SHUT OUT DANGER HAND WHILE DEVELOPING TRICKS

By Alfred Sheinwold

When you play a hand at no trump, which suit do you tackle first? The correct choice is often the longest suit, but length alone is not a sure guide.

West opens the five of hearts, and you put up dummy's queen. This holds the trick, and you draw the correct inference that West has led from a suit headed by the king. Which suit should you tackle first? Diamonds and clubs are the only candidates. You have seven diamonds and eight clubs in the combined hands.

From what has been said so far, you know that clubs are the wrong suit to tackle. Let's see what happens if you make this mistake.

Suppose you take the ace of clubs and finesse the jack of clubs. West wins with the queen of clubs and returns a heart. This allows West to set up the rest of the hearts. You are now in position to take two spades, two hearts, one diamond, and three clubs. This adds up to only eight tricks.

If you then go for a diamond trick, West will take the ace of diamonds and will take his good hearts. You will lose three hearts, one club, and one diamond. Down one.

Less to Safe Opponent

If you tackle the diamonds first, you will lose a trick to the safe opponent. West wins the second trick with the king of diamonds and cannot afford to lead another heart. If he does, you will get three heart tricks instead of two.

Suppose West shifts to a spade as good a defense as any. You win in dummy with the ace of spades and lead another diamond. This time your finesse works.

Now you can switch to clubs. You take the ace of clubs and lose a finesse to the queen of clubs. East returns a heart, and you take the ace. You are in position to take nine tricks: three in clubs, and two in each of the other suits.

The important lesson of the hand is to develop tricks in such a way as to keep the dangerous opponent out of the lead. West is dangerous, because he will lead through the ace of hearts. West has a chance to cannot afford to lead up to the ace of hearts.

Ashtma and Emotions

Q. Ever since I was a child I have been a sufferer from asthma. It is most cases of asthma and other allergic conditions, some type of sensitivity or allergy can be found. However, the healthy body functions as a unit with each organ working as a part of a well-oiled machine. Put sand in the machine and a person with emotional and nervous system soon get out of kilter. This does not mean that asthma sufferers need treatment for mental troubles in order to get well but outlook or attitude can be an important factor in many diseases.

Q. Is wheezing always a sign of asthma?

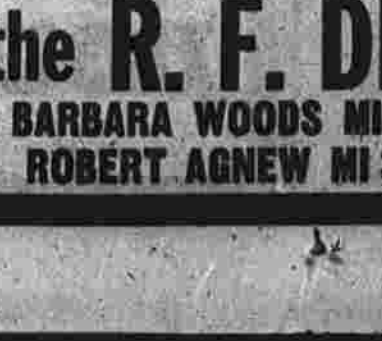

Sen. Knowland Set To Try Again for Labor Safeguards

Washington, April 25 (AP)—Facing almost certain defeat, Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) fought on today in an effort to win favorable legislation about provisions in a bill aimed at regulating employee welfare and pension funds.

In a session lasting until late last night, Knowland was beaten on four efforts to put what he called "Labor Bill of Rights" provisions into the relatively non-controversial bill. His amendments were defeated by margins ranging from 16 to 20 votes.

But Knowland, the Republican Senate leader, told newsmen he would offer at least six more amendments tomorrow.

The first test of the day was due to his proposal to bar any discrimination by a labor union against workers because of race, color, national origin, religion or sex.

The bill under consideration would require reporting of full disclosure on operations of welfare-pension funds and would provide criminal penalties for any false reporting or looting of such funds.

Knowland is trying to tack on his "union democracy" amendments, contending that is the only effective chance for such legislation this year.

Several other Senators also planned to add various amendments. And the Eisenhower administration has indicated that it would support amendments proposed by Sen. Hiram Boren (R-Okla.) and Sen. Charles McNair (R-Ind.).

The Democratic-led coalition argued that far-reaching labor proposals should not be considered until the hearings have been held until the proposals have been given detailed study in committee.

Democratic leaders promised that hearings will start next month and that broad labor legislation will be brought to the Senate floor in June.

These were the Knowland amendments defeated today: 1. To require secret ballots in election of union officers and limit their terms to four years. Rejected 23-37.

2. To limit trusteeship of local unions established by a parent organization to one year and to provide that the funds of a local in trusteeship must be used for its benefit. Rejected 23-37.

3. To make it illegal to use a middleman, as a go-between, in deals involving an employer and union members. Defeated 52-35.

4. To allow the secret of a labor law to make public information that unions are required to file on their financial activities and contributions, and to require him to check the accuracy of such data. Rejected 52-35.

Knowland had pending an amendment which would permit 15 per cent of a union's members to force recall of officers and on key policy decisions or strike calls.

U.S. to Try For Arctic Sky Check

United Nations, N. Y., April 25 (AP)—The United States was reported today planning to renew pressure on Russia for East-West aerial inspection in the Arctic against surprise attacks.

Usually reliable diplomatic sources said the U.S. delegation will ask soon—possibly today—for a Security Council meeting Tuesday to discuss an inspection resolution.

Aerial inspection of the Arctic was part of a western disarmament package offered to the Soviet Union last summer in the U.N. Disarmament Commission.

Russia turned it down and has refused since then to discuss disarmament proposals.

Renewal of the Arctic open skies offer at this time apparently was proposed by the U.S. delegation to the Security Council last week.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko charged in Moscow April 15 that Arctic flights toward Russia of U.S. bombers with nuclear weapons were provocative and might touch off World War III.

After a 6-hour Security Council debate in Russia failed to win U.S. support for its resolution, Soviet Delegate Arshady Sobolev withdrew the Soviet complaint.
