









### Italian Noblemen Jailed On Narcotics Charges

Roma, Dec. 10 (AP)—Three young Italian noblemen were sentenced to prison today at the end of Rome's most sensational narcotics trial in years. Twenty-four other defendants were fined or sent to jail and seven were acquitted. Prince Giuseppe, a member of one of Italy's most prominent aristocratic families, was given a two-year term. Duke Augusto Turroni, reported recovering from an illness in Spain, was sentenced to two years and two months. Marquis Emanuele De Seta, a Sicilian aristocrat and Italian World War II hero, got two years and three months. All were charged with possessing and using cocaine. Lawyers did not indicate whether they would take action during the five days allotted for appeals. The prosecution also can appeal. All defendants except Turroni have been in jail since their arrest in June 1956 and the time served will count on their sentences. The case broke with a dawn narcotics raid on a little night club just off Rome's fashionable Via Veneto. Originally 43 persons were arrested, but charges against nine were dropped. Judges deliberated for more than 12 hours before announcing the sentences, which ranged from a fine of 7,000 lire (\$2,000) to two years in prison. The court said it was giving the three noblemen "relatively light" sentences because they had no previous police records. Romano Picarelli, charged with distributing narcotics, received the heaviest penalty—five years and a fine of 1,800,000 lire (\$2,600). Max Mugnani, a Rome night club figure, was found guilty of using narcotics and was sentenced to four years and 10 months. Police had charged that he had a silk dinner jacket fitted with special pockets for carrying drugs.

(Continued from Page One) only for science and related fields of study or whether all areas of learning should be covered. Smith said a possible compromise would give the President authority to set aside some grants for the specialized fields, but only during a designated emergency period, with all the remaining grants to go for general study. Identification and guidance of able students in high schools would require no state or local funds, but an offer to finance guidance experts in state departments of education would call for some addition to federal money. State and institutions would have to put up some of their own money to go with the federal cash provided for college classroom and laboratory equipment. The amount would depend on the state's state of institutions to pay. Smith told a report that is contemplated that federal money for technical institutes, colleges and universities would go to both public and private institutions. At the elementary high school level, he said, the non-public school question is not to be debated. One possibility, he added, is that states which now support private and parochial schools will be permitted to use federal money in the same proportion as state money.

Middle Tpke. on a breach of the peace charge and turned over the 15-year-old boy, with whom he was charged with fighting, to juvenile authorities. Two other boys who had been watching the fight have been summoned to testify as witnesses when the case is heard in court next Saturday. Sullivan was released under \$50 bond.

### Columbia Board States Figures Show 694 Children

Columbia, Dec. 10 (Special)—This town has 694 children from infancy to 17 years of age, the Board of Education's enumeration has revealed. Mrs. Lucius Robinson Jr. completed the annual tally, which shows an increase of 49 over last year. Mrs. Robinson made the enumeration for the first time this year. For the past 10 years the Board hired her mother, Mrs. Marion Huriburt. However, she was unable to conduct the survey this year. There are 475 children from age 4 through age 17 who are receiving schooling, 416 in public schools and 57 in private schools. In addition there are three pupils in high school, all of whom are 16 years of age. In the lower age groups the report shows 48 under one year; 41, one year; 37, two years; 37, three years; 44, four years and 50, five years. There are 27 two-year-olds, 40 under one year; 46 one year; 27 two years; 37 three years; 48, four years; and 35, five years old. ### Rabies Warning Issued by State

Hartford, Dec. 10 (AP)—Rabies, a disease rare in Connecticut, and acinomyositis, a disease affecting tissues of the jaws or lungs, but believed to be non-communicable, is known as "humpy jaw" when it affects cattle, and results from a fungal that causes disease in animals much more frequently than in humans. The Health Department did not identify the Hartford victim. The report said recent developments make it "more definite that there may be a sizeable pool of rabies-infected wild animals in Fairfield County." The department referred to last week's case in Greenwich, the second in that town in as many weeks where a rabbit fox attacked a dog, and to the New Canaan case where a rabbit skunk bit a boy last July. The Health Department said "put owners in Connecticut, especially in Fairfield County, are urged to have their pets immunized against rabies and to be on the alert for symptoms of rabies in animals whether wild or domesticated."

**Education Board Approves New Pay Scale for Teachers**

The Board of Education last evening approved a new pay scale for teachers which will be presented to the teachers for their approval. The new plan calls for a basic starting pay of \$4,000 to \$5,500 for a bachelor of arts degree.

The approval of the pay plan followed a joint meeting of the Board of Education and the personal policies committee of the Manchester Education Assn. (MEA).

At its meeting Laurence Perry, chairman of the MEA Personal Policies Committee, presented a 5-point plan which the teachers had approved in a November-union ballot.

The plan requested a starting salary of \$4,000 to \$7,000 for a bachelor of arts degree; a new scale of increments for advanced degrees; payment of teachers' Blue Cross premiums by the Board of Education; notification of Manchester teachers concerning job openings in the system; and adoption of the Connecticut Education Assn. (CEA) contract form.

Perry mentioned an article which appeared in "The Herald" last week.

This article was not put in with the approval of any committee of the MEA.

A meeting of the Board of Education, held last night, was held to discuss the article. Perry said that the plan which the MEA had approved was not the plan of the CEA, but that only the suggested pay plan coincided with the CEA plan.

Frank Sheldon, member of the Board, asked the group how the figures they suggested would be paid. Perry replied that the teachers had taken a poll of other towns in Connecticut and in this vicinity.

Christie McCormick, chairman of the Board, told the teachers that the Board would like to give them every possible increase that the problem was "not what we would like to do if we had unlimited funds at our disposal, but what we are able to do."

Perry said to the Board, "Right. But we can't do it all in 'one or two jumps,' replied McCormick. He said that the Board is limited by the amount that the townpeople can pay and are willing to pay in taxes.

Perry said that the MEA has a plan under way and the renovation of the school buildings. **No New Civil Rights Bills Planned for Next Congress**

Washington, Dec. 10 (AP)—The Justice Department does not plan to recommend additional civil rights legislation at the next session of Congress.

Atty. Gen. Rogers made that statement yesterday at a news conference, his first since becoming cabinet member last month.

Rogers expressed the view that Congress and the country might well "let some little time elapse" to observe the workings of the Civil Rights Act adopted in the last session.
