New York (N.E.A.)—Memo to prospective college students: The era of the gentlemanly "C" is coming to an end.

In spite of the fact that college admissions and applications are apt to be lightening up on what they expect from their students, according to private surveys of college educators across the nation just made available.

Land-grant universities, for example, are following their state laws in admitting graduates from state high schools, but "We've dropped a thousand students at mid-term," a Midwest university spokesman said. "There was no edict from the administration. After Sputnik the faculty just spontaneously decided to jack up the standards of scholarship. No later should be allowed to take the place on the campus of a serious student."

**Weeks Sees 5 Million Mile** Secretary of Commerce Weeks has predicted that unemployment will climb to about five million this month and then commence a downward seasonal trend.

**James C. Hagerly**, White House press secretary, was asked whether Eisenhower's prediction that joblessness will begin to decline in March means that the administration looks for an increase in February.

In direct reply, Hagerly simply referred newsmen to Eisenhower's expression of confidence that the "beginning of the end will come in March."

At the outset of his statement, Eisenhower took note of the unemployment figures made public yesterday. He said they indicate that "the current falling unemployment rate is sharper than usual for this time of year."

"I have confidence in the recovery of our economy," he said, "for two reasons. Eisenhower said, 'First, it is my conviction that the underlying forces of growth remain strong and undiminished. . . . Second, the firm policy of the government is to foster this recovery every sound way possible.'"

**Deeply Concerned** The President said yesterday he is deeply concerned over the hardships that the unemployment figures reflect. He said the additional breadwinners temporarily out of work, and the loss of income to the families of the unemployed, is a matter of deep concern to him.

"I know that we are concerned, too, with the loss of production on many businesses across the land. While these developments present important factors, our present economic situation, they must be viewed in perspective, we look ahead."

Eisenhower went on to predict the start of recovery. Referring to the programs already undertaken or planned to meet the recession, Eisenhower said he was making it public "to dispel false impressions and to make clear the activities of the administration in these fields." Referring then to such activities, he said:

"We include action in recent months by the Federal Reserve System to ease credit, with dramatic results already achieved. Greater availability of credit and lower borrowing costs. Steps have been taken, going back to last August, to stimulate homebuilding, even though we are deeply pointed by the failure of the Congress to authorize the \$2-billion program that would attract mortgage money into many phases of home construction."

He also included a sharply stepped-up expenditures on the national highway building program, an increase in activity under the urban renewal program, and a sharp increase in the first half of this year in the rate at which defense procurement contracts will be placed with private industry."

One source said privately that the administration has known "for a number of days" the approximations of the situation of January employment. The trend was discussed by Eisenhower Monday with a group of his top economic advisers.

# Driving Instruction Starts in Second Grade Former Russian Spies Witness at GI Trial

Lawton, Okla. (AP) — When a child is promoted from the third to fourth grade at Garfield Elementary School here, he's qualified as an A-1 automobile driver.

From the time a child enters the second grade at Garfield until he graduates from the fifth school, he is drilled on safe-driving habits. "Drive-in" signs are placed in the classroom, and the children are given a written test on the subject. The average score was 85.

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Second graders "drive" up and down the aisles in their classroom, using crayon-colored plates as steering wheels and giving hand signals when they turn.

The second graders also learn to read and identify traffic signs, distinguishing those they cannot read by their shape.

They have a "traffic light" in the classroom made by their teacher, Mrs. Allen Priddy, of a broomstick, shoe box and Christmas lights.

After the second graders have moved to an elaborate traffic training course laid out on a table representing miniature streets, tiny traffic signs and little cars.

Here the children learn passing fundamentals, traffic lanes and other good driving habits. In the third grade, the children are assigned the town would pay normal, which is marked off in make-believe streets, intersections and miniature traffic lights.

They learn more safety habits by reading four-page booklets, complete with lights, horn, rubber tires and make-believe engine under the hood.

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## Tunisians Threaten Guerrilla Warfare if French Don't Leave

Tunis, Feb. 12 (AP)—President Habib Bourguiba said today that he would personally lead the Tunisian people in a guerrilla war if necessary to force French troops out of Tunisia.

The Tunisian President in a speech recorded for radio delivery later today warned that the Tunisian people would be met by force if the French did not leave Tunisia by the end of the month.

Bourguiba added, however, that he did not despair of seeing withdrawal of the French from Tunisia. He said he still was ready to negotiate with France, but only after the evacuation of the 15,000 French troops in his soil.

Tension increased as Bourguiba recorded his speech as tension mounted throughout the country and the French reported increasing minor incidents involving French troops, bases and civilians.

France warned the Tunisians through diplomatic channels that further grave incidents might arise as a result of Tunisian refusal to allow French forces to remain in Tunisia.

The French also carried their threat to the United Nations.

The mayor made his announcement at a news conference, issued a 3-page statement.

The statement did not indicate whom he might support for the nomination.

Lee, now in his third term as mayor, said he had reached his decision after reviewing "all aspects of the matter."

He said he respected "the sincerity and good intentions of all concerned" he couldn't be a candidate.

## Ribicoff Picks March 4; Will Outline Plans

At Monday's meeting Riccioli reported that the unemployment situation in Connecticut had become as bad as in 1949 when the number of jobs was down over the 100,000 mark.

Referring to that same meeting, Riccioli said: "It was my understanding that the Governor would call a special session to deal with the problem."

## FCC Official Fixed, Schwartz Charges

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—Senator Schwartz testified today that Federal Communications Commissioner Richard A. Mack has acknowledged "several" instances of "gross mismanagement" in the FCC's handling of a \$100,000 contract for a Miami television station.

Schwartz, first cousin of the present chairman, John C. Doerfer, and Commissioner Mack, testified before the Senate subcommittee on the matter.

Schwartz said the money was paid to Mack several weeks before the station was licensed.

Schwartz said Mack had "mismanaged" the contract and had "wasted" the money.

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## British Report Gains In IRBM Development

London, Feb. 12 (AP)—The British government today announced it was developing a medium range ballistic rocket more advanced than the American now in use and is designed for launching from underground silos.

The White Paper said the agreement under which the British intermediate range ballistic missiles will be located in Britain will be completed shortly.

Regarding the relative strength of the United States and the Soviet Union, the document said: "Russia's successful launching of artificial satellites is evidence of her remarkable progress in rocket development. It should not be thought that this has upset the balance of military power."

The White Paper said the United States is making a "major contribution" to the development of an accurate intermediate range ballistic missile in sufficient numbers.

Hope for Arms Cut Pact

The White Paper expressed the hope that agreement will be reached on the issue of a comprehensive arms limit pact.

"Today no country can hope to gain anything by war," the document said.
