BUFFING OUT LONG SUIT PROVIDES TWELFTH TRICK
By Alfred Sheinwold
What would you think of a player who took all thirteen tricks in today's hand after the opening lead of the jack of spades? Would you call him a good player or a lucky player?

Strangely enough, no expert would think of a hand such as this. Any player who took all the tricks would surely be a bad player having a lucky five minutes.

You can make all of the tricks only by taking a trump finesse. If that finesse should lose, you would be down one to your vulnerable hand contract. Since the odds are not quite even on the finesse, you stand a very good chance of losing the hand.

The correct play is to put up the queen of spades at the first trick and to win the ace when East covers with the king. Then you draw two rounds of trumps with the ace and king. Naturally, you hope to drop the queen of spades, but you do not do so when this first attempt fails.

You return to your hand by leading the ace of hearts and then the ace of clubs. You then lead a club in order to ruff another diamond trick setting up dummy's lead. You finally get back to dummy by leading the ace of hearts at the last diamond. On this you toss away your losing spade, and the plan is now unbeatable.

This line of play gives you odds of about 5 to 1 in your favor, far better than the odds on the trump finesse. The best advice for success in bridge is to play with rather than against the odds.

'Preacher' Dow Seen Old Hebron Character

Editor's Note: From time to time, Miss Susan Pendleton, Manchester Evening Herald, writes of historical events in her town. Today, she writes of a letter penned some years ago by Anne W. Tilton, which tells of the peculiar activities of Lorenzo Dow, an itinerant "abolitionist" preacher, who resided in the Hope Valley Section of Hebron for 48 years and then left in 1853. Dow was born in Coventry, in 1777 and traveled widely. He married twice, lived in Hebron, and died in 1854.

Another letter written by the late Anne W. Tilton, a number of years ago, which unfortunately was undated, contains some historical bits which are worth quoting. It is one she has already heard them.

"In all stories," she says, "concerning Lorenzo Dow, I can remember only a few, and cannot vouch for the authenticity of any of them."

The story about his "Women Rule Within" is told many times to me, is that Lorenzo lived with his second wife, Lucy Dolbear, in Hebron, in the house belonging (at that time) to Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Henry A. Jones.

It seems that there was a carpenter's shop across the road from the house, and one morning passers-by saw smoke coming from the pipe in the building, and saw a sign in the door yard of the house which bore the inscription "Women Rule Within." I think it was about the time he wrote his celebrated treatise on "Petitcoat Government."

It should be stated here that the story of "Women Rule Within," or as usually quoted, "Women rule here," is told in Montville as well as Hebron. Lorenzo and his second wife took up their residence in Montville, later on, in a fine house some house owned by his wife Lucy. The house is still standing but has been made over into a hotel.

Coffinless Burial Denied
Susan claims that the body of Lorenzo's first wife, Peggy, was buried without a coffin. But he must be mistaken here, since Dow, in his autobiography, speaks of her coffin, which was wrapped in burl after the old-fashioned manner, which he thought, resisted decay longer than any other material. He thought the day of judgment was coming pretty soon, and he wanted his Peggy to be among the first to rise.

Susan's letter continues: "She is buried in the Burrows Hill cemetery in Hebron. Her alone bears the inscription, 'Here lies the body of Peggy Dow, who shared the trials and vicissitudes of Lorenzo Dow 15 years and then died.'"

"One characteristic to be noted in Lorenzo's make-up, according to tradition, was that he always kept his word. If he made a bet, he always placed his money on the 'God willing, I will reach here again,' he would be there."

Sergeant-Mom Duo Dispense Charity by Ton

Tonggu, Korea—A mother in Emmett, Idaho, and her soldier son with the First Cavalry Division are making food donations to Korean orphanages, a ton at a time.

"It certainly doesn't take her a week to collect a ton that way," reports Lee, citing the canning company that gave 18 gallons of whole kernel corn and a like amount of canned applesauce. All Idaho dairy furnished 100 pounds of dried milk and another company provided four 100-pound bags of wheat.

Even the shipping charges are being absorbed by generous business concerns. A trucking firm has offered to carry all food shipments to the West Coast, where from Portland, Ore., a shipping company has agreed to carry the food to Inchon, free of charge.

"The story of Lorenzo's acquiring his second wife, only a few weeks after the death of Peggy, is that he was preaching in Montville and after the sermon he asked if there was a woman there who would marry him."

Lucy Dolbear got up and said "I will, and so they were married and lived unhappily ever after."

Lorenzo's death occurred while he was on one of his preaching tours, and he is buried in the beautiful Oak Hill Cemetery in Georgetown, Md. Susan says there is a manufacturer legend that he was buried in an upright position.

The story is told in his first wife, Peggy, in the Burrows Hill Cemetery, but this is opposed by Lucy, who said it would cost too much.

Of Susan, it is said that while he was a Representative from Hebron in the Legislature, he kept that august body in roars of laughter much of the time.

Susan, who lived in the Hope Valley section of Hebron for 48 years, was probably the best authority on the Dow stories.

Legislature Recess Hit By Ribicoff

hold public hearings, and when it should recess and adjourn.

The Governor said further, "In all fairness," he could understand the Legislature's position on the unemployment compensation bill. He said that if the federal government would have a hearing on the Connecticut issue, the Legislature could act on many proposals, including the highways and public works program.

The Governor said he did not support the bill for a special session. He said that "subsequent events would have more than justified the action."

Sen. John P. Wadsworth, who introduced the bill, said that action will be taken by Congress in the very near future to step up the program of grants to the states for highway purposes, but we do not know what the nature of Connecticut's share will be.

"Similarly," he said, "two proposals with respect to unemployment compensation are pending in Congress. Further, I understand that the President will submit a recommendation to Congress on unemployment compensation within the next few days. But I cannot be sure just what which of these proposals will be adopted and just how the proposal will affect our unemployment compensation law."

They said that anything that might do so in unemployment compensation might eventually result in increased costs only to Connecticut employees, whereas any extension of the federal program might make a number of Connecticut employees unemployed.

For these reasons, they continued, they would seem to be other intelligent course of action than to recess pending further information as to what the federal government's program will be.

"It seems clear," they said, "that the program will be continued by continuing to convene the Legislature at this time when no constructive action can be taken."

They said they hoped that by the time the session reconvenes on April 7, they will have sufficient information as to the federal program to make possible the formation of an intelligence receiving program for Connecticut.

They said that committee hearings and executive sessions would continue during the recess. They said that the Governor's program for taking unemployment compensation means to have little chance of passage.

The decision to seek a recess was disclosed by Sen. Wadsworth after a meeting with other high-ranking GOP leaders. Sen. Chairman Clarence F. Baldwin, explaining the more constructive "don't want to penalize Connecticut industry by hasty action."

The General Assembly, called into special session by the Governor to do something about the state's increased unemployment, began its third week yesterday with a continuation of public hearings.

A session of the Finance and Revenue and Budget Committee heard testimony on one phase of Ribicoff's broad plan to step up the state's economy—a \$120 million appropriation for an accelerated highway program.

The principal witnesses were State Finance Commissioner George J. Conklin, Highway Commissioner Newman T. Agraves, and State Treasurer John Otis Viano.

Conklin and Agraves urged approval of the proposed highway program. But Otis Viano warned against it.

The Treasurer said additional bond issues could possibly damage the Connecticut credit rating in the bond market.

Ribicoff has also proposed a public works program as a booster to the economy and a broad agenda of increased unemployment benefits.

Regional District 8 District to Receive \$897,600 In State Grant for School

Regional District 8 will receive a state building grant of \$897,600 for school buildings in the district, announced today.

The grant was approved by the State Board of Education and received from Charles F. Pritch, director of Field Services for the State Department of Education.

Payments of the grant will be made in 20 equal installments with a first payment of \$44,880 expected to be made in mid-April.

The grant was estimated on the basis of the number of pupils to be accommodated in the district. The total is derived on the basis of \$700 per high school pupil, or \$745,400; plus an extra \$100 per pupil for regional districts, totaling \$112,200.

A combined total of these figures is less than half of the \$1,925,000 available for regional districts in the state.

According to laws governing state building grants, they are given on the basis of aid per pupil or one half the building cost, whichever is less.

The building has an approved total of 43 classrooms.

Formulas for accepting the grant will be concluded when the board is to vote its approval at the next regular meeting Monday.

At the regular meeting this week, the board voted that the school year should not include more than the 187 days, as voted by the Heron Board of Education.

The pact was signed by Nguyen Duan, director of Viet Nam's foreign-trade office, and Kunitachi Yamamoto, president of the Japanese International Trade Association. Japan has no official diplomatic trade relations with North Viet Nam.

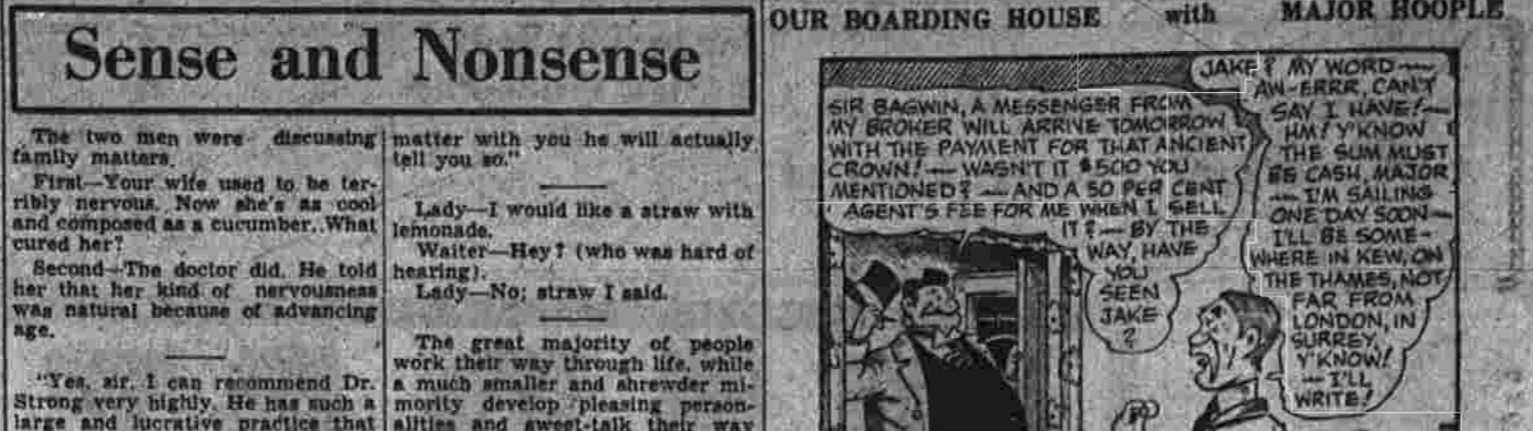
