Mitchell's description of curbs on picketing and labor boycotts that would be contained in the administration bill.

Here is a summary of the President's recommendations:

1. Require registration and detailed annual reporting to the Labor Department on all welfare or pension plans administered by employers, unions or jointly.
2. Require unions to file with the Labor Department detailed annual financial reports, available to the public, and require unions to open their financial records to all union members.
3. Under this recommendation union members would have an unequivocal right to sue in federal or state courts to enforce the financial responsibility of union officials.
4. Prohibit corrupt financial dealings between employers and unions.
5. Create a new post in the Labor Department for a commissioner of labor reports. He would have custody of the required union data with authority to make public disclosure of the information, seek court injunctions against violations, investigate reports of violation, and issue subpoenas for witnesses and records.
6. Enact new criminal penalties governing embezzlement of union funds; falsifying or destroying union records; failing to file required reports with the government; and stifling bribery penalties.

This point called for eliminating entirely the Fair-Hartley provision which bars economic strikers from voting in bargaining elections called during strikes. Eisenhower pledged in his 1952 campaign to seek repeal of this section.

8. Authorize states to act on labor relations matters over which the NLRB declines to assert jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has ruled that states cannot act in a non-Man's Land area where the NLRB has not seen fit to exercise the jurisdiction which it has by force.

9. Authorize the NLRB to grant bargaining rights, without a prior election, to unions representing employees in the building and construction industry.

10. Eliminate the Fair-Hartley requirement that union officials file non-Communist affidavits before their organizations are eligible to use the NLRB. Eisenhower took the view this provision is necessary since enactment of the Communist Control Act of 1950 which covers unions.

11. Provide that parties to a labor contract may not be required to negotiate during the life of the agreement, but that they must reopen or the parties mutually agree to its being reopened.

12. Permit the President to designate some other officer or employee to serve as acting general counsel of the NLRB during a vacancy.

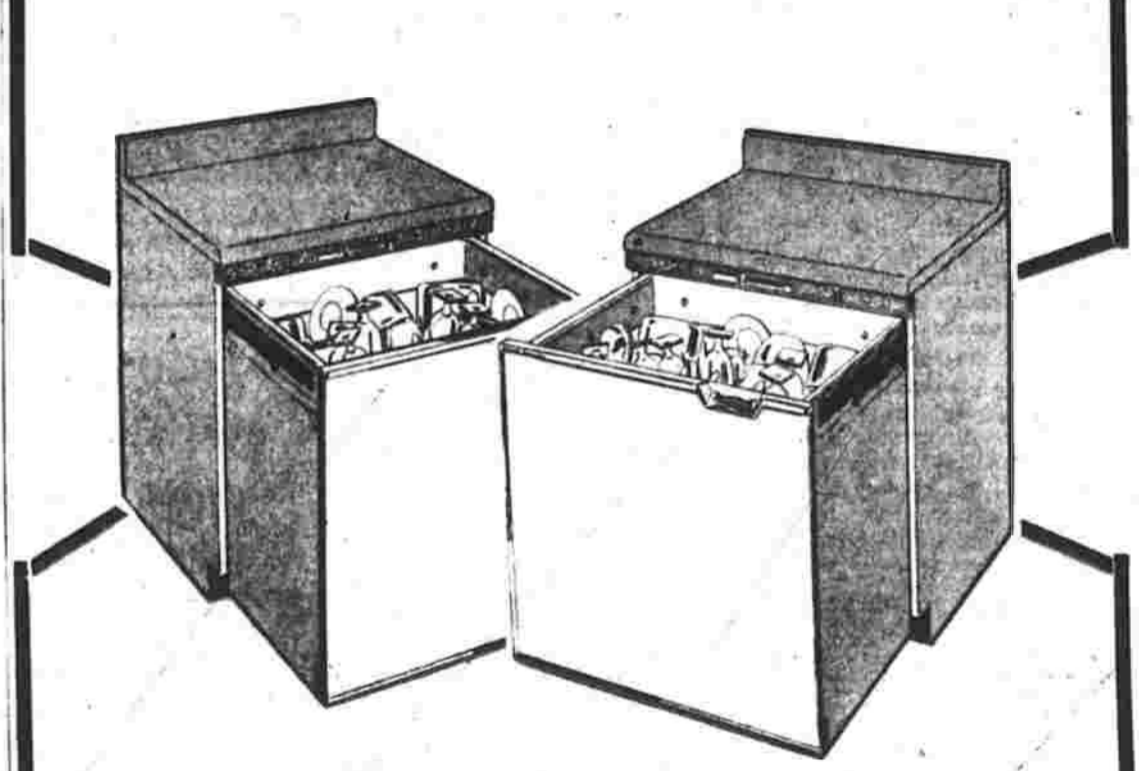

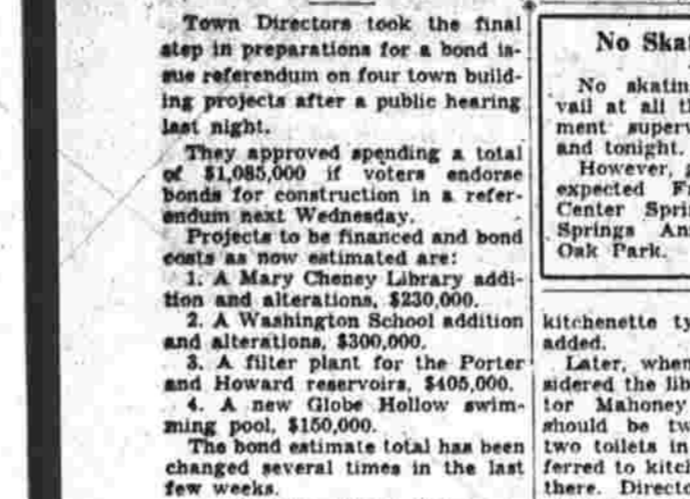

Your Income Tax--No. 4

Exemptions Are Costly to Keep, But a Boon at Income Tax Time

EDITOR'S NOTE: Fourth in a series of eight articles. This story tells how you can make sure you get the credit for every cent you are entitled to on your income tax return. Be sure to take it from your return when you make our your return.

Every exemption you claim blocks \$600 right off the top of your gross income, making it tax free. Since the amount for each exemption is so large, the rules are precise and, unless you know them, however you should claim every exemption to which you are entitled.

There are three types of exemptions for yourself, your children and spouse if you are filing a joint return for your children and for others. That's the order in which they appear on your income tax return, so that in the order in which they will be taken up.

Each taxpayer gets at least one exemption for himself. He is entitled to another if he is 65 or over or if he reached his 65th birthday on the last day of 1957. And he is entitled to still another if he is blind.

The same rules apply to married couples who file joint returns. If both are 65 or over they are entitled to four exemptions; if one is 65 or over and the other is under 65, they get three exemptions.

Now about the children. The big thing here is that to be claimed as an exemption, a child must be under 18 years of age at the time you receive more than half his support from you during the tax year.

You can claim one exemption for each child, stepchild or legally adopted child who was under 18 years old at any time during the tax year. Within this group it doesn't matter how much income the child had, so long as you paid more than half of his support.

If the child reaches age 18 during the tax year or is even older you may still claim an exemption if he or she is a full-time student or has a taxable income of less than \$600 for the year—and still providing that you paid more than half the support costs.

Requirements shift in addition to exemptions for yourself, your spouse and your children. Only you may claim dependents whether or not they are related to you. These dependents, however, have to meet some pretty stiff requirements.

To qualify as exemptions for you these dependents must:
1. Have received less than \$600 in total reportable income during 1957.
2. Have received more than half their support from you during 1957.
3. Have not filed a separate return for 1957 with their spouse.

Be a citizen or resident of the United States or a resident of Canada, Mexico, the Republic of Panama or the Canal Zone; and
3. Either have been a member of your household for the entire taxable year, or be related to you, if you are filing a joint return.

costs during the year. If the child used the \$1,000 to pay his or her own support costs, you lose the exemption regardless of whether the \$1,000 is tax-free, unless you contributed more than \$1,000 additional to the support costs.

There is one more thing to be considered while we're discussing exemptions: the case where several persons together contribute more than half the support of an individual during the year, but no one alone contributed more than half that might be the case where four brothers chipped in equally to support a widowed mother.

Cooperation Pay. One of the tax payers concerned may claim the supported person. The supported person meets the requirements for a dependent (as outlined above).

2. The person claiming the exemption contributed more than 10 percent of the dependent's support; and
3. Each other person in the group files a statement with the IRS declaring that he or she is not claiming the exemption.

Relative who may qualify under these provisions are: mother, father, mother-in-law, father-in-law, brother, sister, stepbrother, stepfather, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law, stepmother, stepfather, grandparent, grandchild or when related by blood—uncle, niece or nephew.

Note that rule 5 above says they must either have been a member of your household for the entire last year, or must be related to you. Thus, a foster child would not qualify as a relative, but might qualify if he or she had spent the entire year in your household and met the other provisions as to income, age, support, etc.

And the Internal Revenue Service warns you not to try to list the maid or the butler—services are not considered part of the household.
You may have noted above that one of the provisions for claiming an exemption is that the dependent does not have a reportable income of \$600 or more during the year. We'll go into this in greater detail in the next article, but it might be well to point out here that not all income need be reported.

Social security payments, for instance, are tax-free and need not be reported, and death benefits from insurance policies.

Requirements shift in addition to exemptions for yourself, your spouse and your children. Only you may claim dependents whether or not they are related to you. These dependents, however, have to meet some pretty stiff requirements.

To qualify as exemptions for you these dependents must:
1. Have received less than \$600 in total reportable income during 1957.
2. Have received more than half their support from you during 1957.
3. Have not filed a separate return for 1957 with their spouse.

Be a citizen or resident of the United States or a resident of Canada, Mexico, the Republic of Panama or the Canal Zone; and
3. Either have been a member of your household for the entire taxable year, or be related to you, if you are filing a joint return.

costs during the year. If the child used the \$1,000 to pay his or her own support costs, you lose the exemption regardless of whether the \$1,000 is tax-free, unless you contributed more than \$1,000 additional to the support costs.

There is one more thing to be considered while we're discussing exemptions: the case where several persons together contribute more than half the support of an individual during the year, but no one alone contributed more than half that might be the case where four brothers chipped in equally to support a widowed mother.

Cooperation Pay. One of the tax payers concerned may claim the supported person. The supported person meets the requirements for a dependent (as outlined above).

2. The person claiming the exemption contributed more than 10 percent of the dependent's support; and
3. Each other person in the group files a statement with the IRS declaring that he or she is not claiming the exemption.

Relative who may qualify under these provisions are: mother, father, mother-in-law, father-in-law, brother, sister, stepbrother, stepfather, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law, stepmother, stepfather, grandparent, grandchild or when related by blood—uncle, niece or nephew.

Note that rule 5 above says they must either have been a member of your household for the entire last year, or must be related to you. Thus, a foster child would not qualify as a relative, but might qualify if he or she had spent the entire year in your household and met the other provisions as to income, age, support, etc.

And the Internal Revenue Service warns you not to try to list the maid or the butler—services are not considered part of the household.
You may have noted above that one of the provisions for claiming an exemption is that the dependent does not have a reportable income of \$600 or more during the year. We'll go into this in greater detail in the next article, but it might be well to point out here that not all income need be reported.
