Unsung U.S. Ambassadors—3 Technicians Vital In Cold War Battles

(Not a major political issue in the Middle East, the third article of a series on American ambassadors, William Ryan tells how 802 U.S. technicians are helping to stem Communism and interested assistance the Arab world.)

The United States has long had a monopoly on supplying machinery and equipment, grain and other supplies to the Arab world. Soviet agents in Cairo last month.

The Russians tried to repeat their success in the Middle East, but the most sensitive cold war front received a relatively small share of the U.S. Technical aid program. Arab technicians are still in the Middle East, but their numbers are dropping.

Before the Suez Canal nationalization in 1956, Egypt had 75 American technicians, but the ICA program has been temporarily suspended since the crisis.

Tunisia Wants More
In North Africa, Tunisia has only 8 American technicians. U.S. prestige is high there. Tunisia wants more Americans.

Morocco has a staff of 21 Americans. There is no significant anti-American feeling, but since there is a military installation of 15,000 Americans, it is not surprising that many might complain of "too many Americans."

In the Arab east, the one common complaint of "too many Americans" seems to be in Lebanon. Officials there are because Soviet agents of technicians made Arab suspicious. They do not know Russians.

They know Americans and generally like them—although the U.S. Government has been losing friends swiftly through the area.

An American official of the ICA concedes there are a few "bad Americans" who give all of us a black eye.

But, said an American diplomat, "instead of personnel cutbacks, perhaps our agencies in Washington should give a little more thought to personnel selection."

Arabs have complained that many aid dollars went into fat American salaries. The facts seem to dispute this. In any event, ICA officials contend there are just not enough Arab technicians qualified to do the work. This is the basic reason for the ICA program.

Builders Acquire Option to Tract

An option to buy a 20-acre tract of land straddling the Wilbur Cross Highway and the town lines of Manchester and East Hartford has been taken by the Garry Building Corp. of West Hartford.

Thomas and Banto Leone of Manchester, have given the corporation the exclusive right to purchase the property, which is bounded by the Hockanum River, during the next two years, according to papers filed with the Manchester town clerk.

An escalator clause is included in the agreement which places a minimum price of \$1,500 per acre on the land if it is purchased by June 1 and then rises from specified dates to a maximum of \$2,000 per acre.

A spokesman for the corporation said the company has "no immediate plans" for building in that area.

The Garry corporation has been quite active in home construction in the area around Manchester and has built 120 homes in Vernon.

Conference Called to Settle General Strike in Nassau

Nassau, Bahamas, Jan. 16 (AP)—Transportation interests hoped today to arrange a meeting with the Bahamian Trades Union to solve their differences and settle the general walkout that has paralyzed this tourist city.

The plan was to have three representatives from each side confer on matters at issue which led to the walkout earlier this week and shut down virtually all activity at the airport after failure to settle their differences with private interests.

Sixteen hotels have closed, emptying the city of winter visitors. A count at noon Wednesday showed only 24 tourists were in the city. Almost all service for air and cruise ships had halted.

Three platoons of armed British troops were flown in from Jamaica to help maintain order. Licensed liquor establishments were closed on establishment order.

Many businesses along Bay Street, in the heart of the city of 30,000, boarded up their windows with hurricane shutters. Food stores did a brisk business in canned goods.

The government said in a statement that the 150 troops were brought in to relieve police for rioting duty to prevent sabotage and intimidation of workers staying on their jobs.

The troops, members of the crack Westchester Regiment under command of Col. T. F. Hughes, are staying at the stately Royal Victoria Hotel, Nassau's first tourist facility erected during the American Civil War.

They were brought in, the government said, solely for the purpose of protecting life and property, and it warned that "any person or gang against whom a case may be established may expect to be treated with every severity legally possible."

Scattered attempts to sabotage some facilities were reported, including dynamite attached to a power switch at a water supply and temporary interruption of electrical service to various parts of the island.

There were no indications of violence and strike leaders told their followers to avoid disturbances.

The walkout stemmed from a disagreement last fall when members of the labor union blocked transportation to and from the airport after failure to settle their differences with private interests.

Hal Boyle Guts and Ignorance Spell Success

New York (AP)—The Army is supposed to build men.

It did even better by Cy Leslie, a big ex-sergeant in the Signal Corps. It gave him the initial idea that led to a multimillion-dollar business.

Cy, who is 30 and has the height and the belt of a professional football tackle, today is known as "The King of the Middle Records." Last month his firm pressed its 100 millionth record for children.

"Looking back, I guess I owe a lot to the Army," he said.

At the time—during the Second World War—Leslie didn't figure, however, the Army was doing him much of a favor by sending him to such faraway places as New Guinea and the Philippines. He was lonely, as all soldiers are lonely.

Then, one day, he got a greeting card from his mother, back in Brooklyn. Gazing at the greeting card, Leslie mused:

"Boy, if this thing could only talk, Cy brooded over the thought. Well, why couldn't a greeting card carry a vocal message? He decided it could.

Released from the Army in 1946, Leslie gambled his savings on creating a line of recorded two-bit greeting cards.

"I had only \$1,100 and I put every penny into it," Cy recalled. "I wrote our own lyrics and music. I slept on the desks at night because I was too tired to go home. My mother even helped by trimming the paper-based records with her scissors.

"The cards caught on fast. The first year we took in \$25,000, the second year \$200,000. The cards couldn't give them away. The cards were a fad, and the fad was over."

Cy then decided to take an even bigger gamble—to enter the kiddie record field in competition with the major companies. He decided the only way he could win was to put out a 25-cent product and aim for a new mass field through supermarkets, toy stores, and mail order houses.

He picked up a number of the unknown singers and used them to make children's records," he recalled. "Later on some of them, Kay Arren, Clark Dennis and the Minniners, went on to fame in the adult music field."

And Cy, who now has three children of his own, made one other major decision—that none of his musical ventures of classic fairy tales and fables would have frightening endings.

"We'd rather take a few liberties with the story than scare a child," he said. "In our record of Little Red Riding Hood, the bad wolf is caught and tied up—but he isn't axed. We don't want to give kids nightmares."

Leslie's Cricket Label line for tots succeeded so phenomenally that now he has begun a new line of low-priced albums for the adult market, featuring such artists as Eddie Condon, Benny Davis, Jack Carson, and Dorothy Lamour. One of his albums consists of music to fight bulls by. It is called "Play of the Matador."

One of his present goals: To get Margaret Truman to record an album entitled, "Songs My Father Taught Me."

Forest Blazes Seen Expensive To Taxpayers

The nearly 90 forest fires which occurred in Tolland County last year will cost the taxpayers some \$2,894, according to a report issued by the Tolland County Commissioners.

The report, which was presented to the County Commissioners at their meeting last night, shows that the cost of fighting forest fires is a donation of \$14.50 has lessened the total cost to taxpayers.

The County Commissioners generally provide \$100 in the budget to cover fire fighting, and average about \$500 a year in actual expenditures.

The wave of forest fires, apparently brought on by the drought, reached its height in May when 29 fires were reported. May 1 brought three fires, with firefighters spending about four hours at Soapstone Mountain in Somers. Six hours on Rt. 15 in Tolland and 17 hours on Rt. 13 in Willington.

About 150 men, exclusive of fire personnel, fought these blazes. Most volunteer firefighters in the county do not get paid for their work. However, any other person who helps at a fire, and registers, is paid 90 cents an hour. Wardens are paid one dollar per hour.

The fire costs also include small sums for the purchase of fire hardware and coffee, served at the fire.

Alpert also recommended that Congress remove two federal rail taxes—a 3 per cent. excise on freight shipments and a 10 per cent. wartime tax on passenger tickets.
