

Beirut Voters 'Elect' Shehab

Beirut, July 30 (AP)—A stream of parliament deputies began calling on Gen. Fuad Shihab today to congratulate him on election to the presidency even before the election. Many believe the nonpartisan Parliament Speaker Adel Qassab predicted Shehab would be elected by a near unanimous vote when parliament assembled tomorrow.

The term of President Chamille Chamoun, chief target of Lebanon's rebellion, expires Sept. 22. The rebel National Front has laid down severe conditions for its support of Shihab. But it appeared that the front's four deputies in the 60-member parliament were disposed to vote for him. Most of the others it seemed were ready to elect him unconditionally and leave to the general the problem of making peace among contending factions.

The National Front, which includes leaders of Lebanon's 82-day-old rebellion, said yesterday it would support no candidate unless he demanded immediate withdrawal of U.S. troops. The front also renewed demands for Chamoun's immediate resignation.

Informants close to Shihab doubted he would agree to any conditions. The 56-year-old army commander has insisted he would accept election only if no opposition was attached.

Some deputies said that articles in the press that Shihab is loyal to Shehab personally and likely to vote for him despite the national front statement.

Prime Minister Sami Solh threatened yesterday to resign unless the elections were postponed until internal security is re-established. His threat followed an attempt to assassinate him in which eight other persons were killed.

Chamoun decided not to go along with Solh after talking with U.S. Ambassador Robert McClintock, who reportedly insisted the elections be held tomorrow. They already have been postponed one week.

McClintock reportedly fears any further delay will increase chances of serious trouble and of U.S. troops getting involved. But a permit withdrawal of the American troops, the U.S. embassy said yesterday, "that will depend also on reestablishment of internal security and a U.N. guarantee of Lebanese independence, a spokesman said.

Robert Murphy, U.S. deputy secretary of state who has been trying to work out a political compromise in Lebanon, was expected to leave today.

Ike to Seek Summit Talks On Mideast in Two Weeks

Washington, July 30 (AP)—President Eisenhower has decided to propose that a summit conference on the Middle East crisis be opened in the U.S. Security Council in two weeks.

Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Macmillan drafted notes to Soviet Premier Khrushchev Aug. 10 and 15 and submitted their drafts today to the London Atlantic Pact Council in Paris.

Sources in London said unless the other NATO Allies joined on important questions and this was not expected, the American and British messages would go off to Moscow late tonight or tomorrow.

Eisenhower and Macmillan agreed they would stand by their proposal for a summit-level session of the U.N. Security Council. But French Premier Charles de Gaulle was reported also sticking to his contention that a special 3-power conference, which Khrushchev originally proposed, should be held in Geneva and under the auspices of the Security Council.

One well-informed U.S. official said the United Nations headquarters in New York is the logical place to hold the extraordinary session but that Eisenhower is willing to go to some other city—probably Geneva if others prefer.

Eisenhower's latest note is an answer to Khrushchev's message on Monday.

The Soviet leader accused Eisenhower of virtually rejecting the heads of government conference in the Middle East and of protesting at the military advances there.

Khrushchev also called again for a 3-power meeting outside Paris but the Soviet news agency said last night this was not a rejection of a U.N. meeting and Khrushchev still is willing to attend a Security Council meeting.

The U.S. official who declined to be specifically identified said the Khrushchev note "is a shocking disappointment to the President and Secretary of State Dulles. But he indicated that they were determined generally to ignore the note and to continue to work on the two points. These are: 1. Khrushchev's insistence on holding a 3-power conference to

Funds Group For Jump in National Debt

Washington, July 30 (AP)—A rise in the government's debt ceiling to \$285 billion—with temporary permission to go to \$288 billion—was approved today by the House Ways and Means committee.

The committee acted after Secretary of the Treasury Arthur M. Burns told it a \$12 billion deficit is in prospect for the current fiscal year. The only dissent on the vote came from Rep. Noah Mason (R-Ill.).

The bill probably will come up in the House Monday.

Government fiscal officers have been talking heretofore of a deficit of \$4 to \$10 billion for the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Anderson not only boosted the forecast to \$12 billion, he hinted it might be even greater, depending on the course of federal revenue.

The secretary said the \$2,800,000,000 deficit for a range just ended was incurred because of a \$3,300,000,000 drop in tax revenue.

In the current fiscal year, he continued, he anticipates a further \$2 billion drop in revenues and a total of around \$70 billion.

An increase in the debt limit is "the only sound course at the present time," Anderson said, adding that the new ceiling will help solve problems to the Treasury here.

He said it will be necessary to take another look at the situation before next June 30.

A permanent statute now restricts the public debt to a total of \$275 billion. But Congress has authorized a temporary increase to \$280 billion.

Eisenhower asked Monday that the permanent ceiling be raised to \$285 billion.

Newtown, July 30 (AP)—A Roman Catholic parish today filed a petition for a referendum to decide if public transportation will be provided for parochial school pupils here.

First Selectman Edward J. Coleman immediately set the referendum date for Aug. 16.

It will be the first such referendum under the controversial school bus act passed by the state legislature a year ago.

The law permits towns and cities to decide on something about whether free transportation will be provided for pupils of non-profit private schools.

The petition here was filed by the Rev. Walter R. Connor, pastor of St. Rose Parish. The parish has 200 pupils in the fall.

The petition has 925 signatures, more than the five per cent of the eligible voters required. There are about 4,200 eligible voters in the town.

Hartford, July 30 (AP)—Thyrle G. Foster, the Jehovah's Witness who refused a blood transfusion, is still in critical condition at the Hartford Hospital.

The New Brunswick man suffered a broken left leg, a broken arm and was bleeding internally after being struck in Weathersfield Saturday.

He refused the transfusion because he feels it is against his religious beliefs.

Jehovah's Witnesses refuse blood transfusions because a verse in Leviticus 17, the Bible, states that "whosoever man eateth any blood from his people."

They believe the Bible entirely practical for everyday living and advise readers to "abstain from things strangled, and from blood."

The witnesses see no difference between being fed blood through a transfusion and eating it in prospect for the current fiscal year. In emergencies, blood substitutes may be used.

Widest Majority Ever Voters Hand Faubus Segregation Order

Little Rock, Ark., July 30 (AP)—Gov. Orval Faubus yesterday won an overwhelming mandate to resist school integration in opposing to a third term Democratic nomination.

The returns indicate clearly the sentiments of the people," Faubus said in a victory statement.

Crowds of jubilant supporters overflowed into the streets in front of Faubus downtown campaign headquarters here and a sound truck screamed "Dixie," the traditional southern fight song, as the outcome of the balloting in the preferential primary became evident.

Faubus battled over two opponents by the widest majority in Arkansas in this heavily Democratic state, nomination tantamount to election.

With 2,229 of 2,321 precincts reporting, Faubus amassed 235,668 votes, while the Democratic challenger, Little Rock mayor, packed 95,843 votes, and Leo M. Hays, a state judge from Paragould, 95,966.

No Runoff Needed

The majority vote for Faubus eliminated any need for a runoff between the two highest candidates.

Faubus received about 70 per cent to 15 per cent each for his two opponents.

The governor led substantially in all 25 of the state's counties including Pulaski (Little Rock) and the integration center for some time.

Gavin Blasts Pentagon Aims, Claims Military Unprepared

Washington, July 30 (AP)—Lt. Gen. James M. Gavin has fired another salvo of criticism at Pentagon policies and leveled an especially heavy blast at his old boss, Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson.

Gavin, who quit the Army last March after a public disagreement with actions of the Defense Department, said Wilson tended to deal with his chief of staff as if he were a subordinate, rather than a peer.

He quoted an unidentified chief of staff as calling Wilson "the most uniformed man, and the most determined to remain so, that has ever been secretary."

Gavin's pointed remarks were contained in the text of two articles published by Life Magazine from "War and Peace in the Service." Wilson was quick to answer Gavin who was army chief of research and development. Speaking from his summer home at Boyce City, Mich., he described Gavin as "just another overly inflated army officer with an exaggerated regard of his ability."

The former General Motors president, who let the department last October, said there was no basis for Gavin's comments and added:

"It was not that close to me. I talked to him only on rare occasions... he's just trying to sell his book."

Gavin also voiced criticism of retired Adm. Arthur W. Radford, who for four years was chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He praised Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, former army chief of staff, and the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Omar Bradley.

"Gen. Ridgway managed to hold together an army and continue to ready that army for the nuclear-missile-space war."

"And he did so despite a constantly shrinking budget. Yet apparently was referring to the senior staff officers it was plainly the shrinking budget that was his problem."

Radford was unavailable for comment. Secretary of the Army William B. Franke, who tried to persuade Gavin to remain in the service, declined to discuss his statements.

Gavin's retirement at 51 last March stirred up a storm in Congress, among legislators who felt the Pentagon had been lax in developing a missile and satellite program. Gavin said he had been surprised by procedures and lack of funds.

Sens. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) and Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) were quick to voice agreement with Gavin's "descriptive and duplicitous" accusations.

Johnson is an ex-convict. He was sentenced to 10 years in prison for a crime in 1947. He was released in 1953.

Haitian Army In Control as Coup Bid Fails

republic, spoke to newsmen with a pistol stuck in his belt. He gave this account of the attempted coup.

The rebel launch landed 45 miles northwest of the Haitian capital near the town of St. Marc Monday night.

Army commanders were alerted and a commando unit was rushed to the scene. The plotters fled leaving the launch and a cargo of weapons and ammunition to the troops.

Senators then commended transportation and speed to the control of an army barracks about 300 yards from the National Palace capturing 50 soldiers and three officers.

They then sent an ultimatum to the government and opened fire on the Palace. The army commander, who was Nagiora's aide, seven rebels were killed in the yellow stucco barracks.

President Duvalier, dressed in an army major's uniform with pistol and steel helmet, was in the thick of the fighting, officers said.

The president told the populace in a broadcast that "the criminal gang which has plotted the death of the president has been crushed. The army has paid with their lives for the steady enterprise."

Duvalier, a 48-year-old country doctor and champion of the deep blacks of the island republic, was a landslide victory in the presidential elections last Sept. 21. He was the first elected president since Maguire, who was forced into exile in 1906 for trying to extend his seven-year term with the aid of the army.

Widest Majority Ever Voters Hand Faubus Segregation Order

against Faubus and for U.S. Rep. Brooks Hays who was opposed by Amia Guibridge, captain Citizens' Council, and other segregationists. Hays was re-elected by a 3-2 margin.

Despite outward signs before the election of a landslide sweep for Faubus, Guibridge and Hays had counted on a large "silent vote" to at least force a runoff. Both were avowed segregationists but advocated a law and order procedure on integration problems.

Faubus' 48 against the runoff and the South's leading exponent of segregationist politics, Hays, were ordered Arkansas National Guardsmen to turn away nine Negro children seeking to enter Little Rock Central High School. The students were armed with federal court orders directing segregation of the previously all-white school.

President Eisenhower met Faubus' domestic policies by federalizing the State Guard and ordering Army Paratroopers to Little Rock to enforce the court order.

Faubus said the heavy voting was a condemnation by the people of illegal federal intervention in the affairs of the state and of the horrifying use of federal bayonets on the streets of an American city and in the halls of public school.

He declared that voters "have expressed their approval of my efforts to retain the rights of a sovereign state as set out in the federal constitution."

Faubus declined to become the second governor in Arkansas history elected in a third term until he must face a Republican nominee in the general election in November. But on Republican has held state office in Arkansas since the reconstruction era following the Civil War.

Republicans will choose between Donald D. Lane, 34, a Little Rock civil engineer, and George W. Johnson, a 25-year-old Greenwood attorney in their first statewide primary Aug. 12.

Four years ago Faubus abstained from running for Governor Francis Cherry, who was seeking a second term. Faubus was in a runoff to a seat 7,000 votes but only once before in Arkansas history had a first term governor been beaten.

The governor in 1956 retained two opponents in the first primary. One of them was Jim Johnson of Fayette, a militant segregationist.

California Fights 300 Grass Fires

San Francisco, July 30 (AP)—More than 300 grass and timber fires blazed in Central and Northern California today as the death toll from a lightning storm reached seven.

About 2,000 firemen fought the blazes along the High Sierra foothills from Tuolumne County, 175 miles northeast of San Francisco to Modoc County, the most North-eastern in the state.

The death count from the Monday storm increased by two yesterday as a fireman was trampled in a grass and brush fire and another found the body of a man who had been killed by a bolt.

Vermon Doyle, 37, of Martinez in the San Francisco Bay area died of burns two hours after he was struck by lightning while carrying a hose on a steep hillside. Miguel, who was struck by lightning, was found beside a tomato patch he had been irrigating in Yuba County 70 miles northeast of San Francisco.

Rigged fire still burning was in Yuba County in the Three Rivers area where terrain prevented firemen from moving heavy equipment.

First Honor Medal Given by Lincoln

Washington, July 29 (AP)—A Medal of Honor has been presented to American servicemen since President Lincoln, on July 12, 1862, signed an act of Congress authorizing their presentation. The name of "Congress" in those days was the Confederate Congress and other soldiers' quarters.

The first Medal of Honor was given in a joint ceremony March 25, 1863, in the city of Tennessee of a hand of 20 Union soldiers who had volunteered to risk Tennessee and the Confederacy by sailing from the Western Atlantic Railroad.

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Heat, Fires Hurt British Columbia

Vancouver, B. C., July 30 (AP)—A prolonged heat wave and hundreds of forest fires are seriously damaging British Columbia's economy.

Losses in the forest, fishing and farming industry are mounting steadily. More than \$1,750,000 has been spent on fighting forest fires. Loggers have lost nearly \$2,000,000 in wages because of forest fires.

Total damage to the Province's timber has not been estimated but reports have placed it around \$10 million.

Some 2,500 men are battling 300 forest fires, one of which is burning on the coast over a tract where timber is valued at \$400,000.

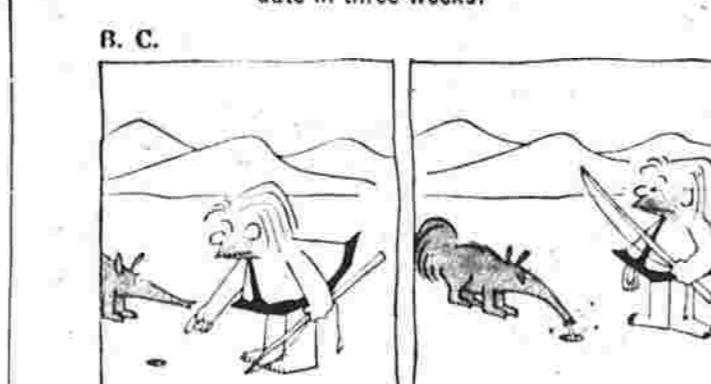

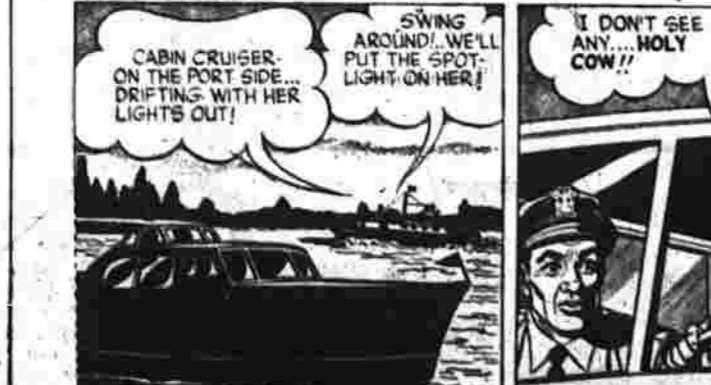
