Potential Mediator
The departure of United Nations Secretary General Hammarskjold for Moscow brings a new element into the international discussions of a prospective summit conference.

This summit, which will have more to do with the final arrangements for a summit conference, and with the possibility of some economic development for such a conference than anything that has happened so far in the long history of relations between the two superpowers.

The Secretary General holds the potential position of dispassionate mediator. If he should quietly report to us that his conversations with Moscow seemed to him to indicate a Russian willingness to move in a certain direction, or perhaps to entertain a bargaining process, we would have every reason to respect and trust his judgment.

Secretary, Moscow, if it is interested in an impartial assessment of what is in the mind of the West, or of what the West really thinks, it can get from the Secretary General an opinion much more accurate and informative than the open pronouncements any American statesman is likely to give.

This role of an intelligent good offices mediator, not taking sides but perhaps taking the best of each side to the other, is one which befits the positive responsibilities of the chief administrative officer of the United Nations. It is also one for which Hammarskjold himself has, by this time, had considerable experience, and one in which he has developed a certain modicum of success.

If there is hope of a really fruitful summit conference, the Secretary General may be the one to discover it, and help guide it. There have already been times when this world has had to thank the existence of the United Nations for its task, because it has been the only instrument available for the prevention of war, which must otherwise have spread. We may be on the eve of another occasion for gratitude that the world organization exists, with a chief officer soundly, discreetly, but persistently dedicated to its great purpose.

Steer Prices "Confident"
An editorial in a British publication the other day labeled this the "Confident Reaction." The editorial happened to be surveying the economic situation from the point of view of the whole free world rather than from the point of view of the United States alone.

And it thought it found some historically healthy conditions throughout the free world market. When it looked at the United States, in particular, the editorial focused on the behavior of our stock market, which, while it might leave something to be desired, hardly seems to reflect any desperation on the part of our supposedly smartest investors.

But for confidence in the midst of recession the outstanding example, we submit, was provided by the Chicago stock market the other day, when an especially fine carload of steers went for a price of \$38 a hundred pounds or more, 25 cents under the previous all time high, which was paid on April 16, 1952.

This, of course, was choice stuff, destined for consumption in the best hotels and restaurants, at the finest prices. But on the same day, the price of other grades of meat, heading for the retail market, also scored advances.

Whereas the ability of the stock market to hold its own, or occasionally show a little restlessness, is a reassuring symbol, this behavior on the part of meat prices at Chicago, stirring with an all time high, seems almost illogical. News without loss of driver's license will be a condition of the contract. The contract will be renewed only if the driver's physical condition is satisfactory. The requirement may cause some personal inconvenience to the drivers. "But I am sure they will be the first to agree that our first consideration should be for the safety of the 22,500 children who ride with them daily." "No more precious cargo can be entrusted to a public service operator than the child," Ribicoff said in a conference with the State Education Commissioner, William J. Sanders, and Chairman Robert I. Collins of the State Safety Commission, on the matter. "I have said that all agreed the requirement was of the best interests of the state and promoted their full cooperation. Sanders will notify School Boards of the order, he added.
