Ike Denies Entering Right-to-Work Fight

(Continued from Page One) Nixon said higher taxes, cheap money and the slitting of private investments would follow a "wild spending binge" if the Democrats strengthen their control of Congress.

Nixon is giving signs that as a campaigner he intends to return to his 1954 form when he was the scourge of the Democrats. Nixon locked off his campaigning for a Republican Congress with a speech in which he urged party members to take off the gloves for what he characterized as the "fight of our lives."

There were echoes of the Nixon of four years ago as he called into what he called "the cheap, below-the-belt attacks of Harry Truman and his ilk and spoke of the election as a "fight of our lives."

Former President Truman was a favorite Nixon target in 1954. Then the Democrats said the Vice President was around the country intimating that their party was in a conspiracy to overthrow the administration.

In 1954 Nixon threw the Democrats off stride instead of assailing them as he had done two years previously. The Vice President spent most of the time talking about the accomplishments of the Eisenhower administration. He

even contended that the matter of Communist infiltration into government for which he had blamed the Democrats in 1954, should be approached on a nonpartisan basis. These campaign tactics were widely advertised at the time as indicating there was a "new Nixon" who occupied himself with high level issues and left the political infighting to others.

In his Indianapolis speech, Nixon defended the administration's record. He boasted that six years under Eisenhower "have been the best six years in the history of this country. There has never been a more peaceful time in the history of the United States since the founding of this nation."

For the "Communist" issue of 1954 he substituted the threat of nationalization of health, housing, power, farming and other American industries.

Nixon said that at the opposition will have more strength, the country will be "in for a wild spending binge by Radical Democrats" and that "the Democrats will not pick but dead elephants."

From An Article On The 1955 Flood by Alan H. Olmstead, Veteran Connecticut Columnist

"... There was nothing before him which was not his (Ribicoff's) job. But it was his job in horrible dimensions no man could seek. It had to be lonely, no matter how many were around him. It had to be the summit toward which everything else flooded, demanding, not the instinctive heroics of the moment, but calm, measured decision which was also quick, and also without false notes.

"We do not mean to cast the Governor as a hero. He was not hurt. He was not in danger. He performed no dramatic headline exploits. But he did, in his job, hold the lonely, awful top responsibility. On his slim normally elegant figure there was, inescapable, the combined weight of everything.

"There were, beforehand, those unfriendly students of Abe Ribicoff who thought him primarily a man of high sounding words and wonderful evasions of frontal meetings with events and with crisis. There were those whose estimate had been that, under such a strain, he might crack and not measure up.

"None of these unfriendly observers ever imagined a crisis in the proportions it did attain when it did come.

"Well, the verdict has to go in, and it has to say that in his lonely, terrible role the Governor did not crack, that he managed calm, measured decisions, that he encouraged courage and hope in the people of his state, that he talked long-range sense among the ruins.

"It has to be recorded that the policy moves which came were timely and right, and mobilized the state, its knowledge, and its resources in orderly, intelligent fashion for the long tasks to follow, so that thinking order and policy order were in existence even while the full extent of chaos was still being realized.

"This is not to say that any other man would not have done as well. There is in every human being the capacity to rise to the challenge. This is merely to record that this man did rise to the challenge, did do well, did discharge his awesome role with moral courage and policy competence."

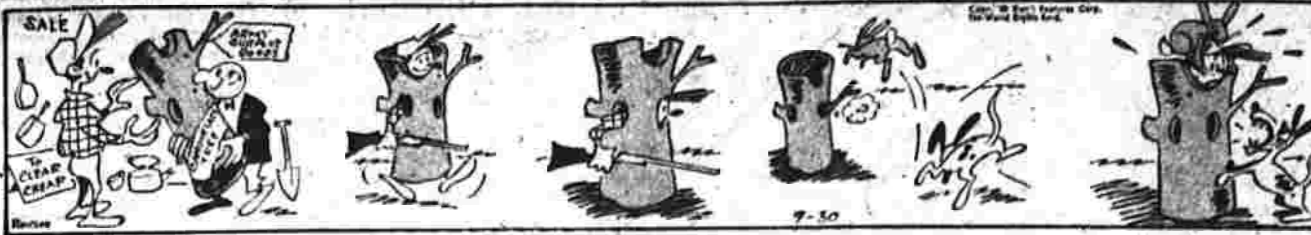

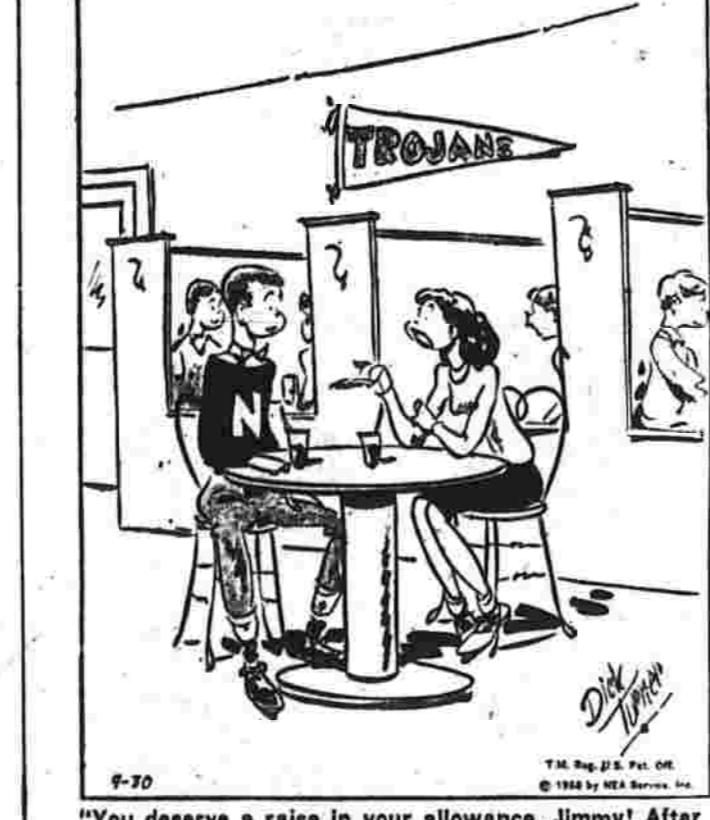

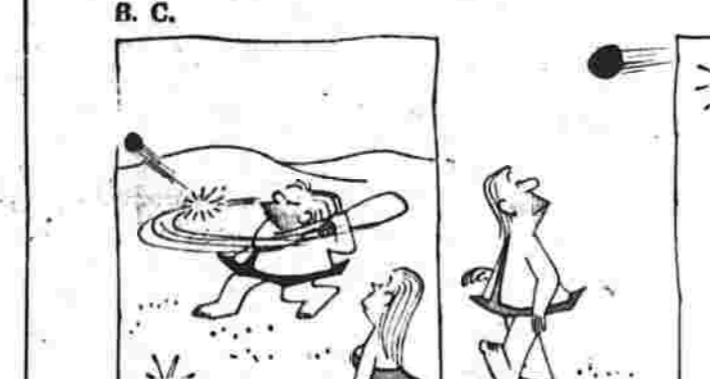

# Braves Picked to Repeat Over Yankees in Series

Milwaukee, Sept. 30 (AP)—On the assumption that the double-dose pitching of lefty Warren Spahn and righty Lew Burdette will neutralize the power of long ball hitting Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra, the Milwaukee Braves are picked to repeat last year's victory over the New York Yankees in the 1958 World Series starting here tomorrow.

Because the teams are an evenly matched as the American and National League baseball with the Braves having an edge in pitching, and the Yankees in hitting, betting even the Series figures to go all the way with the outcome not decided until the seventh game.

Should it go the full distance, it means that Spahn, named by Manager Fred Haney to pitch the opener, and Burdette, slated to start the second game, could conceivably hit six of the seven games, depending upon results. The pair won four out of five decisions with the Yankees last October.

On the other hand, it is not certain that Yankee ace Whitey Ford Manager Casey Stengel's first game selection will be pitchable to pitch three games—the first, fourth and sixth. Despite the proven ability of right-hander Don Larsen and Bob Turley, probably second and third starters, the Yankees have a heavy pitching staff.

The American League's earned-run average for the Yankees' top 20 pitchers is 3.14, the highest in the league. In his last three starts, those pitchers have pitched a total of 17 2/3 innings, and have allowed 10 runs, 11 hits and 11 earned runs.
