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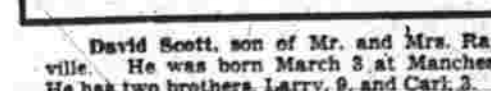

Changes Would Drop Library Addition Cost

Changes which could save \$75,000 in construction of the new Cheney Library addition were suggested Friday by members of the Library Board and the Building Committee.

The boards met to decide on a course of action on the addition which was rejected by voters in a June 29 referendum. The Board and the Building Committee met this morning to discuss the matter.

General Manager Richard Mann had received a request for final plans from architect Henry Kelly of New Haven. The Library Board, however, was reluctant to terminate Kelly's services until they decide what will be done about building the addition.

The Rev. Howard C. Champe of Shelton Congregational Church, who formerly led parades in Hebron and Lebanon, has submitted his resignation as chairman of the church, to take effect June 1 of this year.

The Rev. Champe says in his resignation that he has spent nearly 12 and a half years with the Shelton church, and that they have been some of the happiest of his life.

Mrs. Gloria Berman of the Building Committee suggested structural brickwork in the rear of the addition.

Gilmore N. Cole, secretary of the building committee, suggested that only a portion of the construction be done immediately, and also in winter.

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Democrats Launch Election Campaign

Hartford, March 10 (AP) — Connecticut Democrats have launched their campaign to retain control of the governor's office, capture a U.S. Senate seat and win other State and local offices.

At their annual Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner here Saturday an estimated 1,500 Democrats gathered on a rooftop which cost from \$25 to \$100 a plate.

1. Pledge to Gov. Abraham Ribicoff call for a clean campaign, a hard-fought campaign and, especially, unity among Democrats.

2. Labeled to U.S. Sen. Henry Jackson (D-Wash.) attack the Republican administration for what he termed its "overreach" in domestic policies and its inability to stand pat on foreign issues.

3. Viewed at the head table, three men who were running for the Democratic statewide nomination and who, in part, were running for the State's first statewide primary election on June 2.

The candidates, who each received an unofficial 10-second applause when they were introduced, are: Former Congressman Thomas Donohoe of West Hartford, both of whom announced their candidacies for the nomination.

He said that he would be running against Benton, his long-time business and political associate, and who had been in the State for 20 years.

But as for being back in politics before a special session of the Legislature, he also said he had been very encouraged by talking with several Democrats around the State. He said he had seen a number of Democrats in the State since returning early Friday.

But he cautioned the Democrats not to try to rub salt in the Democrats' wounds.

"The Democrats are not going to win this election," he said, "but they will win the hearts and minds of the people and get out of the State."

The three main issues he said would be the State's economic condition, the State's educational system and the State's political system.

He called the Democratic Party the party that "brings the best of the State to the people."

"Even the Republican cannot get along without us," he said. "Only when the nation has no momentum under Democrats can it afford to coast on its laurels."

The meeting is in all right when there are no riots in the streets, but you can't coast on laurels.

The Democratic Party candidates didn't enter into formal debate, but they did have a series of questions and answers in connection with the dinner.
