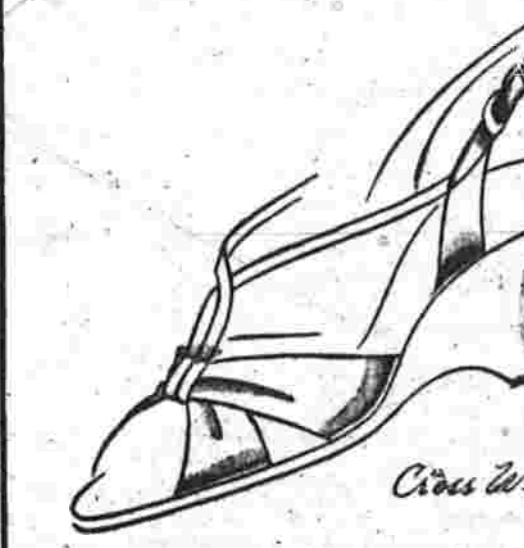

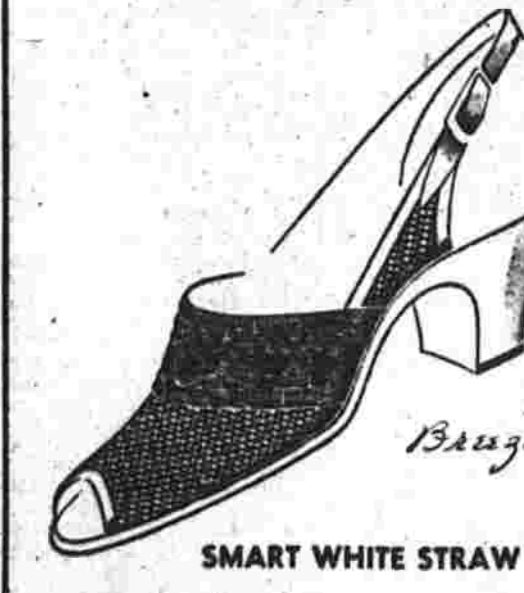

Dr. Strong Tells Rotarians Of Problems in Education

Problems existing in the education of our youth were presented to an audience of Manchester Rotarians at the Manchester Rotary Club last evening. Dr. LaVerne Strong, curriculum director of the State Department of Education, presented several problems without giving any answers.

Increasing enrollments, need for teachers, the necessity for curriculum reevaluation and recent magazine articles on education were mentioned in Dr. Strong's talk.

"We talk today about education being big business," said "One thing we never lack is clients."

Dr. Strong revealed a study he had made by the Southern New England Telephone Co. which estimates Connecticut will have a population of 3 million persons by 1980. She pointed out the need for more school buildings, more books, more supplies and more teachers.

Correlating the increase in these things will be a rise in cost of individual items, and an increase in total cost.

Another problem complicating the increase in school budgets will be the increase in the number of years of age who have state incomes and will be unable to pay higher taxes. Dr. Strong said 65 per cent of Connecticut's population will be 45 or older in 10 years.

Four sources Dr. Strong mentioned four sources for Connecticut teachers - teachers colleges, women who return to teaching after raising a family, teachers who move here from other states, and recent graduates from liberal arts colleges who take an intensive summer course in education.

In the next 10 years, according to Dr. Strong, Connecticut will need an additional 16,000 teachers.

"Your school system will only be as good as the teachers you have."

She brought home the point that Connecticut needs experienced teachers as well by telling of one first-grade class which had never had an experienced teacher, and was having difficulty in reading. Another class, this one a first grade, got very little out of a whole year of schooling, because seven teachers were assigned during the single year, as the result of teacher drop out.

Dr. Strong attacked recent articles in Life magazine as "emotional" and distorted.

She said in particular one article by Sloan Wilson said the U.S. spends more money in education than any other country. She said this was "not true." Russia spends more than this country for education.

Dr. Strong was even more vehement in slammng the general public which, she said accepted the articles without criticism or analysis.

She also berated parents who want the best education possible for their children individually, but who renage on paying for such education collectively.

"I don't know of a high school that doesn't require the parents to sign the report cards. Where have the parents been all this time?"

She concluded by saying an investigation of all colleges should be undertaken, to determine which ones have educational standards comparable to smaller centers as Yale and Trinity. Such centers, she said, have educational standards to take care of the excess of brainy students who are rejected by the big universities, she concluded.

Finance Board Grants Fees For Town Office, Vault Plans

Action taken by the Board of Finance last night indicates the town may soon be asked to take the first steps toward construction of a vault and town office in the Community Hall.

First Selectman Charles A. Robinson requested and was given approval of an appropriation of \$2,000 for architect's fees subject to vote of a town meeting. Selectman Robinson said he planned to include the town office proposal in a town meeting anticipated soon on the School Sites Committee's new report.

The Sites Committee, which has been investigating the relative merits of several parcels of land in town, is expected to be ready to make its report within a few days.

In other business last night, the Board of Finance increased three appropriations. The general highway account was increased by \$1,000. Additional highway expenses this year not chargeable to town roads, and the opportunity to purchase a used and spreader for \$400 were the reasons for the increase. The sand spreader would cost \$1,500 if purchased new, the Board said.

Also increased was the town garage account for which an additional \$100 was voted. Replacement of an oil storage tank at the garage was estimated to cost \$1,000 at out of balance this year. It originally was a \$400 account.

An increase of \$300 was voted to the Civil Defense account. This was for the purchase of a new generator for the town. The Board noted that against an estimated \$1,200 for the generator, Federal Civil Defense contributions totaled \$1,222, making the net expense to the town \$98.

The Board also voted to reappoint E. N. Alexander and Co. of New London as auditors for the present fiscal year.

Rationing Ends In East Germany

Berlin, May 28 (AP)—Communist East Germany today scrapped food rationing cards introduced by Hitler in 1939 and boosted the wages of over three million workers to help them pay higher food prices. West Germany scrapped the ration cards 10 years ago. Premier Otto Grotewohl, fresh from the economic party of Soviet bloc leaders in Moscow, decreed the long awaited end to the rationing of meat, fat and sugar. They were the last three restricted items. A system of graduated living allowances also was set up, aimed mainly at helping the lower income brackets. Additional allowances were specified for children, pensioners, and housewives of lower paid workers. The government claimed the system would increase output from the collective farms and industry. But the 18 million workers were warned the 1958 production plan would have to be exceeded to compensate for the additional consumer outlay. Allied experts speculated that the Russians at the Moscow conference agreed to allocation of a bigger share of East German production to improve living conditions.

Stores Used 15 Years

Washington—An analysis of data gathered by the Census Bureau indicates that American families use electric refrigerators and gas or electric ranges, when bought new, for 15 years before replacing them. New washing machines are replaced after nine years. Second-hand appliances are kept only half as long as new appliances. Farm families keep all appliances except stoves longer than urban families.

Italy's Political Setup Unaltered After Elections

Rome, May 28 (AP)—Final election returns made plain today the pro-western Christian Democrats will continue to govern Italy, united in coalition with the minor Center parties or with their support.

The balloting Sunday and Monday for a new parliament left the political picture about the same. The Center and Extreme Left made small gains. The Monarchists lost heavily and the Fascists dropped sharply.

When the new parliament meets June 12, the Christian Democrats will be asked again to form a government. They have ruled since World War II.

Premier Adone Zoli is expected to step down and give Christian Democrat leader Amintore Fanfani a chance to become premier a second time. He held the job for 22 days in 1954. Zoli, a senator, got the job a year ago because he was a less controversial figure than the party leader.

The Christian Democrats took 273 seats in the dominant 596-member chamber of deputies, or 26 more of a bare majority. But they can count for support on most issues from the ally party figures that whose 46 seats could give the government a safe margin of at least 42.

The standing of the parties in the chamber will be: Christian Democrats 273, a gain of 11; Liberals 14, up 2; Social Democrats 25, up 4; Republicans 7, up 2; South Tyrol and Austria parties 5, no change; Communists 149, a loss of 3; Socialists 84, a gain of 9; Monarchists 29, down 17; MSI (Fascists) 28, down 4; others 2.

Most political observers agreed the Leftist advances stemmed in part from Russia's Sputnik achievement and the Communist campaign against atomic missile bases in Italy.

Union Rejects Offer
Bridgeport, May 28 (AP)—About 900 workers in the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America have rejected a company offer of a new contract to replace one which expired May 8.

There are three main points of disagreement: 1. Pension: The company offers \$5 more monthly across the board to each employee. The union asks \$12.

2. Welfare benefits: The union wants an increase in medical benefits to include family members. The company will grant it only to the worker.

3. The union seeks revision of certain job classifications. The workers, members of the Independent Federation of Utility Employees, approved a broad program for publicizing their position and a spokesman said a committee would meet next week to decide when the plan would be put into operation.

The company provides electricity to about 200,000 consumers between Westport and North Haven. It employs about 1,200 workers.

Columbia Woman Is Angel To Her 5 Foster Children

By ELEANOR TUTTLE
All of our time is a time have experienced fear in its worst form, but for five young Columbia children, four of whom are "terrible" play victims, fear was once a constant, evil companion.

But no longer. These youngsters, whose ages range from 6 to 14, learned to conquer the fears that loneliness and misunderstanding all in all. All credit goes to Miss Elsie Dunmuck who has shouldered the burden as their foster mother, giving them the love and confidence they all desperately need.

In her home on West St., which is surrounded by woods on one side and a beautifully landscaped pond on the other, Miss Dunmuck has devoted her life to caring for these children, one of whom is nearly completely crippled and another who spends nearly all her time in a wheel chair.

Miss Dunmuck, a quiet, spoken, handsome woman in her middle 40s, worked for several years at the Newton Home and Hospital for Crippled Children. While there she had charge of the cerebral palsy wing. Her heart went out to the children she saw there suffering from one of the worst child crippling horrors.

She often thought while at Newton that some of the more seriously afflicted youngsters would have a better chance in the warmth of family life. One day, in 1951 she decided to devote her life to caring for as many as she could accommodate in her home.

First to come to her when she lived in Willimantic were Dolores, 24, now 14, and Edward, then 2, now 10.

Dolores was unable to talk or walk when she arrived, but has learned to speak and although she spends most of her time in a wheel chair, she occasionally takes a few steps, guided by Elsie's firm but gentle hand.

At first, the fear that comes from being unable to do things most normal children do, kept her from accepting Miss Dunmuck. But gradually, with patience, the girl's new "mom" showed her that her heart was filled with love and Dolores gradually began to adjust to her new life.

Soon the move began to fill and Miss Dunmuck moved to Columbia. Steven, who is 6, came, and was joined by Paullette, now 14, and then Glen. All three are cerebral palsy victims.

Edward, age 10, is the only handicapped of her children. When he first came to her with Dolores, Edward was a bundle of fear. He would trust no one and would do nothing, afraid that by might be criticized.

It took weeks for Elsie in her kind way to start bringing the handsome youngster out of his shell. Now he attends school, is a member of the Cub Scouts and goes to Sunday school. He appears well on his way to becoming a useful, happy person.

Call is crippled and unable to talk clearly, but she can move about on her own. Paullette has improved so much in the time she has lived with Miss Dunmuck that she is now attending school. She is gradually overcoming her self-consciousness and enjoys her studies. It was difficult for her classmates to accept her at first, but now she and they get along as well on the playground as they do in the classroom.

Steven, the youngest, came to Miss Dunmuck when he was only 18 months old. He is the most badly crippled of them all.

It was told that nothing could be done with him. He was unable to perform even the most basic functions. But the patience of Miss Dunmuck, that God has given her the strength as he will to all who need it.

Her greatest thrill, Miss Dunmuck says, was when Steven first said "Ma." Now he says it quite often and even manages to say "Ma-Ma" when he would something urgent.

Full Time Job
Raising these children is truly a 24-hour-a-day job, but Miss Dunmuck has grown to love the responsibility. She seldom leaves them for any length of time and only does so when it is absolutely necessary. She even skipped a foster mother's dinner last week rather than leave them with a new baby sitter when her usual one was unavailable.

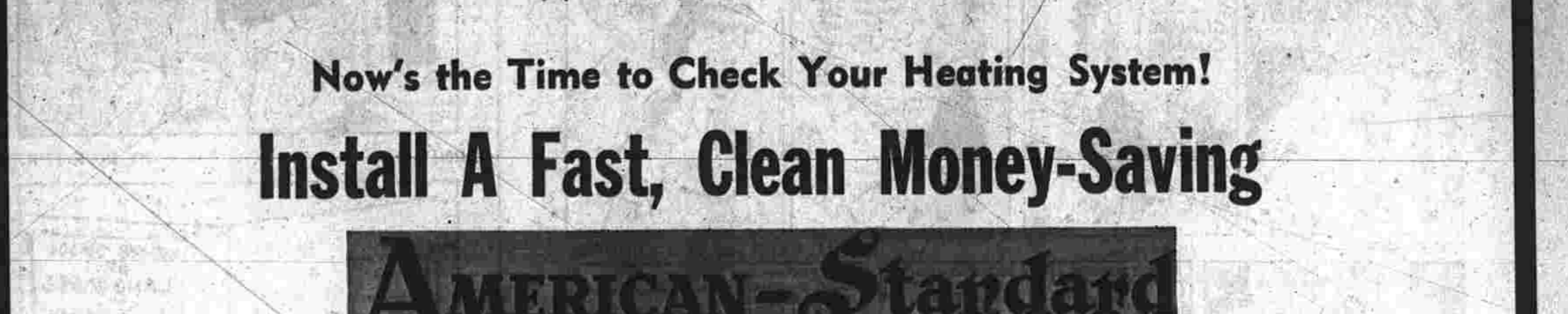

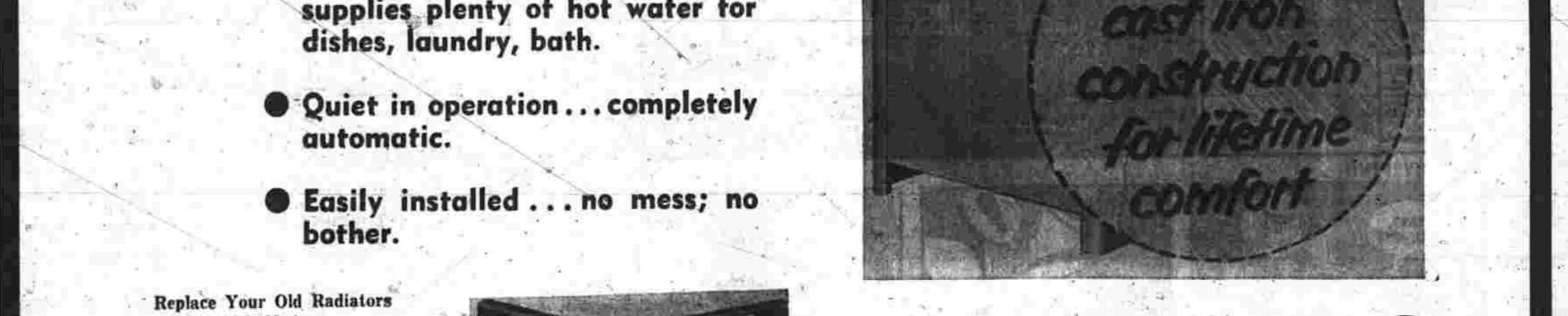
