# Sheinwold on Bridge

SEAL NINTE TRICK AS PLAY BEGINS. By Albert Weiss. The time to steal the ninth trick is at the earliest possible moment. It is easier to bookkeep the enemy at that time, for they know very little about your hand. If the opponents know just what is going on, proper timing may leave them behind.

West opens the jack of hearts, and you count your tricks. One spade, two hearts, five diamonds (if one trick is given up), and a club or two if nothing untoward happens. You have only eight tricks without the club, as you will certainly need to win one club trick for the contract.

The proper play is to lead the first trick in dummy with the ace of hearts and lead the club at once. If East has the ace of clubs, he will be practically sure to play low. This allows you to steal the ninth trick there and then with the king of clubs.

Having stonied that trick, you abandon the club. You now lead a low diamond and play low club. You cannot steal a club trick in this situation, for East will be quick to pounce on the setting trick.

Daily Question. Partner opens the bidding with one diamond and the next player spades. You hold: Spades A, J, 9, 4; Hearts K, Q, J, 6, 5; Diamonds 8, 4; Clubs 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1. What do you say?

Answer: Bid two clubs. You expect to bid spades later, thus indicating that the clubs are longer than the spades. This "reverses" bid shows a very strong hand.

### Bolton 18-Teacher Staff Approved By Board for 1958-59 Year

The Board of Education voted at its meeting Monday to authorize an 18-teacher staff for the 1958-59 school year. Predicted enrollment at this time for the year is 480 pupils.

There will be three classes in Grade 1; three in Grade 2; two in Grade 3; two in Grade 4 and a combination Grade 5 and 4; two classes in Grades 5, 6 and 7 and one in Grade 8. The combination grade is expected to include 23 pupils.

In order to accommodate the 18 classes in the 17-classroom school, the school library will again be moved from its quarters to the temporary basement classroom once occupied by a Grade 4 class. The staff at the school this year includes 13 teachers. However, it may be necessary to hire an additional five teachers since two of the present staff may not be able to obtain sufficient credit to retain temporary teaching positions if they are not held.

Regional District Offer  
The Board of Education filed a letter from John Yeoman, chairman of the Board of Education for Regional District 8, which said the region can furnish a number of teachers which the local Board could install its own teachers or the region can accept pupils of Grades 7 and 8 on a tuition basis.

The Board was also advised by parents of Richard Rose that he has been enrolled at the Regional District High School since October. Transportation costs to the school are being borne by the family.

Alph Scudieri, Manchester architect, has been engaged to prepare plans and specifications for venting the boiler room to reduce excessive heat conditions in the classrooms above. An appropriation of \$1000 was encountered in last year's budget for costs of such a project.

Superintendent of School George Graf advised that Andrew Wisnawski, a local staff member, attended a meeting of the Vernon Vocational Agriculture Committee Monday to become acquainted with the program to be offered in the new school now under construction.

The superintendent also reported that a special exhibit of facilities and equipment for kindergarten, elementary and industrial arts schools will be on display in railroad cars at the Hartford freight depot March 10 and 11. The Board learned through the school nurse's report that an outbreak of measles and chicken pox at the school had involved just about every pupil in Grade 1.

The principal, Richard Mather, reported furniture for the teachers' room is expected to arrive any day. He also spoke of the applicant need for additional clerical help.

Reading Program Described  
Mrs. Pearl Garland, Grade 2 teacher, and George Leminski, who teaches Grade 6, reported on methods of teaching reading. Mrs. Garland stressed repetition and repetition as important at the grade level and commented the children receive more words easier in sentences than they when the words are isolated. She demonstrated such on the drill book and the word games used, commented on maturity levels and their effect on reading progress and also noted that outside experiences are extremely helpful in comprehension of reading material.

Leminski, who abbreviated his report because of time consumed and long agenda of the Board, said word attack was important at the Grade 6 level where quick recognition of words is expected. He described the breakdown of his class into three groups which he finds most efficient. The most advanced readers work on difficulties in word attack; the middle group works for comprehension and the less accomplished on basic word attack. A primary attack on reading with much work on phonics.

The Board adjourned at 11 a.m. until Thursday evening when they will meet to consider the teachers' salary proposal.

he that people want to put their houses in order and get rid of debt before they feel any real recession effects.

A United Auto Workers' official, Local 847, Los Angeles, said: "I tell our laid-off aircraft people: Conserve your money and don't get into debt until the job situation improves."

A welfare official in the South— "It seems to me the average mid-westerner follows to better off now than he was in 1954. Then, so many saved payments and they were terrified they'd lose everything in the house. More seems to be paid for now."

The "How's Business" survey indicated that in spite of Washington's well-publicized warning of a recession, credit is tighter for millions of lower-income consumers.

But the high-quality borrower or installment buyer is being wooed by stores and banks as he has not been since the credit crunch of 1955. A Charlotte, N. ### Coventry 39 Mill Tax Rate Set By Board of Finance

A new tax rate of 39 mills for the next fiscal year starting in July was set last night by the Board of Finance.

The new rate is an increase of one mill over the present 38 mill rate.

The rate was based on the net grand list of \$11,846,023 as revised by the Board of Tax Review.

The town will raise about \$461,826 in taxes from the new rate based on the net grand list to cover expenses for the next fiscal year.

### Fast Buck Boys Sell Ads in Phoney Papers

The fast-buck boys are all right for more than 300 of the largest in three pitching the latest racket reported to the Chamber of Commerce involves advertising in phoney papers.

John P. West, executive vice president of the Chamber, said he has received numerous complaints from local businessmen who have been approached lately by fast-buck promoters seeking to sell worthless advertising.

West said these bogus labor publications have no bona fide connection with organized labor and depend for their success upon the gullibility and timidity of business labor trouble.

Here's how the racket works. West said: "The phoney labor publication editor may start his pitch with the claim that he represents an AFL-CIO paper. After prating this prospect as a known friend of labor, he may urge cooperation in some special campaign such as fighting communists, or even racketeering in labor.

Advertising is solicited, and if resistance is encountered the editor may imply that labor difficulties will result. Thousands of businessmen in the country have authorized advertising in such publications grudgingly for fear of getting into possible labor difficulties.

West said the organized labor movement has been fighting a long running battle against this racket with the editors of honest union publications in the forefront of the fight.

These editors have largely carried on the battle through the International Labor Press Association (AFL-CIO), a professional organization made up of the editors

of more than 300 of the largest AFL-CIO publications. Its code provides that member publications will not claim affiliation with the national AFL-CIO, will not employ high pressure long-distance telephone salesmen, or accept or publish advertising obtained through such methods. It will not claim or imply that purchase of advertising space will aid any cause beyond its advertising purpose, will not be identified with any year book, directory or program used to solicit donations in the guise of selling advertising.

"If solicited by any publication violating any of these provisions, we are urged to find out the true nature of the publication before considering any advertising in it."

West said the local Chamber will be glad to check on the matter for them.

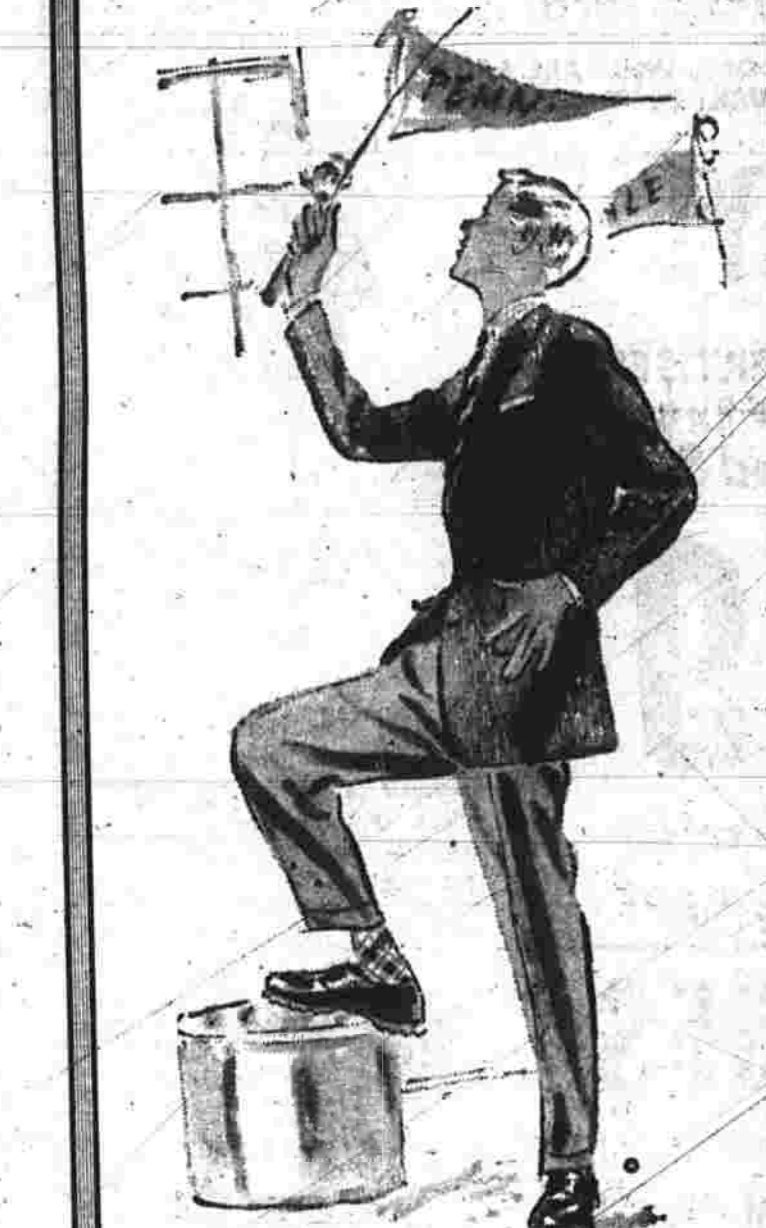
