

U.S. Reds Seek Urgent Session

United Nations, N. Y., July 19 (AP)—The United States and the Soviet Union pushed today similar proposals with rival goals for an emergency session of the U.N. General Assembly on the Middle East crisis.

Finally, the Council voted down a Swedish resolution to suspend until further notice the activities of U.N. observers now in Lebanon to insure against infiltration. This resolution was the Soviet's "substantially altered" the objectionable situation. Nine members opposed it. Sweden and Russia supported it.

The chairman of the observers' group later announced in Beirut that he had changed his mind from the field because the Marines' landing had changed the rebel attitude toward cooperating. Weeks of work in building up public confidence in Lebanon may have elapsed, Gato Plaza Lazo said.

Lodge said the United States will not be "thwarted" by the veto and "believes that all available remedies must be exhausted." He then announced he would ask an assembly session.

Soviet Delegate Arkady A. Sobolev said he would support the resolution shared with the United States, but that he would not support it if it increased the danger of war.

Compromise Seen On Pentagon Plan

Washington, July 19 (AP)—Unanimous Senate passage spurred administration hopes today for Congressional compromise that would give President Eisenhower most of the broad powers he wanted to streamline the Pentagon's defense budget.

With a surprising burst of speed bipartisan leaders in the Senate last night passed legislation requested by Eisenhower to authorize a reorganization of the Defense Department.

The vote was 80-0 and came after only four hours of debate on the bill regarded as one of the most controversial before this session of Congress.

The measure now returns to the House which earlier approved a version containing some features strongly objected to by the President. If the House balks, as expected, at some of the Senate changes, the bill will go to a Senate-House conference committee for attempt at compromise.

Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), chairman of the Senate armed services committee, said changes made by his group go a long way toward overcoming the administration's objections.

Senators Prescribed

At the same time, he said the changes attempt to quiet fears that the secretary of defense would be given power to abolish or reduce the Marine Corps, naval aviation or the National Guard.

The Senate bill specifies that three are established by law and that advances Congressional authority is needed for a major revision.

Russell, who engineered Senate passage, said the upper chamber's passage would sharply curtail the conservative hickering and rivalry, as well as reduce costly duplications among the Army, Navy, Marines and Air Force.

"The overall contribution made by this bill will be one of greater military effectiveness," Russell said.

Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) said the measure would give Eisenhower the defense flexibility to handle such events as the Middle East crisis.

Bypasses Service Heads

The House change made by the Senate was elimination of a House requirement strongly opposed by the administration that the secretary of defense exercise his broad powers through the secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

In its place, the Senate version continues a requirement for separate organization of the three branches but spells out clearly that the secretary of defense is the top man in authority.

Russell suggested that if Secretary Neil McMillen has any trouble with civilian or military subordinates he either fire them or ship them to remote posts.

On the other hand, Russell said the Senate bill retains a close Congressional control over military roles and missions now established by law. Eisenhower had asked for broader authority in this field. But under the Senate bill, before these changes could be transferred, they would have to be approved by the House Armed Services Committee.

Legislative day today is expected to be a busy one. If either the House or the Senate passes a bill, the other will have to act.

However, if the two committees disagree, the bill will go to a conference committee.

Controversy Lingers On Did the Goldfines Visit Sherman Adams House?

Washington, July 19 (AP)—The New England textile manufacturer, who arrived on a note of controversy.

Goldfine, on reaching Boston, was asked for comment by a reporter seeking to clarify the conflicting statements.

Goldfine returned to home after completing night story days of testimony before a House Commerce subcommittee seeking to determine whether Goldfine had pulled federal strings in behalf of the New England textile manufacturer.

Adams admitted he accepted gifts and favors from Goldfine but denied doing anything to influence federal agency decisions on Goldfine's business affairs. Goldfine also emphatically denied favored treatment.

Iraqi Rebels Drop Jordan Link, Defy Hussein's Rule

Rebel Delegate Declares Iraq Friend of U.S.

United Nations, July 19 (AP)—The delegate of the rebel regime in Iraq arrived yesterday and declared "our friendship for the United States is still the same."

The United Nations was familiar ground for rebel delegate Hashim Jawad. He represented the overthrown Iraqi government in the United Nations until last fall.

Jawad said the rebel government is in a talk with reporters.

He said King Faisal II and Crown Prince Abdul Ilah were shot and killed only after they resisted Army officers who appeared at the palace.

Jawad said Premier Nuri, strong man of Iraq, was found later attempting to flee disguised as a woman. He asserted Nuri said he was also and killed when he attempted to fight it out.

Jawad denied that Faisal II, former Iraqi ambassador at the U.N., was killed, as reported earlier this week by U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge. He said Jawad was in jail awaiting trial along with other political leaders.

Jawad also denied Communists took part in the uprising, declaring "We are against Communism."

As for the future, he added: "There will be parties, there will be elections and there will be everything that we have missed for the past 10 years. We will have a welfare state."

Nasser Warns U.S. On Mideast Buildup

The revolutionary regime of Iraq has notified the United States that it has withdrawn from the Arab Union with Jordan.

Saleh Mahdi, ranking diplomat at the Iraqi embassy, said he informed the State Department of this in a note yesterday.

He said he acted on instructions from the rebel group which seized power in a lightning coup Monday.

The Iraqi withdrawal challenged the authority of King Hussein of Jordan who asserted after the Iraq revolt that he was now legal head of the two countries.

"As far as we are concerned, King Hussein has no relationship whatsoever with us," Mahdi told a reporter.

Mahdi said he delivered the note to Asst. Secretary of State William Rountree in a call at the department yesterday. Mahdi also told Rountree:

1. The new Iraqi regime is ready to cooperate with the United States to evaluate any of the 17,000 American troops in the country.

2. The entire staff of the Iraqi embassy has gone over to the side of the rebel regime and represents it instead of the former government headed by Prime Minister Nuri Saeid.

Mahdi said he saw no need for Americans to leave Iraq because "everything is calm and the government has control of every part of the country."

Despite this assurance the State Department is understood to be planning a withdrawal of the 17,000 American troops in the country.

Unconfirmed reports reaching Beirut today said that a dozen U.S. jet fighters with Russian markings had been seen at Damascus airport.

The reports could not be confirmed but added to the general tension gripping the area.

The report said a few "transports" were also seen in Damascus. Russian jets were also seen in Iraq and transports to the United Arab Republic of Egypt and Syria, both of which presumably now bear U.A.R. markings.

Prison Inmate Sues to Block Alcatraz Trip

Hartford, July 19 (AP)—A State Prison inmate who figured in the prisoner uprising at July, 1956, filed suit today to block an alleged transfer to Alcatraz.

Leroy Nash, 47, of Danbury, charged in U.S. District Court yesterday that he was threatened with transfer to the West Coast federal institution.

His civil suit asks \$40,000 damages for claims of "illegal deprivation of federally protected rights." The complaint was contained in a 15-page document.

Nash, who is serving a 20-30 year term for assault with intent to kill and a 10-year term for attempted escape in 1948, claimed that the prison had a long history of racial segregation for the past eight months.

He claimed in his petition that he suffered a complete nervous breakdown because of harsh treatment in prison and was declared insane and transferred for nine months to Norwich State Hospital.

The action named as co-defendants Warden Mark E. Richmond, Cox and prison board president, Mary Joseph M. Griffin, Nash is listed as plaintiff.

In specific terms, Nash asked the court to issue an injunction against the alleged transfer. When asked about the injunction, Richmond said: "Nash is the only one who's talking about Alcatraz."

The warden declined further comment.

Nixon Asserts War In Mideast Remote

Washington, July 19 (AP)—President Nixon said today the possibility of a shooting war in the Middle East now appears "plausible and remote."

Nixon, arriving here by plane from a 10-day tour of the Minneapolis summer festival, told an airport news conference that if that imperial communique often referred to have been reaction to the U.S. troop movement into Lebanon, it would have occurred at the time the Marines were going into that country.

The Vice President said the chance of a shooting war was one of many factors weighed when this country decided to send troops to Lebanon's government in its current crisis.

"While some of the opposition to President Johnson's Lebanon aid has been based on a fear of a Middle East war, it is not a realistic appraisal of the situation," Nixon said.

Nixon said there is a "real" distinction between American forces in Lebanon and the French forces in the Suez Canal Zone. He said the Suez Canal Zone is a "hot" area because it has a history of international incidents.

But now, he said, both the United States and Britain have been invited into Lebanon and Jordan, respectively. An of right now, Nixon said, the Marines will stay in Lebanon until some other stabilizing force has replaced them.

Ike Hints Extra Congress Call For Aid Funds

Washington, July 19 (AP)—President Eisenhower is reported to have dropped a hint he may call a special fall session of Congress if he doesn't get all the foreign aid funds he thinks are needed to meet the present crisis.

A legislator who attended an evening session of the House last night said Eisenhower, without making a threat, told the group of eight Republicans and Democratic Senators he hoped he wouldn't have to call a special session. Congress is expected to adjourn next month.

Cloning the Middle East crisis, Eisenhower told the group he urgently wants \$250 million which the House cut from the \$2,475,000,000 foreign aid bill. The Senate has not acted.

The White House meeting came amid reports that the administration might even seek additional money because of the Middle East situation.

But two of the Senators said Eisenhower was told prospects are dim for getting more.

See Little Hope

They added that the group told Eisenhower that they see little hope the House would go along with the Senate in restoring the full 587½ million.

It was suggested the Senate might restore \$400 to \$500 million.

The likelihood the Senators said was a compromise for \$200 to \$400 million dollars in radio-aid funds. The Senate appropriations committee completed work on the foreign aid bill yesterday and is expected to vote on it today.
