

Chief Justice Warren suggested today the real issue in the Little Rock school controversy is whether any agency of the state is preventing Negro school children from exercising their constitutional rights. Warren tossed this in the form of a question to Richard A. Butler, attorney for the Little Rock School Board who was arguing for suspension of integration in the city's Central High School.

Warren said that, conceding the good faith of the school board, was not the court concern with whether action by the state "has frustrated the constitutional right of these Butler replied that the school board felt it was entitled

to be heard on its own record, adding "We've asked the court to look at our problem in Little Rock." Repeatedly, Butler alluded to the phrase "with all delib erate speed" used by the Supreme Court in a 1955 decision for desegregation. He argued this gave flexibility for suspension of integration in view of disorders in Little Rock the past school year.
