4 More Americans Kidnaped in Cuba, 44 Others Still Held

Havana, Cuba, July 1 (AP)—A rebel raiding party kidnaped four more Americans in eastern Cuba today as two U.S. diplomats sought the release of 41 other Americans and 3 Canadians seized since Thursday.

The four were abducted by rebels from a United Fruit Co. sugar plantation at Guaro, near Preston, on the northeast coast of Oriente Province. Company officials said the rebels entered sleeping quarters of the combination sugar mill and agricultural experiment station about midnight.

The four men apparently were selected at random from a number of Americans on the plantation. They were Alfred F. Smith of Columbia, N. H., the agricultural superintendent; James P. Stephens Jr. of Edmond, Okla., assistant agricultural superintendent; Harley F. Sparks, of Lakeview, Ind., a district superintendent, and Jesse J. Ford, of Lakeview, Ind., also a district superintendent.

The rebel band, numbering from 30 to 40, drove boldly down out of the hills in trucks. The rebels took all the Americans they could find at Guaro. A fifth supervising employe of the company escaped kidnaping by being at Preston at the time of the raid.

There was no shooting and no one reported harmed. The rebels are believed to be under the command of Raul Castro, brother of rebel leader Fidel Castro.

There was no word on the diplomats' progress in dealing with Castro's forces for release of the others.

The United Fruit Co. office in New York said it had no report of the kidnaping.

The rebel high command reportedly was considering whether to give up the servicemen and civilians in exchange for the rebels in eastern Cuba beginning last Thursday night.

The decision was awaited by two U.S. consuls trying to deal with the rebel groups in Havana. U.S. embassy sources in Havana said the rebel band, numbering from

Jets, Mortars Pound Rebels In Beirut Hills

Beirut, Lebanon, July 1 (AP)—Jet fighters and mortars pounded rebels today in hills overlooking Beirut. The rebel advance toward the capital seemed to have been turned back by heavy firepower.

Mountain tribesmen who pushed into the hills five miles from Beirut International Airport were hit hardest around the village of Ainab.

The rebels, armed only with small arms, were brought under a steady barrage as the government swung up artillery, mortars, armored cars and jets.

The rebels were slowly pushed back in some areas.

The International Airport, which has not been closed during the fighting, seemed to be out of danger for the present. It is the only one in Lebanon from which the jet fighters can operate.

Sing Songs
Irregular forces loyal to President Camille Chamoun's pro-western government moved up to the hills in overloaded trucks and taxis, singing political songs and waving guns.

They later reported they had driven the rebels out of Ainab and were moving to take the village of Kabr Chemule, three miles away.

The irregulars, members of the right-wing Syrian Social National Party, admitted losing one man in the fighting and claimed the rebels suffered heavy casualties. A spokesman for the irregulars said they captured several rebels, three

Troops for Lebanon Termed Last Resort

Washington, July 1 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles asserted today the United States refuses to pay political blackmail for the release of Americans held captive in East Germany and Cuban Rebel territory.

The government hopes to obtain release by other means, he told a news conference.

Dulles also said that only as a last resort would the intervention of U.S. military forces in Lebanon be desirable or justified.

It is much better for the Lebanese themselves, working through Arab nations, to find a solution, Dulles said.

He added that he doubts whether it is practical—as the Pro-western Lebanese government has suggested—for U.N. troops in Lebanon to try to seal off the border with Syria.

More than 40 American citizens have been kidnaped by Cuban rebels, Dulles said the rebels' purpose is to produce United States intervention but this country will not intervene.

Alaskan Statehood Passed by Senate

Washington, July 1 (AP)—Alaska stood on the edge of statehood today—its 42-year fight near an end.

The Senate, in an overwhelming 64-20 vote accompanied by gallery applause, completed Congressional action last night to admit Alaska as the nation's 49th state.

Only presidential approval, expected tomorrow or Thursday, and formal acceptance of its terms by Alaskans are required to make statehood a reality.

Sponsors confidently predicted completion of these preliminaries late this fall, in time for the new state's two senators and one representative to be on hand for the opening of a new Congress next January.

The action portended the first change in boundaries of the United States since 1912 when statehood was extended to Arizona and New Mexico.

For Alaskans, statehood will mean that for the first time since the territory's acquisition in 1867 its residents will have voting representation in the House and Senate, can elect their own governor and state officials, and can vote for the President and Vice President.

Statehood also would give Alaska the right to select 103,500,000 acres of its area, including mineral lands, as a potential tax base for development purposes. This still would leave more than two-thirds of the new state in federal ownership.

At present more than 99 percent of the total area of Alaska is owned by the federal government, just as public lands such as the national forests are so owned. The new state would take over its chosen areas as the actual owner, with the right to sell the land, lease it or use it otherwise.

Mental Patient Slays 2 Police In Pawtucket

Pawtucket, R. I., July 1 (AP)—A former mental patient shot and killed two police detectives who stormed his house last night when he refused to surrender hours to authorities peacefully.

Police riddled the house with machine gun and small arms fire and blasted tear gas through windows after Lt. Thomas H. Truesdale, 58, and detective Emil Newberg, 56, were slain.

When no further gunfire sounded from the house, police entered and found Robert Genereux, 35, covering in a bedroom closet.

Truesdale and Newberg were among four officers who first entered the house in an attempt to disarm Genereux.

He met them with blasts from his .38 caliber pistol.

Both officers died a short while later in a hospital.

Truesdale was to go home after his tour of duty to mark his 58th birthday. Instead, his family was notified he died in the line of duty.

The siege began when neighbors of Genereux in a tenement section near R.I. 1 complained that he was firing shots into an unoccupied flat adjoining the house he shared with his mother.

Experts Begin Talks On Atom-Ban Police

Geneva, July 1 (AP)—Western and Soviet bloc scientists sat down today for technical talks on how to police a possible ban on atomic tests.

Eight nations—four from the West and four from the East—were represented in the talks at U.N. European headquarters here. They are the United States, the Soviet Union, England, France, Canada, Romania, Czechoslovakia and Poland.

Dr. James B. Fisk, head of the U.S. delegation, said the negotiators "embark with every hope, on what can well be an historic mission—to lay the essential technical basis for the important decisions which lie ahead."

Fisk said the purpose of the conference was "to study the technical problems of the important identification and identification of nuclear explosions."

"It is most important to have a common understanding of the technical problems which are involved in this question as a basis for further consideration by our governments of the important issues on which future decisions will be required," he added.

Red Supports Fisk
Yevgeni K. Fedorov, chief of the Soviet delegation, endorsed Fisk's statements limiting the talks to technical phases of atomic test control.

"Certainly we are not here to take up the matter of a test cessation," he said. "This is a matter for the governments to solve."

Fedorov said the experts here clearly understand the consequences to the world if atomic warfare were to break out or if test explosions continue unchecked.

He added that scientists once were reserved and kept aside but are now becoming more and more anxious about what is being done with the fruits of their work. They are becoming imbued with a new responsibility, he continued, and concluded:

"We are certain this new responsibility will be met."

Hartford, July 1 (AP)—The Republican candidate for comptroller today accused three top Connecticut Democratic leaders of violating the principle of the state's new primary law.

He is State Rep. Rodney E. Eliason of Trumbull, who is the House chairman of the State Legislative Elections Committee.

Denounces Charge
Dulles denounced as grotesque a Soviet charge that U.S. Air Transport planes which went down in Soviet Armenia last week had deliberately violated the Russian border. He noted that the plane was unarmed and driven by propellers rather than being a high speed jet aircraft.

Dulles also told his news conference:

"President Eisenhower possibly with radio-television appeals and other measures may launch a drive to restore 800 million dollars to the House-alashed foreign aid appropriation bill."

Dulles said that by the cut, the House appropriations committee had "posed a grave threat to the security of the United States" and denied ammunition to the government in its economic warfare with Russia. That was virtually a rerun of what Republican Congressional leaders reported Eisenhower said to them at a White House conference earlier.

Dulles, who will leave late Thursday for Paris talks with Charles De Gaulle, expects to discuss France's ambition to become a nuclear weapons power. He declined to say how he will explain to De Gaulle restrictions written into U.S. legislation which would let the government share some nuclear weapons secrets with Britain but not with France.

Circuit Court Gets Little Rock Dispute

St. Louis, July 1 (AP)—Sensitive racial segregation issues are now new to the eighth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which once again has the Little Rock case before it.

The U.S. Supreme Court reminded attorneys for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People of that yesterday. It refused to bypass the circuit court and act directly on an order delaying integration at Little Rock Central High School for two and a half years.

Girls 'Kidnap' Brother Slated For Adoption

Sun Valley, Calif., July 1 (AP)—"We are taking Baby Mike away. We won't let you give him away."

Two teenage girls held this note with their parents Sunday and disappeared, taking with them the 20-month-old brother they thought their parents no longer wanted.

Yesterday, a patrolman found Sandra Hill, 16, and her sister, Genevieve, 13, asleep under a tree in a Burbank Park, about five miles from their home. In their arms was Mike.

The officer recognized them from their mother's missing persons report. At Burbank Police Station Sandra explained to a policeman:

"We had to leave and take Baby Mike with us. Mama and daddy were going to adopt him out."

Police went to the Hills home in Sun Valley and found out why the parents had talked of putting the baby up for adoption.

"I can't see any other answer," said Lyle Hill, 44, a carpenter. "I can't get a job."

"Counting Mike, we have eight kids and we live in a house that was made for no more than two people."

Rent on the one-bedroom home due again Thursday. The current week's rent was paid by the Bureau of Public Assistance. But the bureau says it can't give the Hill relief payments because Mrs. Hill and the children only recently arrived in the area from Toledo, Ohio.

"I had to split the family up like this and arms and legs," Mrs. Hill said. "We didn't want to do that again, and we thought we'd let just the baby go."

The three children, a 7-year-old boy and two young girls, were taken to a police car. The girls said they had spent the night in an all-night movie and trudged through the hills, taking turns carrying their brother.

"I don't care now," Mrs. Hill said.

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Goldfine Expected To Be Spectacular

By JAMES MARLOW (AP News Analyst)

Washington, July 1.—Waiting for Bernard Goldfine to testify in the Little Rock case is like waiting for the launching of a satellite. The results of both are unpredictable.

This fast-talking, gift-giving millionaire friend of presidential assistant Sherman Adams is due to testify tomorrow before a Senate subcommittee looking into his relations with Adams and with government regulators.

The Washington Post in a special story from Boston Sunday outlined the efforts of Goldfine's lawyers to defame him for his appearance here gave a pretty clear impression he is a hard man to handle, even by his own lawyers.

One of them was quoted as saying: "He will make a terrible witness. He's hard of hearing and he doesn't answer questions well. He's not good with words."

"It is conditionally impossible for him to give a simple answer. You can't tell what will happen when he gets on the stand."

Even Goldfine's actions appear unpredictable. He had a date with his lawyers at noon. The Post said, and showed up at 6 p.m. The next night he did not show up at all.

Adams has said he let Goldfine pay hotel bills for him amounting to more than \$2,000, and before the Senate subcommittee said he had received visits from Goldfine in the home of an expensive oriental rug from Goldfine.

Spread Favors Widely

Adams described all this as part of a personal and friendly relationship extending back for years.

Goldfine, who came to this country as a poor immigrant, seems from earlier testimony before the subcommittee to have spread a lot of money and a lot of favors in a lot of places.

For example, Gov. Lane DeWalt, a former political associate of Adams, says Goldfine gave a suit of clothes to every governor in the nation at the 1956 governor's conference.

And John Fox, former publisher of the now defunct Boston Post, said he borrowed \$400,000 from Goldfine. Goldfine even sent a bolt of cloth to President Eisenhower whose press secretary, James Hagerty, said, Eisenhower gave it away.
