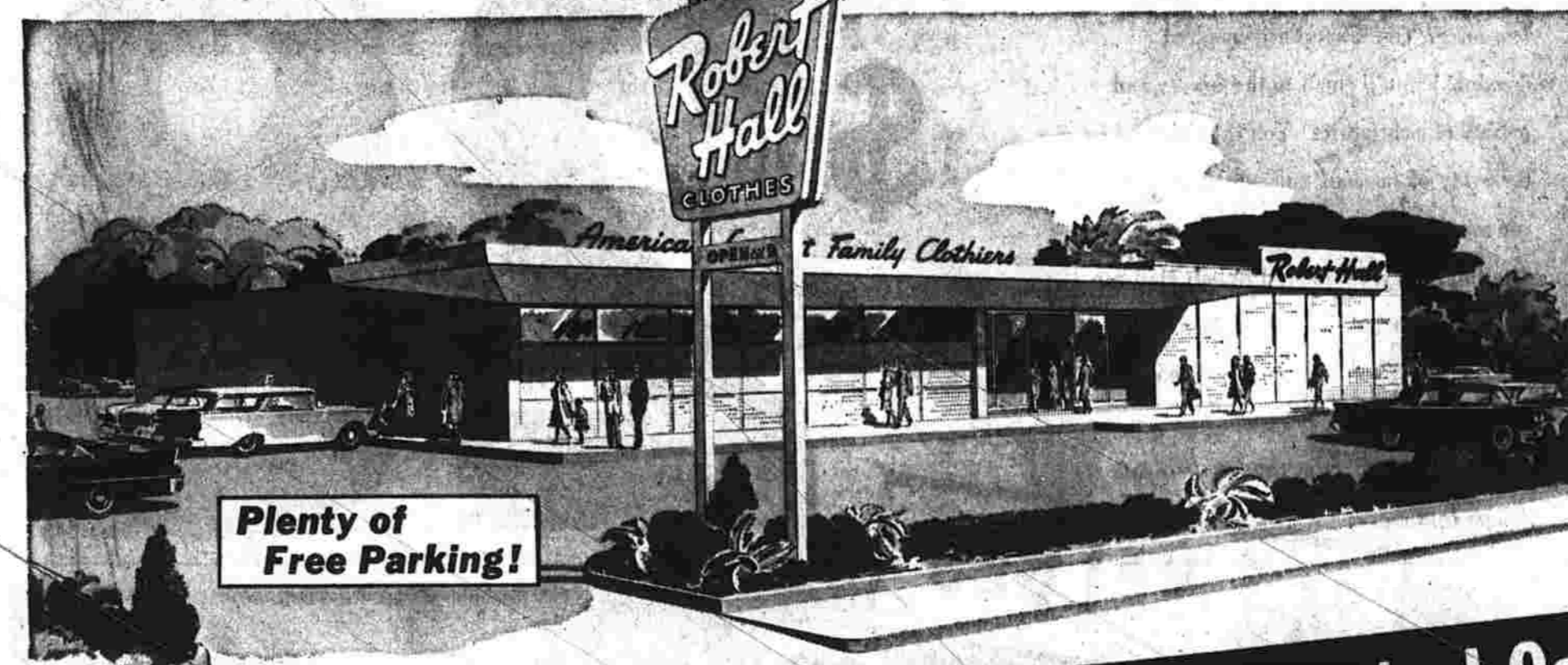

200 feet—are legally blind, according to the Better Vision Institute. About 75 per cent of these people have some sight, however, and about 77 per cent of this partially blind group can be substantially helped by special lenses and devices, the institute says.

One Car in 5 Faulty
Washington—One out of five vehicles checked during the national motor-vehicle safety-check program this year was found in need of maintenance attention for the fourth straight year. A new high of more than 5,000,000 cars and trucks were checked for safe driving conditions in more than

2,000 communities throughout the country. As in previous years, rear lights were most often found in need of immediate attention.
Canadian Visitors Decline
Ottawa—The number of foreign vehicles entering Canada on travelers' vehicle permits totaled 1,349,894 during the first seven

months of 1958, a decline of 1.4 per cent from the like period of 1957.
Dog Met Every Train
Fort Benton, Mont.—Old Rip, a big sheep dog, arrived in Fort Benton one day in August, 1926. The same day, a coffin was put aboard the afternoon Great North-

ern train for shipment to the East. A little later, station employees noticed the disconsolate dog sitting beside the tracks. For six years he met every train that came through town, walking the full length of it and sniffing the air, then setting down to wait for the next one. When he died Jan. 14, 1932, at over 12 years of age, he was buried in that neighborhood. "Lone" is an old word for lone or courtyard.

Live Vaccine Praised
Stockholm—Inoculations with live polio vaccine seem to have a more lasting effect than with dead vaccine, Swedish experts say. They credit that the polio vaccine of the future will be a combination of live and dead vaccines. The head of the virus institute of Stockholm's famed Carolina Institute,

Sven Gard, has inoculated infants with live, debilitated virus and the treatment has proved perfectly harmless. The effect was ascertained by measuring the number of antibodies formed in the blood.
Cobalt Pellets Used
Adelaide, Australia—Research-ers at the University of Adelaide

have found that cattle and sheep grazing on cobalt-enriched pasture which is widespread throughout the world, may be supplied with the vitamin "B12" through use of a pellet of cobaltous oxide mixed with clay or powdered iron. The pellet, when swallowed, remains in the rumen for life, giving off a steady supply of the vitamin.

Italy Plans Gold Coins
Rome—Italy is again going to have gold coins—but they will have no use, value and won't be legal tender. They will be commemorative "medal money" issued to mark the 10th anniversary of the Constitution. They will be sold to the public. All the coins will have the same design and will be of 22-carat gold and in three weights and diameters.

Asbes Polish Lacquer
Tokyo—Five Japanese lacquer-makers are using a new process to give their polishes a "deer's coat of ash" (the ash of a tree called thus vernicifera and is applied with the fingers.

imlar trees grown only in the Orient and principally in Japan) can be ground paper-thin with whetstones after the hardening process and gives a brilliant polish which outshines even enamel or pottery glaze. 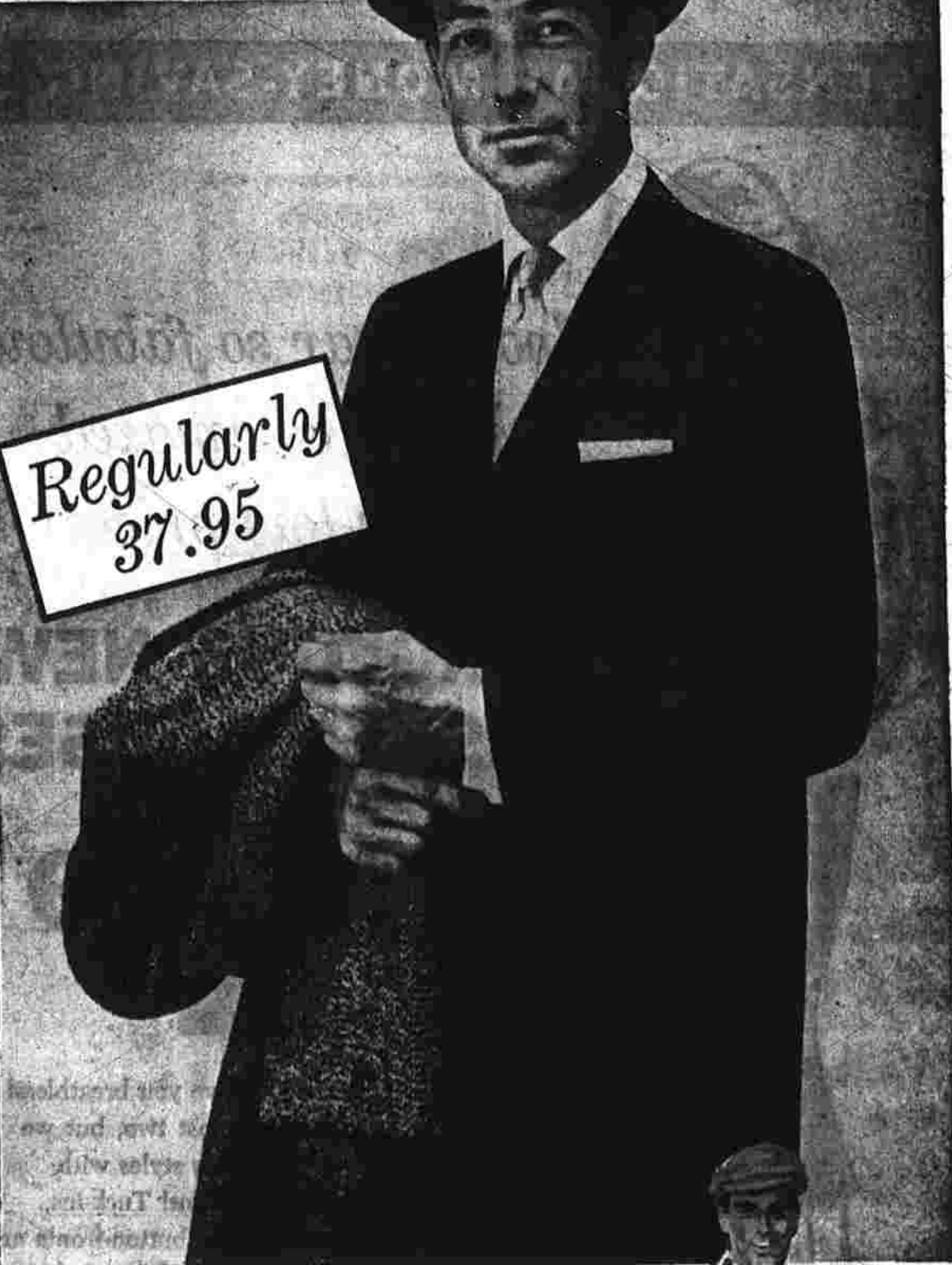

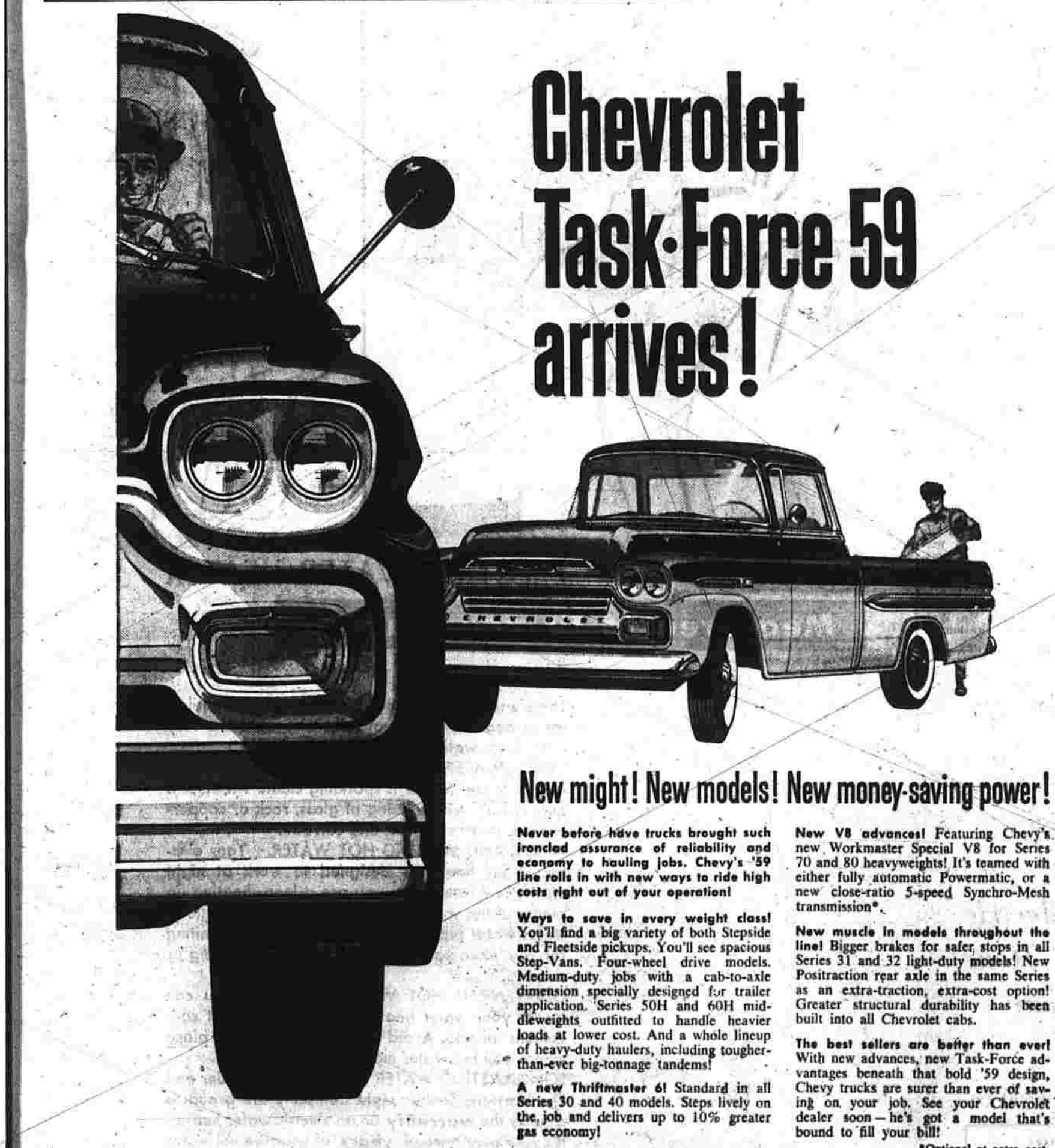

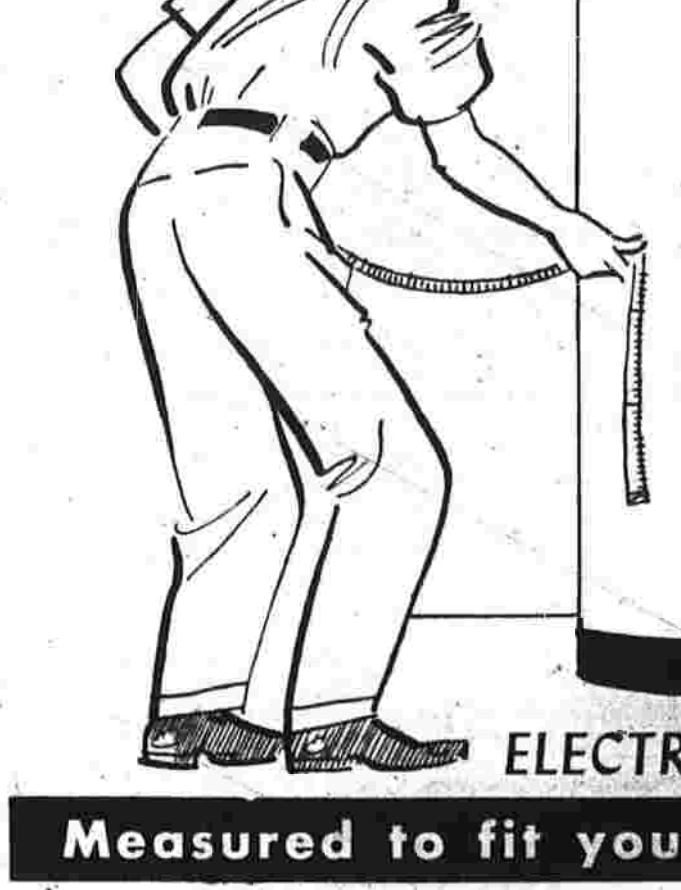

All four specialists who have attended the pope since he was stricken by Monday's stroke kept watch at his bedside.

All close relatives of the pontiff and all cardinals of the Vatican came out with extra editions of the Vatican Radio.

Heightening the emotional tenor of the news was the fact that the pope died this morning. The Italian news agency reported that the pope died at 12:30 p.m. after a long illness.
