Wonders of the Universe Spinning Space Station Forms Type of Gravity

Articles in the first of a series of articles on "space cities" before the turn of the century space travelers decided the only way to travel in space to the moon or the planets was to first establish a space station as a base of operations.

They knew the escape velocity of the earth was seven miles a second. A tremendous amount of fuel was necessary to fight the gravitational pull of the earth.

These pioneers then hit on the idea of a satellite which would neutralize the force of gravity at a particular altitude. The speed necessary to do this was 7,000 m.p.h. or 11.2 miles a second. It was of course much easier to reach a speed of 7 miles a second than to reach 11.2 miles a second.

Without a station the possibility of going to the moon or the planets is remote indeed.

In addition to its value as a research station, a space station could be the most practical laboratory known to man.

It is estimated that a station 1,075 miles high, the station would be well above the atmosphere and at an altitude, scientists possess a perfect vacuum and a perfect temperature.

On the side of the station away from the sun the scientist has a temperature of 100 degrees below zero and he can readily create temperatures up to 1,000 degrees below zero.

First Basic Price Cut

Everybody has been commenting on the fact that this is a recession which seems to be bringing no relief on prices, and a good many economists have taken the view that the greatest single stimulant toward recovery that could be imagined would be a downward readjustment of prices.

Last Thursday, the first fundamental price cut of the recession appeared on the scene, and the first welcome to it seemed to classify it as an unfortunate device for the industry involved.

Perhaps the initial readjustment at this price cut—cut in the aluminum—was based on the fact that it was more a price-cutting device than a price-cutting device.

Politics, however, happens to be in the picture, and the new state primary law has raised the stakes involved in the potential effort of any leader to induce his own personal preference for the party than the party's interest.

In the light of the new primary law, the production of 1,647,710 tons, the price action will apparently have been met by the big American aluminum producers.

The present situation poses the problem of how, if the industry was considering a price increase necessary, it is going to be able to follow these basic lines in our belief, but with a greater difference than the difference between the ability of a man to store and after a series of illness.

The Great Incubator

The incubator is operated by putting grass or grain seed in the trays, where they are sown and grown by the science known as hydroponics, which means soilless growth. They are sown and grown by fluorescent lamps which give them artificial sunlight, by an air conditioner which keeps temperature and humidity just where a chemical solution which contains the nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium necessary for plant growth.

An incubator of this capacity will grow 45 tons of fresh green grass, inside the barn, a year. This would take care of the fresh green needs of a herd of 20 to 30 cows.

It would cost from \$10 to \$14 a ton to grow this grass. No more plowing and seeding of fields, no more fertilizing or more mowing, no more raking and pitching, or piling, no more rides to the barn, no more work in the sun, no more need for rain or fear of drought, no more racing with thunderbolts, no more anything.

Just a milk factory, with only one of his resources of the spirit, and 10,000,000 cookies each week will be made, which will be guaranteed the product will have a more life of at least three days.
