Barley said the rocket, although the smallest of the three, gives the most accurate velocity information from 9,000 to 18,000 m.p.h. in orbit. Barley said his company has named the rocket "Taurus" for a New Mexican Indian tribe now existing in New Mexico. Interest in religion appears to be at an all-time high, with church membership over 100 million, but church membership growth is outstripping population gains and denominations will have to build new churches at the rate of 2,000 a year for the next 20 years to keep up. Two many people speak vaguely of the need of "faith and religion," rather than of the real need of God, of a return to the Father. The wide-ranging report was prepared by the Rev. Dr. Rowell P. Barnes, associate general secretary of the National Council of Churches, following the third day of the week-long assembly of representatives of 30 Orthodox denominations with about 1 1/2 million members. One key committee, set up to draft the assembly's "message to the nation," is headed by a Division of Christian Education, an engineering company executive. The gathering last night got a message from President Eisenhower to speak up forthrightly on current problems to provide the guidance of religious insights. He said the council represents a "basic force" in the nation's life — the "spiritual strength and moral fiber of our people" — and it is up to churches to keep spiritual truths "ever before the eyes of our citizens." Various speakers, along with Dr. Barnes' report, also stressed denominations with about 27 1/2 million members in the nation.

Many were expected to attend this in Detroit, Walter P. were pointed to the idea that the President be granted the authority to give detailed information about weapons to Britain and other Allies. He already has authorized a preliminary meeting to discuss the NATO meeting information on missiles (missile nuclear warheads) and on war plans in general.
The proposed change in the law would not authorize the President to turn over complete atomic weapons.
Present law permits export of sensitive material for research and development projects, but with the proviso that it must not be used for weapons fabrication.
The United States by means of upper atomic, atmospheric equipment and other methods, has been monitoring Russian nuclear tests since 1948.
In that time this country has obtained a pretty fair idea of the technical know-how to build atomic bombs. It is evident that Russia already has knowledge of the technical details of atomic bombs and is not giving to its Allies.
The explanation was only a technical expansion of the authority, since an informal but confidentially held conversation appears to make a formal statement a certain possibility. It is indicated that the President will be able to make a formal statement to the Allies.
Stevenson said his views on the NATO proposal were submitted directly to Dulles in the form of a memorandum and in personal consultations.
