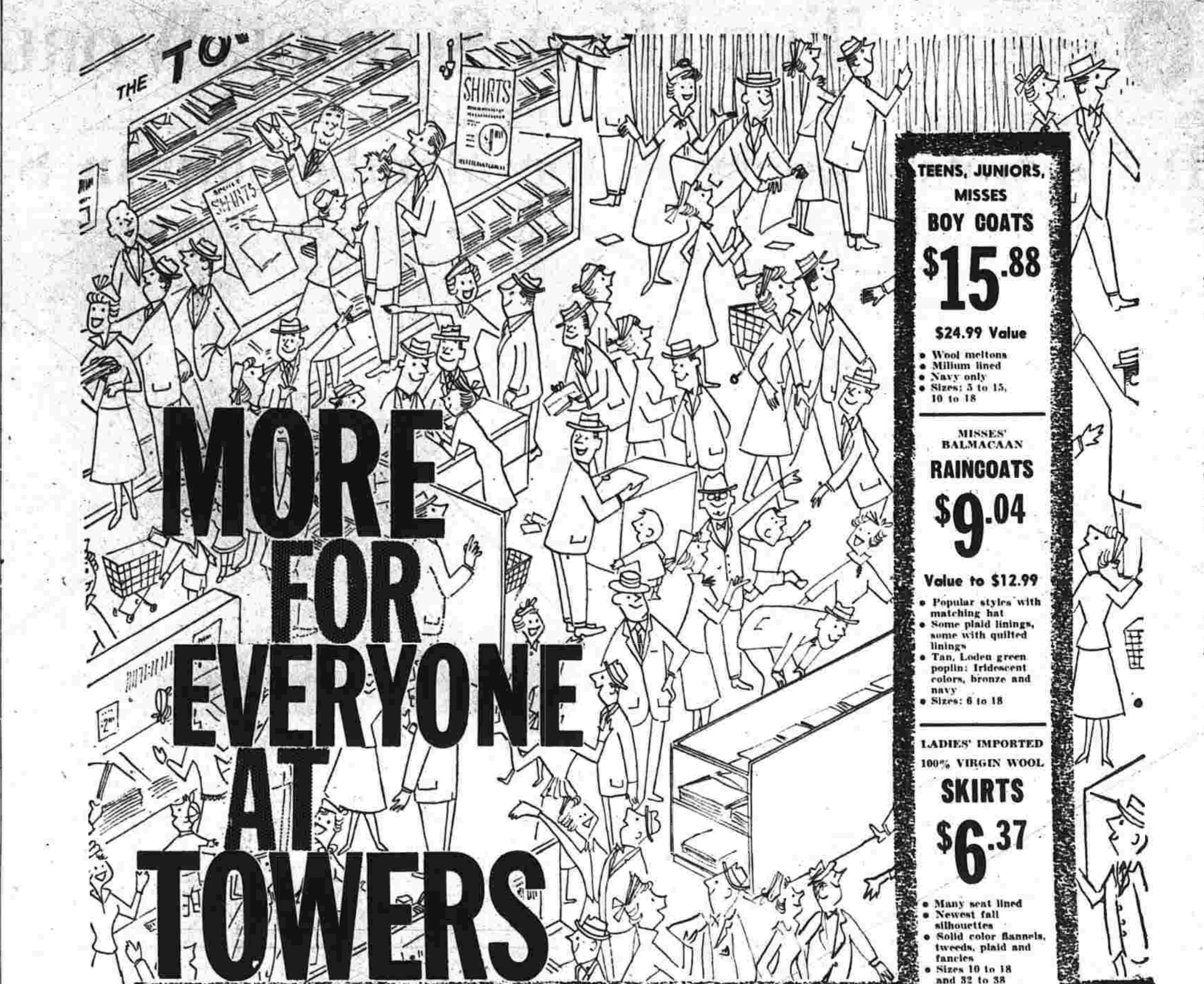

### Council Group Hears Report, Plans Drive

The second meeting of the MHS General Student Council was held in the school library Wednesday Sept. 10 under the direction of President Kent Reichel. Several important objectives were accomplished at this meeting.

After Mr. Laurence Leonard of the business department gave a brief financial report, the Council proceeded to elect the remainder of its officers for the school year. Wes Frazier, treasurer, and Susan Buckley, secretary, Principal Edson Bailey congratulated these people and the 1958 Council executives and gave his vote of confidence for the year.

Student Council adviser Mrs. Harry Smith, briefly gave an explanation of the SAA drive and it was hoped that the goal of one hundred per cent membership will be attained this year. A vote-taking procedure for representative purposes was discussed in order to better acquaint members with this technique.

This was the second meeting of the Council under the new 2 hour system adopted last spring. The Executive Council, Student Council and the Executive Council and the General Assembly. 4. Amending a proposed bill. This council will meet once a month and will meet on alternate weeks. In addition to regular Council meetings, four alternates may be elected from each class. They may vote only when they are filling a vacancy. It is hoped that this new and completely new format system will lead to making the Student Council of the school a stronger, better, and more efficient organization.

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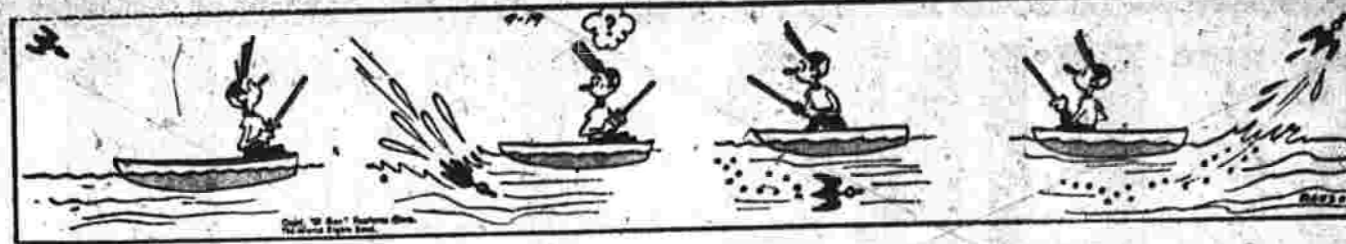
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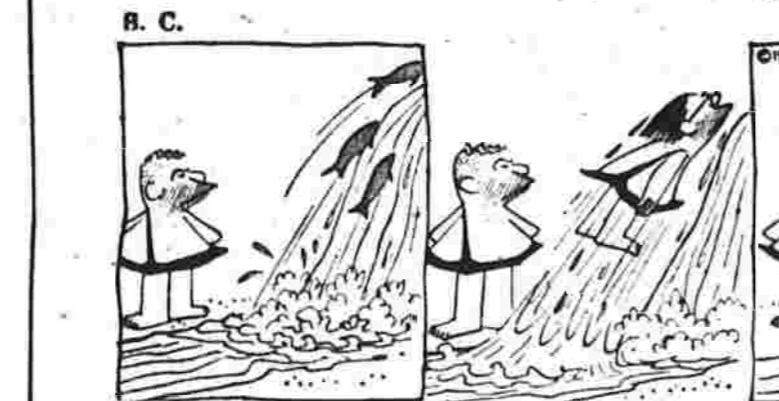

Tiny A-Bomb Blast Launches Nevada Series

(Continued from Page One) are used in this series will be used for New Mexico's counties. Devices to be tested will range up to 20 kilotons. This is considered small by current standards, but the Nevada Test is just one of the 20-kiloton bomb to destroy a Japanese city. One of the tests will be fired from balloons and low towers. The 20-kiloton weapon will be detonated underground. The AEC found out in 1957 with its first tunnel experiment that subterranean testing does away with a lot of problems and produces the same scientific results. Offense radioactive fallout and blast and flash effects are eliminated. The weapon used in the first tunnel shot was between 1 and 2 kilotons. The tunnel in which that test was made will be used again as the center bore for four corridors with a detonating chamber at the end of each. Other tunnels have been dug. In addition to testing the effectiveness of weapons, the series will involve experiments on the protection of people from atomic attack. On one of the later balloons about 500 miles will be placed in trenches, but boxes and fox holes at various distances from the blast site. The results, says Col. William S. Hutchinson Jr., deputy test manager for military affairs, "should enhance our capabilities to insure maximum survival among populations which may be exposed to atomic attack."

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U.S. Advisors On Taipei Get Combat Status

(Continued from Page One) commander of all Air Force units, and Rear Adm. Paul Blackburn, commander of the Formosa Strait Patrol, is designated commander of U.S. Naval units. Smoot, the announcement said, will have under his direct operational control these forces necessary to discharge his mission of coordination of all U.S. operations in the Formosa area. Reorganization of the U.S. Formosa Command was announced as the Army assigned a Nike-Hercules missile battalion to the defense of the Nationalist stronghold. The Defense Command announced today an advance party of the 7th Artillery Regiment's 2nd Missile Battalion had arrived from Ft. Bliss, Tex., and missile launching sites are being built. The Nike-Hercules can knock down enemy aircraft more than 70 miles away. It can carry either a conventional or an atomic warhead. The Defense Department in Washington said Monday the mission was going to the Pacific but refused to confirm reports that it would come to Formosa. It is commanded by Lt. Col. Bernard F. Greenberg, Wilmington, Del., and the advance party is headed by Capt. Herbert E. Page of St. Paul, Minn. A Nike-Hercules Battalion consists of 700 to 800 men manning 48 missile launchers. This type of super-sonic missile is in defense around New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and the Washington-Baltimore area. Four of the missiles of the U.S. 17th Tactical Missile Squadron have been in operation on Formosa since late last year.
