Appeals Unit Asks Teamsters' Ouster
Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 5.—The AFL-CIO Appeals Unit today expelled the giant Teamsters Union on corruption charges.
The AFL-CIO Appeals Committee rejected today a final appeal of the Teamsters Union to expunge its name from the union's constitution.
The Appeals Committee has recommended expulsion, arguing that the union's constitution and bylaws are "grossly corrupt and oppressive."
The union's final bid, a suit to void the expulsion, was rejected by the committee's rejection of the union's appeal.

Do Something And Then Yell
Washington, Dec. 5.—The House today passed a bill to force the Teamsters Union to expunge its name from its constitution.
The bill, H.R. 10000, was passed by a vote of 307 to 117.
The bill would require the union to expunge its name from its constitution within 30 days of the date of the bill's passage.

Launching Try Dismal Failure
Cape Canaveral, Fla., Dec. 6.—America's first satellite launching vehicle exploded in its stand today. The Pentagon said in Washington another test probably could not be held for about 30 days.
There were no casualties.
A spokesman at Vanguard headquarters gave these details of the misfire:
"Vanguard was launched after two seconds.
"The rocket fell back on the stand, toppled over toward the water (to the east) and exploded."
The ceremony was given out at 11:53 a.m.
The American attempt to put a little 34-pound test sphere into a globe-circling course 300 miles up came more than a month after Russia had sent a 1,000-pound satellite aloft, and more than two months after the Soviets launched their Sputnik I.

Dutch Citizens Told To Leave Indonesia
Jakarta, Indonesia, Dec. 5.—Indonesian police today told Dutch citizens to leave the country by Dec. 10.
The police said that the Dutch government had refused to accept the Indonesian government's offer to allow Dutch citizens to remain in the country for a limited period.

Public Losing Right to Know, Editor Claims
Harford, Dec. 5.—One of the vital rights of the American people, the right to know what is going on in the world, is being lost, says an editor of a local newspaper.
The editor, who is also a member of the American Society for Human Rights, said that the government is trying to keep the public in the dark about its activities.

Nikita Charges U.S. Part Of Sputnik I
Moscow, Dec. 5.—Communist party secretary Nikita Khrushchev charged today that the United States was part of the first Sputnik I satellite launch.
Khrushchev said that the United States had helped the Soviet Union to launch the satellite.

Doctors Undecided U.S. To Allow Captives' Kin To Visit China
Washington, Dec. 5.—The State Department today disclosed it will issue passports to relatives who may wish to visit American prisoners held in Communist China.
The department said that it will issue passports to the relatives of American prisoners who are held in Communist China.

120 Youths Get Proof of Legal Drinking Age
Harford, Dec. 5.—The State Liquor Control Commission today gave 120 Connecticut youths who were 21 years of age or older, proof of their legal drinking age.
The youths were given a small card which they can use to buy alcohol.

Plan Ignored by Ike As 'Missionary' for U.S.
Washington, Dec. 6.—Adlai Stevenson's plan to go to Paris to sweep the nation of a "missionary" was ignored by President Eisenhower, it was learned today.
Stevenson's plan was to go to Paris to meet with the French government and to discuss the situation in the Middle East.

Defense May Speed N-Plane for Prestige
Washington, Dec. 6.—Defense officials are trying to decide whether to race Russia for a prestige-establishing "first" in some form of atomic plane, or take more time to create one militarily useful.
A decision must be made in the next few months, it is said in responsible quarters today.
Some experts think any nuclear plane that could be built now would be too heavy and too slow for bombing. But they agree that even if it weren't the best, that such a plane would add to prestige.
The attention confronting the United States now is the fact that the Soviet Union is getting ahead in the development of a nuclear plane.

### Rockville Town, City Refuse to Waive Interest on LaPointe Taxes

Rockville, Dec. 6 (Special) — The town and city yesterday notified LaPointe Industries, Inc., that they cannot waive interest payments on the firm's back taxes.

In a letter to Jan H. Stillbach, the firm's president, First Selectman Edward H. Wilson and Mayor Herman G. Olson said the town and city "have been more than cooperative" in giving the company time to pay its taxes due in 1954-55. The company owes the nearly \$50,000 in taxes plus the interest not yet figured.

The two officials said the company has not even made token payment, although it had promised to do so.

Abraham Waiver — Stillbach had asked for a waiver of interest on taxes due in 1954-55. The company president claims reorganization of the firm has prevented unemployment and the growth of the company would have "lasting benefits to the town and city."

Stillbach also stated that there appeared to be mistakes in the tax assessments for the past few years. The town-city letter notes that the only request being made at the time by the firm is for a waiver of interest "in application of the points" the Stillbach letter mentioned.

Special legislative act permitted the town and city to postpone the collection of taxes from the firm for a 2-year period. Those taxes are now due, in addition to the 1956 taxes.

Freelance Sites Considered — Several sites for location of future freeshouses are being considered by the Vernon District Commissioners Robert F. Kingsbury, chairman, said today.

The commissioners last night reviewed a number of possible locations and are giving serious consideration to a few of them. Kingsbury said the commissioners hope to make a decision on at least one site by next month, and may select three sites for purchase. Their location was not revealed.

Present plans are to build a new freeshouse on one site in the spring to provide space for a tank truck which would be purchased. The District may also build a second freeshouse shortly thereafter and the third building would be delayed for the future.

Optimism Seen Despite — It appears today that the town will be able to get options on three lots needed to complete a proposed school site on Lake St.

Second Selectman Franklin G. Welles said today the title to the land, adjacent to the Maguire farm, will be clear Dec. 30.

The town already has an option on the Maguire farm and needs the three lots which adjoin it to complete the site. When the entire tract is under option, a town meeting will be held to vote on purchase of the site.

Police Reorganization — Mayor Herman G. Olson has reviewed plans to reorganize the Police Department after the new Republican Council is inaugurated in January.

Plans are to establish the position of police chief and fill it by competitive examination through Capt. Peter J. Dowagiewicz would remain as captain-in-charge of the office.

An executive officer for each shift would be provided. Det. Sgt. George Trapp would be made sergeant in more than name and another sergeant would be appointed. Additional police training would also be provided.

Vern-Ell to Meet — The Vern-Ell Association for Retarded Children will meet Monday at the Talcoville School where the special class is held. All interested parents and friends are invited to attend.

Scouts Plan Hike — All Scouts of Troop 88 planning to go on the overnight camping trip to the Vernon Elementary School tomorrow at 7 p.m. At a troop meeting held last night, Robert Bentley was awarded his tenderfoot pin.

Troop members have sold 250 boxes of ribbon candy and hope to reach the 500 mark soon.

### States Urged to Help In Federal Functions

Washington, Dec. 6 (AP) — A recommendation that states assume more responsibility in fields they share with the federal government won the approval today of a House of Representatives subcommittee studying federal tax functions.

A special committee of governors and federal officials recommended that the states carry more of the load in some jointly financed programs, in exchange for federal tax credits.

The committee was formed after June last, a study by House leaders that a study be made looking to transfer to the states of certain functions now performed wholly or in part by the federal government.

Rep. Fountain (D-N.C.), chairman of a House Government Operations Subcommittee on intergovernmental relations, declined to comment on the specific recommendations of the special committee. But in general, Fountain said he was encouraged by the apparent willingness of the states, as indicated in the report, to assume more responsibilities.

Rep. Hoffman (D-Mich.), a Republican on the subcommittee, also applauded the recommendations, saying that the entire program would be better cooperation for less money if they handle their own programs.

Washington, Dec. 6 (AP) — A recommendation that states assume more responsibility in fields they share with the federal government won the approval today of a House of Representatives subcommittee studying federal tax functions.

A special committee of governors and federal officials recommended that the states carry more of the load in some jointly financed programs, in exchange for federal tax credits.

The committee was formed after June last, a study by House leaders that a study be made looking to transfer to the states of certain functions now performed wholly or in part by the federal government.

Rep. Fountain (D-N.C.), chairman of a House Government Operations Subcommittee on intergovernmental relations, declined to comment on the specific recommendations of the special committee. 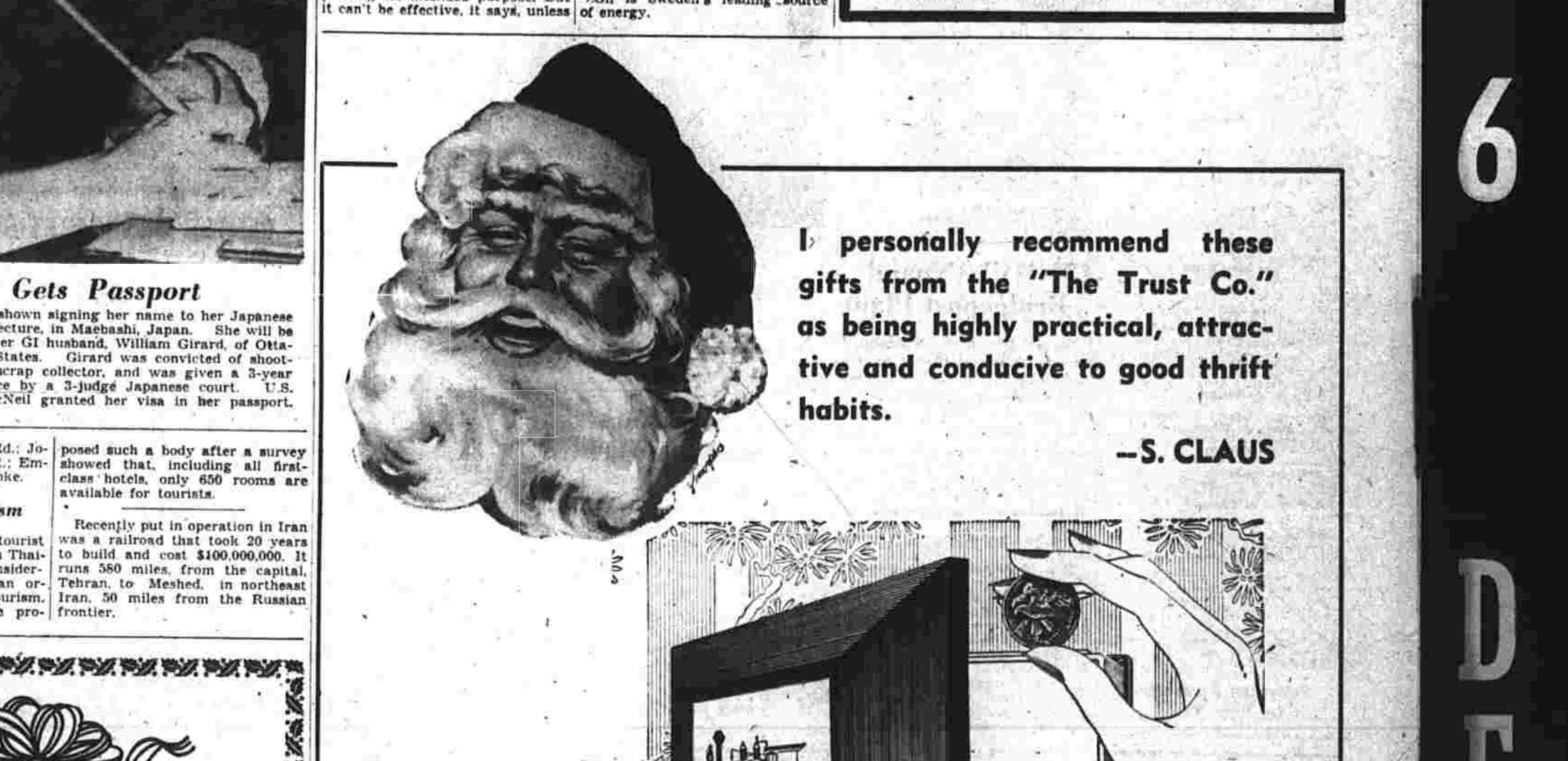

### New AMA Study Backs Safety of Fluoridation

Philadelphia, Dec. 6 (AP)—The American Medical Assn. today announced an extensive new study yesterday reaffirmed its view that fluoridation of public water supplies is a safe method of reducing dental decay during childhood.

The House of Delegates, policy-making body of the AMA, approved by a majority vote a Resolution Committee report voicing the opinion that "fluoridation of public water supplies is a safe and effective method of reducing dental decay during childhood."

The action was taken at the 113rd annual clinical session of the AMA.

The committee's report was based on an analysis of a report by two AMA councils—the Council on Drugs and the Council on Foods and Nutrition—which was presented to the House of Delegates last week.

The AMA said it "studied all available information concerning fluoridation of public water supplies and made recommendations."

The committee's report in December, 1955, said it "believes that the use of drinking water containing up to one part per million of fluoride is safe and effective."

The report also stated that at that time was approved by the House of Delegates.

No Evidence Since 1951

The AMA said it has since 1951 been monitoring the latest research on fluoride. It said it has found no evidence that fluoridation of public water supplies is unsafe or that it causes any harm to the population.

The AMA quoted a member of one of its councils as saying it published a pamphlet on the subject of fluoridation in a very controversial manner.

An AMA spokesman told a reporter that the pamphlet report "expressed a 'reaffirmation' of the AMA's long-held position."

The negative point was noted in the consideration of fluoridation. The report said that a slight mottling of tooth enamel in a small number of persons might be expected from prolonged exposure to water containing the material.

Benefits Are Stressed

The report stressed the benefits that children up to 10 years of age might receive from optimal concentration of one part per million of fluoride in drinking water.

Disapprove Resolution

The House of Delegates, in approving the report, disapproved a resolution by the Council on Drugs and the Council on Foods and Nutrition which called for a study of the safety and benefits of fluoridation of public water supplies.

Groton, Dec. 6 (AP)—Rear Adm. H. G. Rickover said today that "nothing short of a complete re-organization of American education can equip us for winning the educational race with Russians."

Rickover, head of the Navy's scientific team, which developed the atomic submarine and is now working on nuclear-powered surface ships, spoke at ceremonies here for the Navy's \$1 million Nuclear Power Training School.

Rickover said that he had been and is being done in Russia.

Rickover concluded: "If this is the case, we must reorganize the scale on the side of education—smaller classes, smaller groups, and in the total mass of educational training. Our youth may yet be the little bit which will guarantee survival of civilization."
