

Just Point of View U.S. Producing Dirtier Bombs

Washington, July 28 (AP)—Secretary of Defense McElroy says that whether the Pentagon is making its atomic bombs dirtier hinges on the point of view. McElroy said Congress that bombs have been withdrawn from stockpile and modified as they are exploded at ground level. This in turn would make their fallout dirtier in the immediate area, although he said the total fallout would remain the same. But he said the purpose of the change to a surface burst is to insure destruction of such heavy targets as missile launching ships, pillboxes and submarine launching pens.

Whether a bomb which has been modified to provide an optional surface burst is dirtier or not depends on the point of view, McElroy said in a letter to the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee. The letter was made public last night. A bill debate over the issue was triggered three months ago when Sen. Clinton Anderson (D-Mt.) Senior Senate Democrat on the committee, charged bombs had been taken out of the nation's nuclear arsenal and made dirtier by inserting something. Lewis Strauss, then chairman of the atomic energy commission, flatly denied this.

A bomb's dirtiness is measured by the amount of radioactive fallout it produces. Scientists agree that large amounts of fallout create a long period of time could endanger future generations. While allowing for differing points of view, McElroy indicated the effects of local fallout and fallout from low altitude are not a great deal different. He said there was fallout from low altitude bursts before the bombs were changed.

"A low altitude burst produces similar effects in terms of local contamination and fallout to those from a surface burst," he said.

Marine Killed By Accidental Shot in Beirut

Beirut, July 28 (AP)—A U.S. Marine spokesman said today a private first class fatally shot yesterday was killed by the accidental discharge of a companion's M1 Garand automatic.

In Washington, the Pentagon identified the dead Marine as Sgt. Walter Gordon Richardson, 19, son of Mrs. Agnes Richardson, 515 53rd St., Brooklyn, N. Y. Lt. Col. Louis G. Stone, Marine spokesman, said four Marines were on an unauthorized visit in a cluster of houses half a mile forward of the Marine position at the time of the accident.

One of the Marines was slung over a wall when his M1 Garand went off. The bullet went through the hole into the head of a man standing below. The dead man's name was withheld.

The three surviving Marines are being investigated and have requested counsel before making a statement. Under the U.S. Uniform Code of Military Justice, men under investigation are not required to make a statement without the advice of lawyers.

Since the Marines landed on July 15 to help protect Lebanon's pro-western government from a Soviet-backed rebellion, they have been killed. American troop commanders are on the alert to watch for trouble in the area where Lebanon's 66-member parliament is scheduled to elect a new president.

Survival: No Advance Sale
 So far, nobody has been able to paint a prospect of survival in an atomic war which has appeal enough to make it seem worth while. Perhaps, if atomic war should start, life at all costs and on any terms would suddenly seem precious, and we would all begin clamoring for any and all measures which could have a chance of preserving it. The chances are that that is exactly the way we would behave.

But it is well nigh impossible to develop advance enthusiasm for such processes of survival. New Yorkers, for instance, have just been told what they need, and we doubt that they are going to go out and buy it.

What they need, according to the civil defense expert speaking at the ground shelter space for every city resident, this shelter needs to be 200 feet deep under the city and needs to be completely waterproof, so no atomic bomb tidal wave could get into it. It would cost perhaps \$500 a person.

Though the money cost would naturally be great, that would not hold New Yorkers, if they really believed they were going to need such shelters, or if they really cared about preserving human life by becoming human moles. But between their refusal to believe that such a peril is real and their distaste for the solution even if the peril is real the answer will be that the New Yorkers will do nothing.

All we can say about it is that the refusal to believe in such a peril or to care for the remedy both because the human race, and represent at least some institutions clinging to the theory that we have a civilization.

 to retire from the Army Air Corps in April, 1937.
 The next month Chennault was in China at the request of Mao Tse Tung to inspect the Chinese Air Force. He stayed on to instruct pilots and supervise the maintenance of the Chinese aircraft.
 In 1941, Chennault formed the American Volunteer Group, later known as the Flying Tigers. With sharks teeth painted on the nose of their outstanding P-40 fighters, this outnumbered band of volunteers officially downed 286 Japanese planes in six months. They were generally credited with 396 more kills.

After the U.S. entered the war, Chennault took command of the 14th Air Force in China as a brigadier general. He was promoted to major general in 1945.
 Chennault remained with the Nationalist Chinese during their retreat on the mainland and managed to escape to Formosa. He returned to the U.S. for the last time in February to undergo extensive treatment for lung cancer.

Chennault, however, would not admit his illness was serious and despite his assurance, he died in a hospital here on July 28, 1958, at the age of 58.

Chennault is survived by his second wife, Anna, and their two daughters, Anna Claire, 16, and Cynthia Louise, 8.
 Other survivors include eight children by his first wife, Mrs. Nell Thomas Chennault of Waterford, Conn.

Patch And Hill

Mr. Dallas in his journeying, reminds one of the story of the man who lost the shoe; the greater the leak, the more assiduously and carefully Mr. Dallas looks, with a sieve in each hand.

What is leaking against him is Russian influence in the world. The type of sieve he favors is the military part. When one sieve fails to hold water, he lives to reinforce it with another, and vice versa.

His current journeying involves an effort to keep possession of two of his favorite sieves.

One, of course, is the Baghdad Pact. It has been a porous filter from the start. He hopes well to be sealed from the moment it is organized.

The other sieve is NATO itself. When, on July 14, a revolution in Iraq opened a still new and wider hole in the Baghdad Pact, we used facilities and resources supposedly devoted to NATO and located on the territory of our fellow members of NATO to launch the military counter-stroke in Lebanon designed to reverse the blow to the Baghdad Pact.

That, in turn, opened new holes in NATO, previously weakened by France's draining away of its NATO forces to fight revolution in Algeria, and by Britain and France's use of NATO resources to attack Egypt in 1956.

In our effort to repair a new hole in the Baghdad Pact, we opened a new hole in the NATO sieve.

In his present travels, Mr. Dallas first stop was in Bonn, West Germany, where he took up the task of trying to repair the NATO sieve by explaining to a grim and dour Chancellor Adenauer just why it was we used NATO resources and facilities in Germany, without consulting our NATO ally Germany, to the Near East. The explanation was that our Baghdad Pact sieve had sprung a new leak, and we had to do something in a hurry.

The point communique which followed the meeting said that everything had been clarified successfully. In short, if issue paper can repair a sieve, the new gap in NATO, opened by our action to save the Baghdad Pact, has been repaired.

From Bonn Mr. Dallas flies on to London, and to a meeting of the surviving members of the Baghdad Pact, the sieve by which Mr. Dallas has sought to keep Russian influence from penetrating the Near East.

Here again, as a minimum, we may expect to see issue paper patchwork in a satellite claim that all is still well, all is sunny, and the Baghdad Pact still one of the vital instruments of American diplomacy, even though we ourselves still look not join it.

We have our sieve, and we will stick with them.

What is so new here is something fundamental. In our new alliance moves, we have sacrificed other considerations within the intent to prove more important and significant than the patchwork military front created against Russia. In sponsoring the Baghdad Pact, we split and befriended the Arab world which has behind it. In brooding that Germany be come a full and armed member of NATO, we devalued the continued existence of Germany. The Arab world is now gaining its unity, and winning the Baghdad Pact to the ground. And, if our policy goes on unchanged, Germany will take its own unity, and smash NATO in the process.

No matter how fast Mr. Dallas patches and seals, he cannot seal down the fact that what we really need is some new policies, which will hold water because they have the historical needs and instincts of the regions they concern worse than to them. Arab unity, and German unity should, all along, have been our policies against Russia, instead

What Makes Toll Dodgers?

The village of Tolland Manor down in Westchester, is having trouble with toll dodgers. No far, no device against them, that of labeling certain streets one-way streets for a few key hours of the day, has not worked. The toll dodgers have devised other routes for themselves, and the chief inconvenience caused by the one-way street regulations seems to have been for the villagers themselves.

The relief they sought from the flood of toll dodgers coming through their quiet, narrow streets has not been gained.

The village of Tolland Manor is not, however, the only town in this situation. The main issue is that of toll dodging itself, and what causes it.

This particular toll dodging began when, last April 15, the toll on the Hutchinson River Parkway was raised from 10 to 25 cents.

Why did this produce toll dodging? The answer as money commuters were rhapsodical? Or because they felt they were being charged more than their ride was worth?

Whether it was the exact amount involved, or the principle of the thing, the significance for those in charge of toll facilities anywhere is the same.

The only real valid excuse for a toll anywhere is that it offers the motorist a convenience he will be glad to pay for, because it seems well worth the price. If it cannot sell itself, it is not a sound and reasonable toll. There is nothing wrong, abstractly, with these Westchester motorists. It is the toll collectors everywhere who need their heads examined.

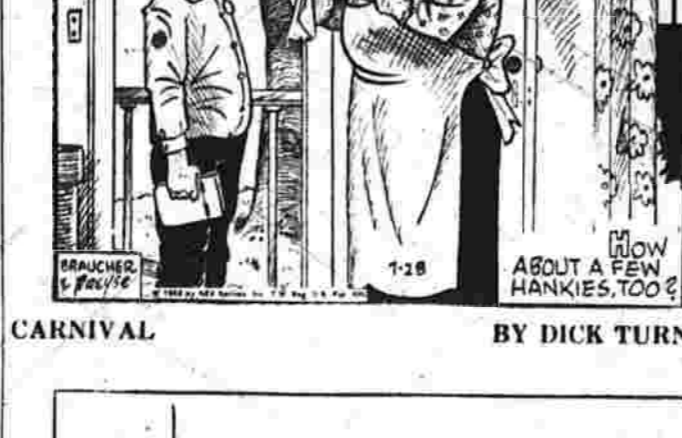

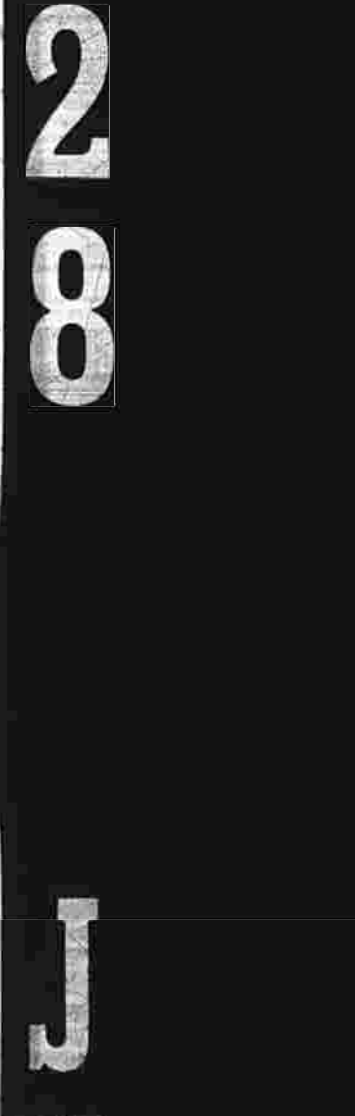
