### Indonesian Civil War Headed For Draw-Out Showdown

By JOHN GRIFFIN  
Bukittinggi, Sumatra, April 2 (AP)—The Indonesian civil war appears headed for what may be termed a draw-out showdown. The result may be months or years of guerrilla warfare of the type of Indochina and Malaya. The Jakarta government is campaigning to crush the rebel regime that started with a strike toward key road centers in the Java area, 300 miles southeast of this mountainous rebel capital. In the north, Jakarta forces are poised to invade Tapaning province, crush the rebel forces of the vast rubber, tin and coal area of Sumatra, and drive south to Padang. If these moves are successful, the rebels will be cut off from their supply sources. If Jakarta attacks in strength, indications are that the rebels will give up Padang and move to the mountains. That will move the war a step nearer the guerrilla stage which is generally predicted and which is a reality in other rebel areas of East Sumatra. The outcome then will depend on a variety of factors. Here are some of the strengths and weaknesses of the opposing sides: Jakarta has the advantage of a stronger, more unified central army, with heavy guns and the support of an effective air force and navy. It has succeeded in isolating the rebels in relatively unimportant Western areas and setting or keeping the right kind of economic blockade. Jakarta's blockade has crippled the rebels' economic campaign and cut off the source of much rebel income. On the other hand, the rebels will give a reading of the local situation and a third rebel force will be sent here soon. ### Consumer Welcoming A Few Cuts in Prices

New York, April 2.—A few price cuts are appearing here and there today, even at the retail level. As welcome to the consumer as the price of a few commodities in those fields where recession to the consumer of most falls 25 cent of living goes on rising although in many lines industrial output has tumbled. This makes this one a very costly fluctuation, until they are finally passed along to him in inflated goods. For a long time now prices have gone only one way—up.

Now does the consumer care very much about the manufacturer's costs? He is interested primarily in the final price to him.

Lower prices at retail are still quite spotty and inconclusive, outside of the usual clearance sales and the running battle between the department stores and the department stores.

But now two large mail order houses are out with new catalogs, showing in a number of instances price cuts of more than 10 per cent since the start of the year. And a third says it is refiguring some price cuts, too.

Dropping of fair trade restrictions on retail prices by some makers of small home appliances has brought bargains—and savings—in these lines.

Surpluses in the oil industry caused gasoline prices to fall in a number of localities, although the industry is striving mightily to bring supply into balance with demand by cutting back production of crude oil to the lowest point in a long time.

Large inventories of un sold new cars have led many motorists to seek—and often to find—models to their liking at trade-in deals that are well below the suggested list prices of the car makers.

The latest big jump in the Government's cost of living index was blamed largely on higher food prices. These in turn were blamed on the bad winter in the South, which cut supplies of fruits and vegetables and on lower livestock prices shipped to market because ranchers were rebuilding their herds with the end of the long drought.

Later in the spring the fruit and vegetable shortage should be eased by new crops, and more livestock is expected to be shipped to market this summer and fall.

But the cost of living index went up for other reasons, too. The charge for services still increases. Transportation costs tend to go higher here and there. And rents haven't stopped their long slow uphill climb.

But the current popular theory that prices must rise and rise and that nothing can bring them down is far from proved. And the consumer can hope at least for a few more price cuts from time to time.

## Senate Gets \$1.8 Billion Roads Bill

Washington, April 3 (AP)—The House passed and sent to the Senate today a compromise \$1,800,000,000 anti-recession highway construction bill.

The Senate seemed likely to approve the measure today after the White House authorized Congress to start a 10-day Easter recess later today.

House passage was by roll call vote. The margin was 387-10.

Opposition in the House appeared to center on the provision for acceleration of the highway system.
