

Lunar Rocket Attempt Near

Washington, Aug. 5 (AP)—Roy W. Johnson, boss of the nation's moon rocket program, indicated today that the first attempt to put up a lunar satellite could come as early as next week.

Johnson told a reporter that the Defense Department hopes to decide this week on the date of the first lunar probe.

The director of the department's Advanced Research Projects Agency added that the date would be decided upon about five days in advance of the actual launching attempt.

This would conform closely with estimates of persons close to the lunar probe program that the earliest launching date under consideration was Aug. 15, and that the most likely dates would be Aug. 17-19.

A major goal of the attempt is to get pictures of the hidden side of the moon—not to hit the moon itself.

Johnson said that if the shot is completely successful, the probe will orbit several times around the moon. But he emphasized that many things could prevent success of this first experiment.

Johnson also disclosed for the first time that the lunar satellite probably would be cylindrical in shape. He said that with its instruments it would weigh 50 to 60 pounds.

Johnson said the exact configuration, its final design, was "still fluid."

Several Satellites Ready

He explained that several lunar satellites have been built at the Naval Test Center, Inverness, Calif., of various shapes and designs, "and will take one off the shelf."

Baghdad, Aug. 5 (AP)—The head of the new republic and government of Iraq in his first public statement to the Baghdad Pact gave strong indication yesterday that the regime is leaning toward withdrawal from the western-military alliance.

Abdul Karim Kassem, who led the revolt that deposed and killed King Faisal, said in an interview his government is giving careful study to the pact which UAR President Nasser and the Soviet Union so often have recalled.

"The most important thing in this matter is friendship between Iraq and other states," Kassem declared. "This friendship is a very important part of our policy."

The alliance with Britain, Iran, Pakistan and Turkey was "drawn up by a few people here in Iraq," he said.

"Though we have studied it, up till now we have been unable to get from those connected with the administration of the pact any details about the pact's function here in Iraq," he said.

"We are studying, and then we will make our decision. But the decision must be announced without previous contact with other members. We want everything to be settled in a friendly manner."

Kassem said he understood one purpose of the Baghdad Pact was to help Iraq defend itself against aggression. He said a special defense treaty was unnecessary.

"We are a full member of the United Nations," he said. "We are sure that our security is taken into consideration by other members of the United Nations, among whom are those who compose the Baghdad Pact."

Kassem asserted there would be no interference by Nasser in Iraq affairs. Instead, he declared, he would like to see a general agreement between Iraq and the UAR in one of brotherly cooperation.

"We will Iraq interfere in the affairs of other states," he said.

Stock Margin Put at 70% by Reserve Board

Washington, Aug. 5 (AP)—In its major move since the recession to clamp down on credit, the Federal Reserve Board raised requirements on stock purchases to 70 per cent effective today.

The board's action, announced yesterday, restores margin requirements to the level in effect from April 1955 to last Jan. 16, when the board slashed the margin to 50 per cent.

"At that time, stock prices had declined sharply from the previous year. The January margin cut, designed to loosen credit as a means of fighting the recession, permitted stock buyers to borrow as much as half the money they put in the market," the board said.



Parking Authority To Meet Tonight

Recommendations made during traffic surveys in Manchester will be discussed by the Town Parking Authority at a meeting in the Municipal Building tonight at 8 o'clock.

The recommendations aimed at improving parking facilities on Main St. and in the North End were made after two surveys by the National Parking Assn., Washington, D.C., sponsored by the Parking Authority.

William G. Barr, executive director of the Association, has recommended that the town start developing and improving its present off-street facilities to leave Main St. clear for its intended function of moving traffic in the North End.

Manchester is not faced with a "revenueless task" to solve its parking problem, Barr said.

Third Scholarship Awarded to Geer

Ralph E. Geer, 20 Hyde St., has been awarded a trustee scholarship of \$225 to Northeastern University in Boston for his freshman year in the University's College of Engineering in the fall. He plans to study mechanical engineering.

The scholarship, one of 31 full-year awards, is given annually to a student who has demonstrated exceptional achievement in his field of study.

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The job of keeping up with Manchester's voting population is one of details, details and more details. With the aid of a card file, a biennial canvass in the spring, and occasional information passed on by the voters themselves, they seek to keep up to date on voters' names, addresses, and party affiliations.

From their card files and with each registrar often checking the other's work, they prepare voting lists for primaries, elections and referendums. They also supervise these voting sessions and hire the personnel required from the chief moderator (the choice of which alternates between the two registrars) down to the checkers and voting machine guards.

In addition, of course, they sit in on every vote-making session, and sign up those new voters who

want to register with either party. And, among other things, they attend seminars conducted by the secretary of the State's office on changes in voting laws.

Primary Luke Read, who got \$3,000 a year each for their labor as part-time registrars, feel that, with the town's voting population constantly increasing, Manchester could use full-time registrars. They point out that Manchester is the largest town in the State that doesn't have them.

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Lucky Seven Sales Stated On Thursday

Members of the Retail Division of the Chamber of Commerce are making final preparations today for their August sales promotion—"Lucky Seven Day."

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Libraries Set New Records

New records for the use of local libraries have been set during the past year, according to the annual report on libraries prepared by Miss Anne C. French, head librarian.

The total registration of borrowers is 19,115 or nearly one-half the number of Manchester residents.

These borrowers took out 132,268 books, pamphlets, pictures and records. In a single day, 2,100 books were circulated, setting a new record.

The cost per capita for all Manchester residents was slightly above \$2.00 a year, which is "below the standard for good library service for a community of this size," according to the report.

Projects begun during the past year included the dedication of Whiton Memorial Library, including new lighting, drapes and interior painting. A new radio program entitled "What's New at the Public Library" brought requests for books and services mentioned and increased the number of registered borrowers, particularly children.
