Honolulu, Dec. 24 (AP)—Four survivors from the Navy Constellation radar plane that was ditched off Oahu island were rescued today.

Search vessels probing the turbulent sea recovered two rescue planes from the area after the giant plane went down 25 miles north of Oahu last night.

In Rough Seas The survivors, who were wearing life preservers but were not in a raft, said their Super Constellation ditched in rough seas. The Navy said.

Conditions of the survivors, details of the ditching and the rescue are not yet available.

Two crash boats speed rescue craft from Kaneohe Marine Air Station—pulled the survivors and dead men from the water.

While Navy Air Force and Coast Guard planes searched the blackness, destroyers, cutters and merchant ships converged on the area. Visibility was six miles and waves about six feet high.

A 57-million radar-equipped plane made its last check report at 3:50 p.m. It was 100 miles northwest of its base at Barber's Point Naval Air Station on Oahu.

A short time later radar screens picked it up only 25 miles north of the island, apparently circling for a landing at Barber's Point.

Twenty-one men had first been reported aboard the ill-fated aircraft. That was later changed to 24 six officers and 18 enlisted men.

Early today, however, the Navy said that one of the men thought aboard turned up in downtown Honolulu.

Eisenhower Calls on Moscow To Make Next Move for Peace



Washington, Dec. 24 (AP)—President Eisenhower tossed back to Moscow last night responsibility for making the next great gambit to "reduce world tensions" and open the path to disarmament and peace.

In familiar, time-tested terms, Eisenhower said that all that is needed to bring about a definite start toward universal security and peace is a spirit of conciliation on both sides and "clear evidence of Communist integrity and sincerity in negotiations and in action."

"For no nation, for no individual among us," the president said, "could there be a finer Christmas present, nor a better new year."

Eisenhower threw his dead-end-words challenge to the Kremlin as he has many times in the past, in a radio-televised report to America on last week's NATO council meeting in Paris. Secretary of State Dulles joined in Dulles, in fact, provided the bulk of the report, with Eisenhower nodding or occasionally voicing agreement.

As Eisenhower offered tacit approval, Dulles all but spared Russia a call of last Saturday for "a special session of the United Nations or an international conference to deal with the tough, elusive disarmament issue. President Eisenhower asked American last night for peace and good will, patience, persistence and self-restraint to promote peace and good will in negotiations. Clear evidence of Communist integrity and sincerity would be the best Christmas present the world could receive, the President said later in a report to the nation.

The holiday season found under-chilled wars going on sporadically in Algeria and Iraq, in North Africa, and civil strife in Cuba and Cyprus. Many people awaited Christmas in bleak refugee camps in Hungary and Austria. East Germany in West Berlin. Palestine. Arabs in Gaza. Chinese in Hong Kong. Dutch from Indonesia in Singapore.

But no war scared disturbed the Holy season. In contrast, to last Christmas, when the Sinal War was just over, tension ebbed away from the barbed wire barriers that separate Palestine. Thousands of pilgrims to the Holy Land awaited Christmas.

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Pastor Preaches On Obligations At Christmas

Speaking to his congregation Sunday about "Christmas Obligations," the Rev. Arnold W. Toser of the Second Congregational Church enumerated the various things that are almost obligatory for all of us at Christmas. He mentioned the sending of cards, the setting up of trees, exchanging of greetings and, of course, the obligations continue to grow.

"Now we not only must decorate the inside of our homes but the outside as well. And we must not only decorate our homes but our clothing and our offices."

Commenting on these increasing tendencies, the minister humorously chided the female portion of the congregation concerning the member of their sex who recently carried the ring long way by dying her hair green in observance of the season.

The minister pointed out that we accept these obligations gladly, not only because they are a part of the observance of Christmas, but also because these little duties keep alive in our hearts the long little fire of childhood memories.

"For some of us these little fires are sacred because they represent our only ties to times and people that are lost to us forever."

The Rev. Mr. Toser went on to say that there are other Christmas obligations that are not as obvious as cards or trees but which are much more important. One of these is to keep Christmas personal.

"The first Christmas was personal. It came to a small group of shepherds and a few men traveling from the East—and so it should always come to us, as the sun shines over the entire globe and yet shines on a particular blade of grass which captures the sun and transforms it into living substance. A similar miracle is the way in which you and I, like a blade of grass, capture the spirit of Christ."

"God help us and God help the world when we allow our lives to be the hopeless, trusting love of the child-like in all of us, and it is a sacred obligation to make room for the child."

O Holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us We Pray. Cast out our sin and enter in. Be born to us today. We hear the Christmas angels the great good tidings tell. O come to us. Abide with us. Our Lord Emmanuel.

Religious ceremonies tonight celebrating the birth of Jesus. More Green than white was expected for Christmas in the United States. The Weather Bureau said only the northern portions of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota and higher mountain areas of the West were likely to get the traditional snow.

Celebrations for South Pole. But one group of the thousands of American servicemen spread around the world had plenty of white. The Pole extended holiday greetings to four visiting newsmen from Manhattan. South Pole scientists even provided artificial snow for a press club. Hospitality and giving were the watchwords for U.S. servicemen abroad.

Crewmen from the aircraft carrier Randolph in the Mediterranean sent a plane to Naples with a seal, a Christmas tree and 80 Italian Merchant Marine cadets between 10 and 20 years old. Troops in Germany entertained and sent gifts to some 73,000 orphans and needy children. Old folks and others. Numerous servicemen were invited to Christmas dinner with German families in that land where many of America's favorite holiday traditions originated.

One U.S. commander gave a report on unit Christmas parties in contrast with the year-around "World War II." There had never been enough orphans at the parties to go around, even with one man to each orphan.

Biggest Party in Korea. Soldiers at Taegu, Korea, proudly claimed they and their wives had the biggest Christmas party ever held in Korea, for more than 1,200 orphans. The soldiers in Korea were themselves getting Christmas entertainment. Bob Hope flew in from Japan after entertaining some 40,000 Americans there and in Okinawa. His troops included Jaye Mansfield and Jerry Colonna. Airmen staged a near riot in efforts to get near Japan when she landed.

Francis Cardinal Spellman also arrived in Korea. The Roman Catholic Archbishop of New York will spend Christmas with the troops, a tradition he began during the Korean War. Rev. Edwin T. Dahlberg of St. Louis presided at the annual Council of Churches which includes Protestant and orthodox denominations, visited the orphans in Alaska.

U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld was also visiting troops for Christmas. He arrived in Gaza yesterday to visit the U.N. Emergency Force. Hammarskjöld was met with a demand from Arab refugees that they be returned to their old homes. But the 10,000 Hungarian refugees in Austria were hoping for new homes as police gave them Christmas presents.

For those still behind the Iron Curtain. Radio Free Europe (RFE) prepared special Christmas programs from Poland and other national groups in United States and Britain. Authorities in Algeria said they hoped for the quietest Christmas Eve since the rebellion began three years ago. The curfew will be lifted in Algeria tonight to permit newspapers to attend midnight Mass. However, scattered strikes and bombings were reported across the North African territory and military officials said 43 rebels were killed in three clashes yesterday.

Honolulu, He was identified as Aviation Technician, Radar 3.C. Richard D. Varner (age and home address unavailable), who was on liberty yesterday and therefore excused from the routine training flight schedule. The Navy said helicopters joined the search for the other survivors on Saturday.

The Super Constellation took off at 10 a.m. yesterday. Both planes, specially converted for radar patrol, are capable of remaining aloft more than two days. Early in the search an Air Force plane reported making radio contact with a life raft and a Coast Guard plane said it sighted flares and a raft. Those reports were not confirmed and a Navy spokesman said they were being disregarded. Survivors were picked up, said they signaled a search plane with a flashlight.

The Navy spokesman said names of those aboard the patrol craft probably would be released later today. The missing 4-engine plane was attached to an aircraft early warning wing based at Barber's Point on Oahu, the Hawaiian island on which Honolulu stands. The weather was calm and visibility was good. The plane was flying at about 20,000 feet when it crashed into the Pacific midway between Hawaii and the West Coast Nov. 8. A vast sea and air search got under way as soon as that plane was reported overdue but it was a week later before bodies and floating wreckage were found.
