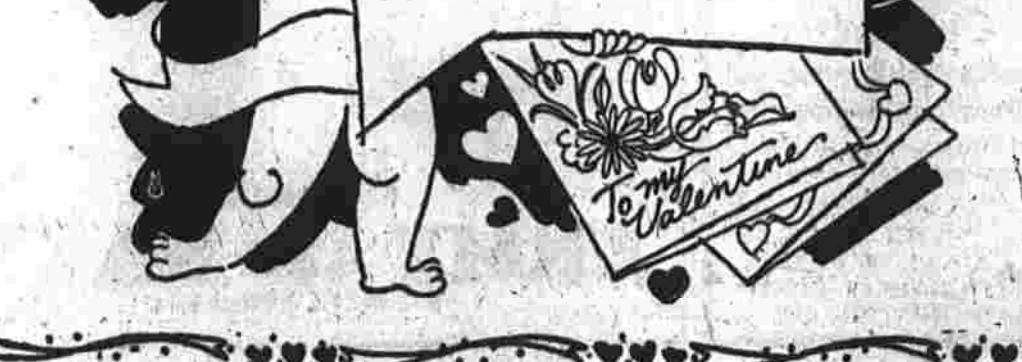

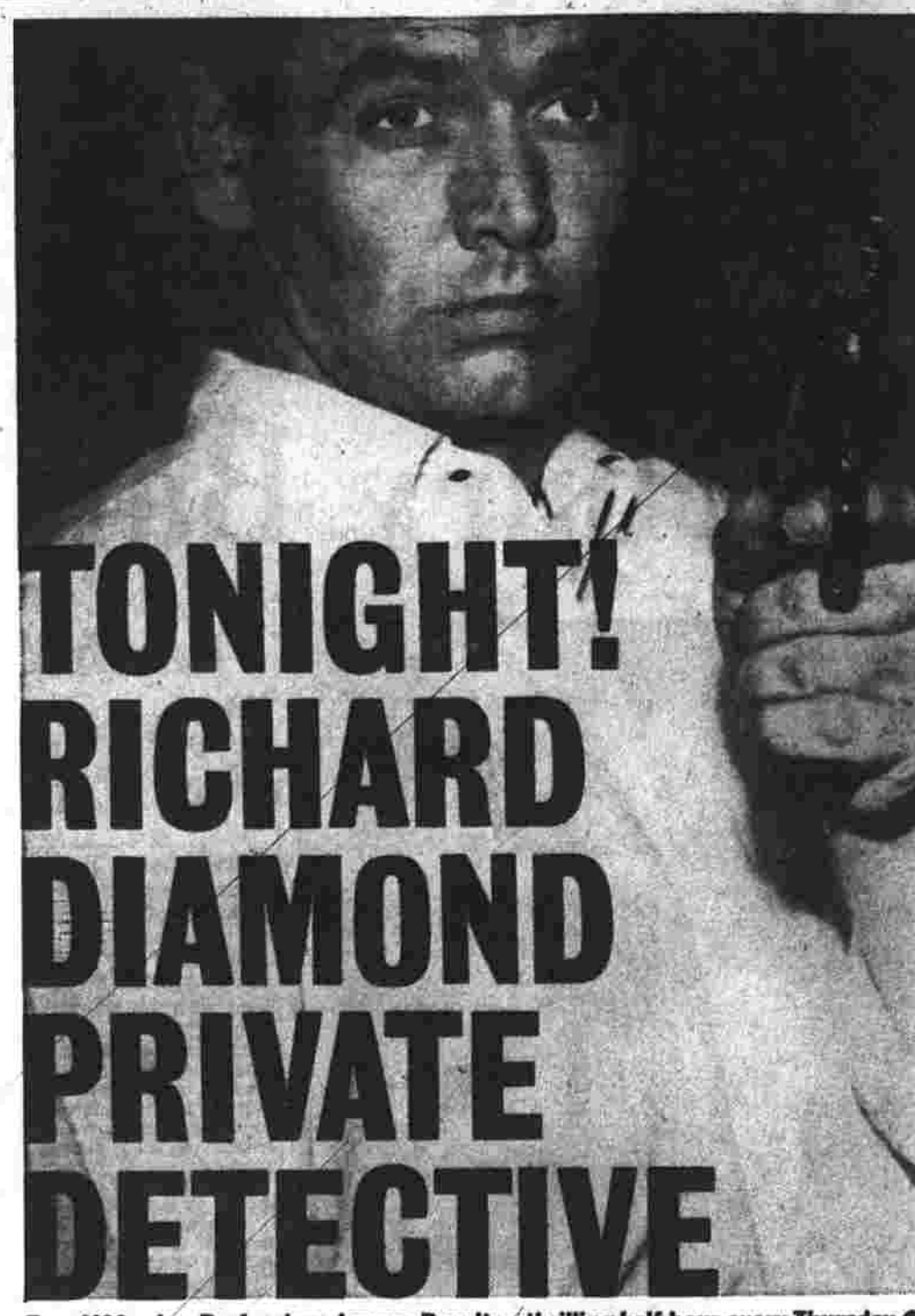

### Rescuing Dulles

The Russians have now done just about the only thing that could restore the prestige of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in his own country. The departing Russian ambassador, Zorin, is on his way to pay farewell visits to Vice President Nixon and Harold Stassen, while making sure that he leaves behind a good impression on the one individual upon whom he should have called—Mr. Dulles.

And Premier Bulganin, in his latest epistle, went out of his way to say that the Russian people are glad to see the American people at the level because of the well known difficulty of accomplishing anything with some of the persons who are in the White House.

If American attempts to drive a wedge between President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles have merely produced stronger affirmations of support for Dulles from the President, what can one expect of such a Russian plotting? And if anything is needed to clinch Washington's dislike of Mr. Dulles, what could do it better than such a Russian exhibition of preference for Mr. Stassen over Mr. Dulles?

It is not surprising, therefore, that one has to make a difficult choice. Either the Russians are smart and know exactly what they are doing and what its effects will be, or they are unbelievably naive and lacking in intelligence.

If they know what they are doing, then one has to assume that it is their real purpose to help destroy Stassen, and help rebuild Mr. Dulles, all in the end that the present trend toward negotiation between East and West shall fall with Mr. Dulles then being blamed for it.

If they don't know what they are doing, then they want negotiation, but are using the most possible tactics for getting them and for getting the negotiators they want.

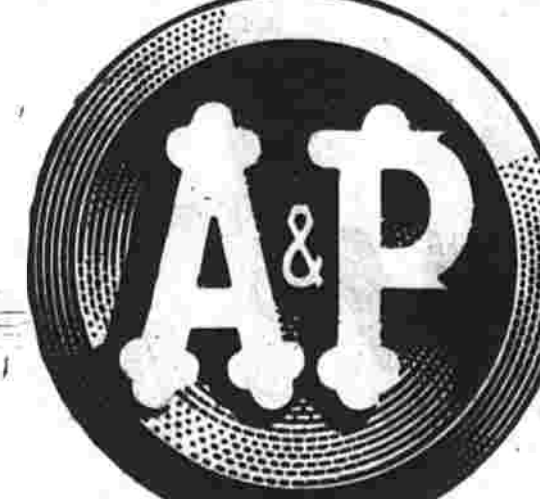
