# Who to Attract? How? TDC Picks Firms, Plans Campaign

**(Third in Series)**

One of the major tasks facing the Town Development Commission when it set out to sell Manchester as a site for new industry was to learn thoroughly the market — industrial land, floor space, work units.

But that was only part of the job. The Commission had to decide what type of industry the town wants to attract, and most important of all, how to attract it.

Joseph Savick, the consultant named by the Commission to study the market, has now completed his report. The Commission will present it to the town in a few days.

These conclusions weren't just "spiced out of a hat" but were chosen only after a thorough and exhaustive search during which the 47 major industries in the United States were carefully examined as to qualifications.

**First Screening**

First of all the major industries listed in the U.S. Standard Industrial Classification Manual were screened to select those best suited to Manchester.

From the beginning basic industries such as mining, processing, refining, cement, steel and others were excluded as being "inappropriate and basically unsuitable" to the type of industry and character of the town.

Each of the remaining industries was then briefly examined on the basis of rate of growth and general characteristics. Outlets for the product, demand, and those unsuitable or whose requirements could "obviously be satisfied" in Manchester were eliminated.

Over 340 manufacturing industries of the original 477 failed to show a substantial over-all growth.

As a result of this further screening, a preliminary list of 121 industries was established which appeared suitable for Manchester.

This list included such diversified industries as ordnance and accessories, lumber and wood products, leather, stone, glass and rubber products, primary metal industries, machinery, transportation equipment and the like.

The search really began to get on a "scientific level" for these 121 industries were then submitted to statistical measurements such as the value added, rate of growth, importance to the national and New England economies, productivity, average size of establishment, productivity and concentration in New England.

The eventual selection of the preferred industries was based wholly on statistics, however.

Also taken into consideration were:

• Markets—whether it could be reached from Manchester and was adequate to support expansion.

• Labor—type used by the industry.

• Manufacturing Space—whether the industry would need new manufacturing buildings or could use former textile mill buildings.

• State of Development—industries in their early growth stages preferred to older mature industries.

Again industries were dropped as being unsuitable and those about 60, were recommended. These were closely examined for various economic reasons the number was again reduced to 41.

An even finer screen was then used and a final group of 20 industries was selected as offering the most attractive opportunities for expansion and growth in Manchester. All had experienced good growth rates and their products are of the sort which could be sold in both New England and national markets.

Among the industries listed were: Inorganic and organic medicinal chemicals, oil burners, domestic and industrial oil burners, conveyors and conveying equipment, computing and related machines, vending devices and supplies, instruments and related machinery, electrical control apparatus, radio tubes, optical instruments and lenses and fabricated plastic products.

Savick said his firm felt the Commission should concentrate its efforts on the electronics, pharmaceutical and plastics industries. Six closely typewritten pages accompanied the selection with reasons as to why these had been chosen.

**Brochure Described**

Here is the type of brochure recommended by Economic Development Association:

One page would be devoted to an introduction including the reason the material is being sent, additional information available and whom to contact.

Another page, covering all to eight pages, would list markets and distribution, transportation, cost, wage rates, taxes, utilities and industrial and residential resources.

Information on industrial sites would be given on as many pages as there are sites, including a "would be" data on size, location, description, soil conditions, adjacent highway, adjacent railroad, nearness of utilities, and transportation facilities. Included would be a descriptive map and an oblique aerial photo of the site.

"Next would be listed as many pages as necessary, available manufacturing space including a description, size, location, utilities, transportation facilities, layout, picture of either the interior or exterior if possible, other pertinent data."

Finally would be included a list of additional publications available, kept simple in format and designed to bring to the attention of industrial realtors, consultants and factory site location specialists industrial real estate and available industrial space for sale or lease.

The reason the firm recommends such a program, he said, is that the "industrial work in locating new factory sites or finding space for manufacturing plants is being handled by such realtors specializing in this field."

At the present time, Savick said, over 600 individuals and firms are represented in this work.

"As can readily be seen, he said, it would be a well-warranted effort to contact each of these individuals or firms to present the "Manchester story" and the information on available sites and existing factory space in the town.

The next best alternative, Savick said, must be a well directed and factual mailing program.

The mailing campaign is designed, he said, to put into the hands of these industrial specialists information, papers, chemicals, leather, stone, glass and rubber products, primary metal industries, machinery, transportation equipment and the like.

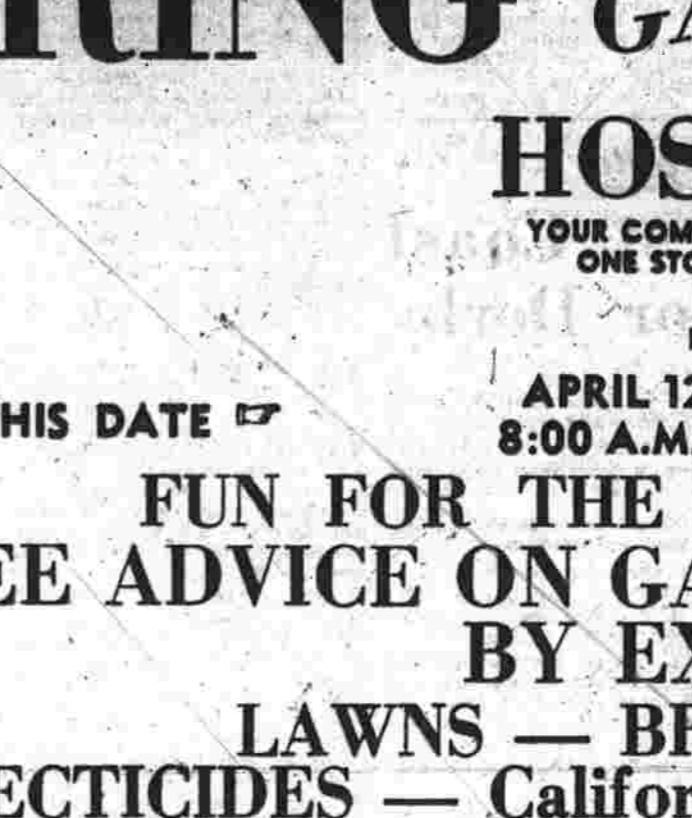
