De Gaulle Refuses to Attend UN Parley In New York City on Middle East Crisis

Britain Welcomes Answer by Nikita

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS—Britain welcomed officially today Premier Nikita Khrushchev's offer to attend a summit level session of the United Nations Security Council. But it said the premier's proposal to begin the meeting in New York Monday seems unrealistic.

Britain was the first of the western Big Three to react to Khrushchev's offer. It made a flying visit to the United States to invite the Middle East crisis.

Paris and Washington, neither enthusiastic about staging a summit meeting at U.N. headquarters, still withheld official comment.

The Foreign Office spokesman announced Britain's reaction. He did not say how soon Britain thought the meeting could be arranged. Officials in Washington and London thought the chief of government might be held in two or three weeks.

An official statement read by the Foreign Office spokesman at a daily news conference, said the British are quite prepared to meet as soon as a special meeting of the Security Council can be conveniently arranged.

Denies Causing Crisis

The British statement insisted there is no truth in Khrushchev's charge that the peace of the Middle East is in peril as a result of American and British intervention.

The text of the Foreign Office statement: "Her Majesty's government are glad that Mr. Khrushchev appears to have accepted our suggestion for a special meeting of the Security Council.

"We are considering the details and the new points raised in his reply.

"The prime minister has already refused Soviet allegations that there exists a threat to the peace in the Middle East.

"The proposed date seems to us unrealistic although we are quite prepared to meet as soon as a special meeting of the Security Council can be conveniently arranged.

"Khrushchev's visit has replaced the big three western powers last night.

"He insisted that beside American, British, French, and Russian heads of government, India, Pakistan, Ethiopia and Indonesia should be invited to attend the summit.

"These are the main points which British and other allied governments are studying.

PUC Approves Rail Fare Hike

Hartford, July 24 (AP)—The State Public Utilities Commission today authorized the New Haven railroad to increase intrastate passenger fares in Connecticut 5 per cent, effective Aug. 1.

The action affects all one-way, round-trip and computation fares.

The New York Public Service Commission granted such an increase in its area, effective July 1.

The Interstate Commerce Commission granted a 5 per cent increase on interstate fares, also as of July 1.

Under the State PUC order, coach fares will go from 2.80 cents a mile to 4.102. First class fares will go from 3.200 cents to 4.689. The commutation increase will be a flat 5 per cent.

Three Alarm Hartford Fire Under Control

Hartford, July 24 (AP)—A 3-alarm fire in a huge pile of titanium in the yard of the Sulman and Blumenthal Co., 75 Willow St., was brought under control shortly before noon today.

The tons of titanium which had been collected in the open lot since 1952 were observed burning by company workmen about 11:10 a.m.

The fire quickly spread and high into the air.

Ike Insists Nikita Clarify Talk Rules

Washington, July 24 (AP)—French Ambassador Herve Alphand said today Premier Charles de Gaulle "is not in favor" of a summit conference within the United Nations Security Council in New York at this time.

But he later issued a statement leaving completely in doubt whether De Gaulle would refuse to attend.

Washington, July 24 (AP)—France notified the United States today the Premier Charles de Gaulle declines to attend any United Nations summit conference in New York City on the Middle East crisis.

French Ambassador Herve Alphand said he informed Secretary of State Dulles of this during a 30-minute meeting at the State Department.

"We wait real results from a (summit) conference," Alphand told newsmen, "and we don't think the Security Council is a good place."

De Gaulle is standing firm on his view, the ambassador said, that such a meeting should be called only when there is an opportunity to discuss Middle East problems in reason and calm.

Alphand told newsmen Soviet Premier Khrushchev "was certainly either mistaken or he did not attempt to read too well" when he interpreted De Gaulle's reply as an acceptance of the idea of a summit parley within the U.N. Security Council in New York.

"It was clear from our reply we were not in favor. We have not changed our position," Alphand added.

The ambassador declined to tell newsmen what Dulles' reaction was to his information. He asked them to check the State Department.

Meanwhile, President Eisenhower began writing a new message to Khrushchev today, insisting that the ground rules be applied only clearly in advance of a United Nations summit conference.

U.S. officials said it seems certain that the meeting will be held here and in other western capitals the view was that the opening day suggested by Khrushchev, next Monday, is much too soon.

Diplomats estimated it would take two or three weeks of negotiations to determine exactly what conditions should be included and what procedures should govern the summit.

Nothing quite like the proposed historic conference has ever been held at the U.N. Security Council in New York. Important precedents will be set.

Recognition of this was reflected in a stand by Senate Republicans who insist the State Department should not accept any Khrushchev conditions which weakened the U.N.

Atlantic Search On for Mouse In Nose Cone

Cape Canaveral, Fla., July 24 (AP)—Airliners searched Atlantic Ocean waters off the African coast today for a small white mouse who could tell man a lot about the perils of travel in outer space.

The mouse, named Wickle, was a biased slout yesterday. She rode in an air-conditioned chamber inside the nose cone of a Thor-Able rocket.

The rocket, said the Air Force, performed satisfactorily. It meant that it climbed 400 miles above the earth, then angled over into a horizontal flight which reached 6,000 miles to the vicinity of Ascension Island, near the African continent.

If the rocket's nose cone was found after its plings from space, it could solve many secrets.

Military men wanted to know if the cone could withstand the greatest friction heat encountered in the dive back into the Earth's atmosphere. If so, it could be depended upon to shield a hydrogen bomb in intercontinental flight in case of war.

Space scientists who hope some day to send men to the moon and beyond were especially interested in how Wickle, the mouse, fared in the 12,000 m.p.h. journey to space and back.

This was the third test of a Thor-Able rocket, a 2-stage vehicle which represents a link of the Air Force and Navy weapons. The first stage is the Air Force Thor. On top of that is the second stage of the Navy's Vanguard satellite launcher.

The first Thor-Able test failed April 23 when communication with the rocket was lost soon after the blastoff. Not until after the flight was it learned that a mouse was aboard.

"Well, I had to laugh. It always makes me chuckle when I see a number of the feminine sex get up so high on a horse she doesn't know how to get down."

It reminds me of the sad fate of Mrs. Barnes.

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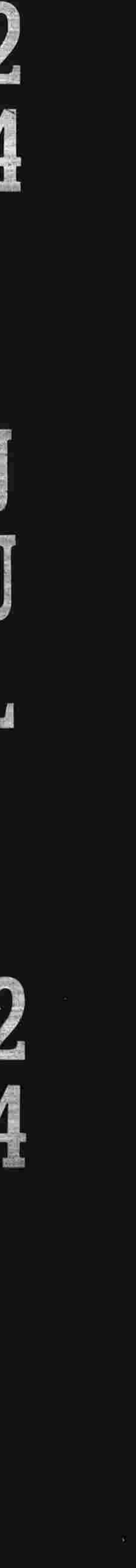

The guild, with 300 supporters new and more hoped for, is dedicated to gathering information and ideas of value to left-handed people. It also is attempting to apply organizational pressure on manufacturers of common everyday items, claiming they have ignored the left-hander. Bach hopes many will modify their products to accommodate lefties.

The idea of the organization came to Bach at a dinner party one evening when his wife had difficulty setting him conveniently at the crowded table without disrupting the other guests. There wasn't much to be done about crowded dinner tables, but the incident set Bach to thinking about the other disadvantages of being left-handed which could be remedied.

The objective of the course is to qualify policemen across the country as instructors, enabling them to return to their individual departments and teach the other officers.

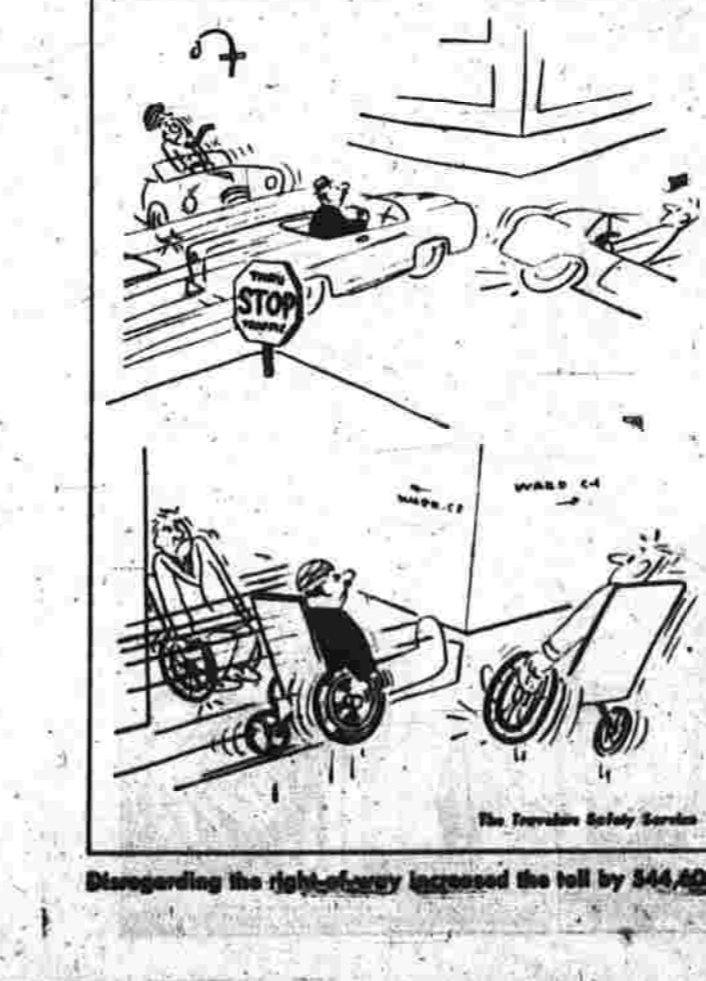

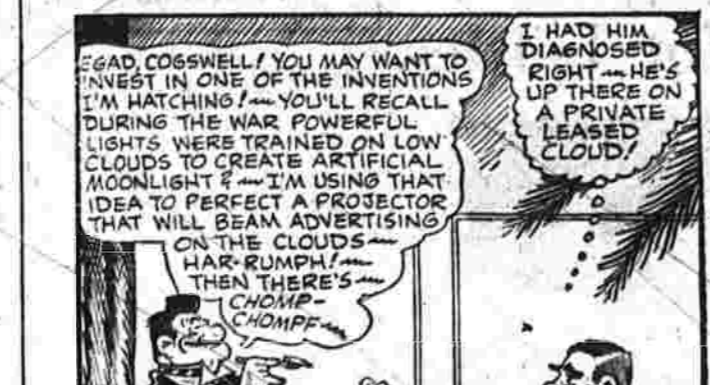

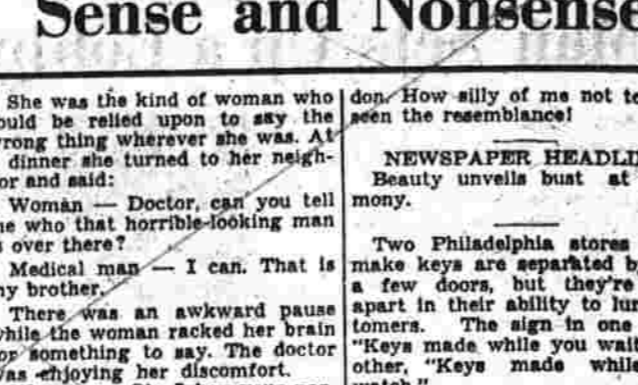
