# Dulles Once Opposed Accord in Principle

Washington, Dec. 19 (AP)—No matter how much of a success it is called now, the agreement reached in Paris between the United States and the NATO Allies yesterday was very much the kind of deal that Dulles once opposed in principle.

Just eight days before the agreement was signed, Dulles was quoted as saying he did not favor it because it was the kind which he had long ago said would never get anywhere.

The main purpose of President Eisenhower and Dulles in going to the NATO meeting in Paris was to get the Allies to accept American nuclear weapons and missiles which would be set up within their borders.

When Eisenhower and Dulles arrived they found some of the Allies wanted no part of the missiles because of their fear of Russian retaliation if war started.

The Paris meeting was split for two days. Then yesterday the 15 Allies agreed — but only in principle — that the NATO nations would accept the new American weapons.

The "principle" doesn't mean anything unless it's put into practice.

And this is what must come first.

This country must have the missiles to deliver. It doesn't have them now. And it is not expected to have them before the end of 1968.

The Allies must actually agree to accept the missiles in principle. Any "principle" any of the 15 can refuse to permit American missiles inside their territory when the rockets are ready.

Earlier this month before Dulles went to Paris, it was clearly known some of the Allies did not want the weapons.

Because much of the negotiations were going to be handled by diplomats—who are experts at making the unpleasant sound nice—there was a chance they might reach an agreement that sounded better than it was.

At a Dulles news conference here Dec. 16, the Secretary was asked if he favored agreement in principle on the NATO meeting.

This was just before the Paris meeting was split for two days. Then yesterday the 15 Allies agreed — but only in principle — that the NATO nations would accept the new American weapons.

DRAWING TRUMPS MAY BE FATAL

Dummy's trumps are sometimes useful for ruffing. When this is the case, drawing trumps is the order of the day. But drawing trumps without ruffing the opponents is a mistake.

South won the first trick in dummy with the king of spades and promptly led the jack of diamonds to trick the so-called "dummy" hand.

Now South made the fatal error of leading a second trump. East stepped up with the ace of diamonds and led a third diamond. This left only one trump in dummy's hand and one in South's.

South could therefore ruff one club and discard one club on dummy's ace of spades. This will leave him with one losing club, so South was down one instead of making the slam contract.

Must Ruff Clubs

South should see that he wants to ruff two clubs in dummy. He must not make it possible for an opponent to reduce dummy's trump.

After dummy's jack of diamonds, South should take the ace of clubs and ruff a club with a high trump. East should discard since he cannot gain by overruffing. Now South leads a trump to the king and ruffs another club with a high trump.

Only after doing this work can the explanation and the second trump be drawn. South will draw trumps as quickly as he can from this point on. The dummy will present no further problem.

As dealer, Spades: J, 10, 9, 8; Hearts: A, 10, 9, 8; Diamonds: A, 10, 9, 8; Clubs: A, 10, 9, 8.

Answer: Bid one heart. Only the hearts and diamonds should be considered biddable suits. Begin with the higher of these two suits. (Copyright 1967.)

# IRBM Funds Omitted In Foreign Aid Bill

Washington, Dec. 19 (AP)—The House bill to authorize \$3,960,000,000 in foreign aid for 1968 omits \$100 million in funds for the International Reciprocity Bank (IRBM).

The bill, which was passed by the House yesterday, provides for the IRBM to be established as a corporation to be owned and controlled by the United States.

The IRBM is intended to provide a source of funds for the development of foreign countries. It is to be financed by the sale of U.S. government securities to foreign governments.

The bill also provides for the IRBM to be authorized to borrow up to \$100 million from the U.S. Treasury.

# Death Toll 11 As Tornadoes Rip Two States

Damage by the violent late autumn weather.

Thus the southern Illinois action again has offered tragic evidence of the reason it is called "tornado alley." Most of the deaths occurred in the area of the Weather Bureau range Illinois as a whole.

The deadliest tornado in the nation's history occurred in southern Illinois on March 18, 1925. That day a twister killed 689 people, and 606 of them were in Illinois. Damage was listed at \$16 1/2 million.

In addition to the Murphreeboro twister, there was one fatality near Du Quoin, and one near Farmington, Mo. Killed at a community called Summit, Mo., about 30 miles north of Du Quoin, was James Carter, about 70. A 25-month-old boy, Robert Shannon, who was struck by a twister, died in a hospital in Farmington.

Four of the Murphreeboro fatalities occurred in one family, Mrs. Maria Butcher and her children were buried from their home and tossed into a nearby field. All were killed.

Also killed in Murphreeboro, Ill., were people of our community who can be expected at the library. Yes, there are of little value until they are allowed to materialize. ### Science Breaking Grip Of Paralytic Stroke

Washington—Medical science is beginning to break the iron grip of the paralytic stroke. The sudden, unexpected rupture of a blood vessel in the brain no longer means all elderly victims must spend the rest of their lives as helpless cripples. Now nine out of 10 of these patients can learn to walk again. And three of these will be able to do so within 30 days. This is the encouraging outlook offered to the two million U.S. victims of stroke and other diseases of the brain's blood vessels. They are revealed in a pamphlet recently released by the National Heart Institute of the Public Health Service's Institutes of Health. Immediate, highly skilled medical treatment is the key to this dramatic rehabilitation success story. Often within 48 hours after a stroke, doctors begin the painstaking massaging of the damaged limb. If the patient's speech has been impaired, therapy is started almost at once. These specialized treatments combined with expert nursing care and an encouraging, optimistic attitude by the doctor and patient's family have paid large dividends in rehabilitating worthwhile lives for those who were once doomed to years of crippled silence. Recent stroke victims are not the only ones who are benefiting from modern therapy techniques. Successful treatment has been perfected to the degree that some people who suffered strokes years ago can be helped. An NIH specialist declares: "There are very few of these patients who can't be helped a little bit. And some can be helped a very great deal."

Special clinics have been established in hospitals throughout the nation to care for stroke patients whose cases are too serious for successful home treatment. And hospitals which don't have such therapy centers are starting to build them. Many doctors are beginning to specialize in helping stroke patients and other disabled persons regain the use of their arms and legs. This type of physical medicine is becoming a standard course in U.S. medical schools. The result is that country doctors can give expert treatment to patients who can't afford the benefits of large medical centers. Notable gains also are being made in the treatment of other cerebral vascular diseases. Such diseases often cause poor memory and other mental afflictions common to old people. Many times the symptoms become so acute that

### Americans Saved \$19 Billion in '57

New York, Dec. 19 (AP)—Tendency to pop up all too frequently of citizens who are having a hard time making both ends meet. But a government agency says that this year Americans are saving \$19 billion more than they were last year.

This is amazing in the year of high cost of living. Also the big trouble with any plan for saving isn't the intentions, which are usually good, but the personal and family emergencies that have a

savings are readily changeable for cash by withdrawal, redemption or sale. These include \$52 billion in commercial bank deposits; \$21 billion in mutual savings banks; \$10 billion in savings & loan associations; \$3 billion in credit unions; \$11 billion in postal savings; \$4 billion in U.S. savings bonds; \$19 billion in other U.S. government securities.

Individuals also hold billions of dollars worth of corporate stocks and bonds, of mortgages, and of state and local government securities with which they could raise cash.

The Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, Va., in its December review lists four ways of saving. The first is the familiar one of putting left-over money in banks or certificates. This is the kind of sav-

ing plan that is the most easily wrecked by emergencies or impulse buying.

Second is contracting to make periodic payments to provide for old age or to protect the family in the event of death or disaster—persons and insurance of various kinds.

Third in the view of bankers is the repayment of loans or installment indebtedness—which means saving to pay for something you already are using, rather than the old-fashioned way of saving to be able to buy something.

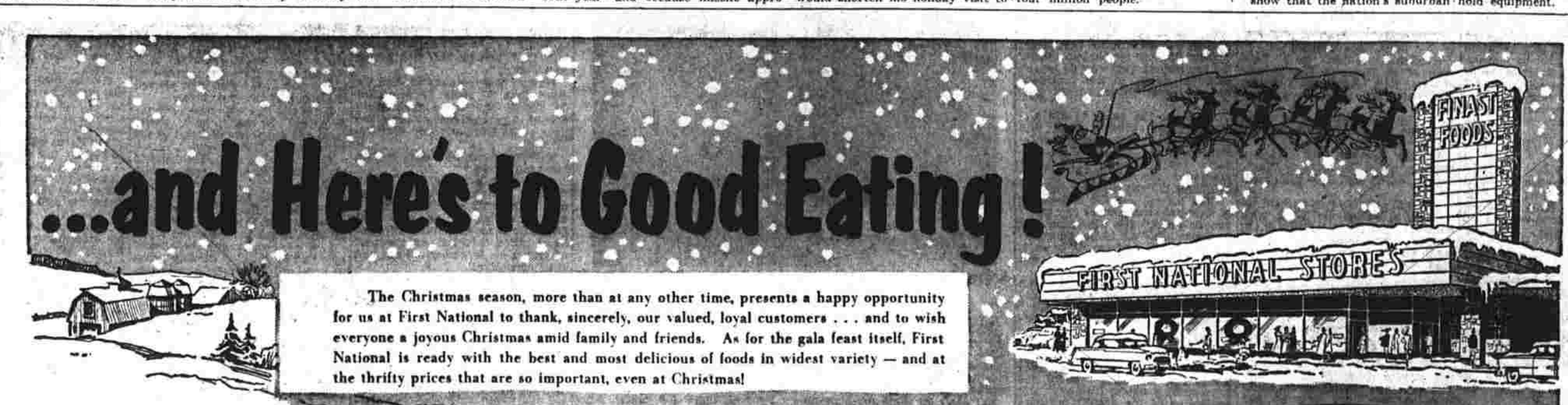
