**Mayor Calls Meeting,  
School Plans Halted**

Mayor Harold A. Turkington today called a special informal meeting of the Board of Directors and the Board of Education and Building Committee for Monday night in hopes of resolving the many conflicts over the proposed North Junior High School.

The calling of the meeting has required the postponement by at least one day of the scheduled Oct. 20 public hearing on an appropriation for the school. And it increases the pressure on town officials to resolve their differences in time to get the school question on the voting machines in the Nov. 4 election.

The mayor's action will also put at least a temporary stop to further work by architect Victor Frid on final plans for the 700-pupil school. General Manager Richard Martin, who on Monday authorized Frid to proceed with detailed plans, said he will tell Frid today to stop work until an understanding has been reached by the three town agencies concerned.

**Town Audit Ready**

The audit report on the Town of Manchester's accounts and financial records for the year ending June 30 is now available to the public. The report may be seen in the town clerk's office.

The audit report on the town school for junior high school pupils, Superintendent of Schools Arthur H. Hilling said yesterday he was attempting to devise some "stop-gap" arrangements that would eliminate the necessity of double sessions next year for junior high school students.

**Martin Postpones  
CD Unit Meeting**

General Manager Richard Martin has announced that tomorrow night's scheduled meeting of the Manchester Civil Defense Advisory Council has been postponed to Friday, Oct. 17.

Martin, who serves as head of the town's Civil Defense department in the absence of an appointed director, said the postponement will give him additional time to prepare material relative to the planned reorganization of the department.

The general manager also said that he has been unsuccessful in securing possible candidates for the CD director's post. That position has been vacant since last December, when Col. John Rega resigned because of business commitments.

The town's Civil Defense authority has been inactive since then, but the recent release of a State-wide survival plan has prompted the move to revitalize and reorganize the local system.

**Estimate Needed**  
Martin said today the public hearing cannot be held on Oct. 20, as originally planned, because he will not know what estimate construction figure to include in the legal advertisement appearing in the hearing until after the hearing Monday. And the legal advertisement must be published three times five days in advance of the public hearing.

This requirement can be met in time to hold a hearing on Oct. 21, he said. But that means he addressed the Directors will have to approve the plans the same night if the bond references to be held in connection with the Nov. 4 general election.

Martin has been using a tentative estimate of \$1.6 million in discussing the proposed school. But he and Frid were to have worked out a firmer estimate after construction bids were taken on an 800-pupil school designed by Frid for Meriden. That bid opening is today.

However, Martin said today the three boards Monday night may reach a decision in connection with the school that could throw off any estimate made now.

As a result, he said, the legal advertisements announcing the public hearing cannot be inserted in the newspaper before Thursday, timetable for a public hearing on Oct. 20.

**Will Reserve Auditorium**  
He planned to reserve the Rogers school auditorium for the night of Oct. 21 for the public hearing.

If the Board of Directors is unable to act on that night, the referendum on the school will have to be delayed to a special election. In that event, Martin said today, he assumed that the Directors would prefer to wait until they had final plans and had accepted bids so that the voters would have an actual rather than an estimated figure on which to base a decision.

He did not think the possible delay would throw off the school's construction schedule, calling for occupancy by September 1969, unless it were unduly protracted. He noted that construction of the new high school, a much larger project, was begun in March 1955 and completed in September 1956.

However, a factor to consider is that contractors submit lower bids in the winter, when work is comparatively scarce, than in the spring.

**See No Double Sessions**  
In any event, Martin indicated today he did not believe double sessions for junior high school students were inevitable, either in 1969 or 1968. If the new school were not opened on schedule, however, as he sees it, the School Board would have to delay complete adoption of a 6-3-3 school system to avoid double sessions next year.

The School Board has stated that double sessions involving 1,000 pupils would be necessary in 1969 because of a shortage of classroom space. However, Martin said today the question of whether there is enough classroom space provided the School Board's new schools other than the Harvard Junior High School and the High
