a sort without scrupling for it. Life isn't pleasant, though, a veterinarian said recently after a tour that the officials of the cattle pounds... is appalling.

Hindu religious law forbids killing a cow, but harsh treatment is permitted. Many bullocks pulling carts through city streets have been killed by drivers who twisted them to get more speed.

After a cow is put in the pound, the owner has the problem of getting it out. Then his cow stays in the pound. Officials, from time to time, take the cow into the contraband. Most seem to return to the city.

City officials have a long range plan to place all the city's milk-giving cows and water buffaloes in a dairy farm outside New Delhi.

Born in the same thing, it turned out to be one of the biggest cattle roundups in Indian history—10,000 animals were pushed out of metropolitan Bombay.
