Algeria Elections Set By De Gaulle Cabinet

over, have rejected his plan and announced they will continue their 15-year fight for independence. De Gaulle will ignore the national radio, probably next Saturday, to report to the French people on his trip to Algeria.

Matras said De Gaulle felt it very important to get the local elections under way quickly in Algiers.

The elections will fill the posts of mayor, town councils and other local administrative posts.

Although no specific date was set for the elections, Matras said the aim of the cabinet was to hold them in about one month.

The cabinet also planned to promote mass demonstrations of unity throughout France on June 25. This is the anniversary of the famous broadcast which De Gaulle made over the British Broadcasting Corp. network calling on France to continue the fight after it was overrun by the Germans in 1940.

The representation is continued under De Gaulle's forthcoming proposals for constitutional reform as it has been the case in Algeria which will have 150 representatives in the National Assembly, which now numbers 500.

Many feared 150 deputies, if unseated, would hold the balance of power in the National Assembly. De Gaulle's intention was to have a smaller proportion than a smaller of French. Arabic in the predominant language.

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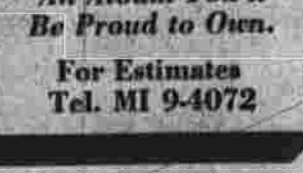
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
