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Zeller in Manchester On Unexpected Visit

State Comptroller Fred Zeller slipped into Manchester last night unannounced and largely unexpected. And his first appearance of the campaign here was as a political as a gubernatorial candidate could make it with election less than two weeks away.

The occasion of the Republican leader's visit was the Thanksgiving Party of the Veterans of World War I, U.S.A., were giving Sen. William A. Purtell and U.S. Rep. Edwin H. May Jr. at the VFW Home, at the Manchester Green.

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Rockville-Vernon Weather Limits Attendance At GOP, Democratic Talks

Republicans and Democrats spoke last night at two separate "meet the candidates" meetings in Rockville.

Although attendance was considered poor due to the weather, 25 to 100 people showed up at both the Democratic meeting at the Maple School where Raymond Thayer, candidate for state comptroller, and the Republican meeting at the Northeast School where William A. Pritchard, GOP candidate for election and Fred Zeller, GOP candidate for Governor, were the principal speakers.

The Northeast School meeting, sponsored by the Toland County Women's Republican Club, heard a report on the state constitution bill and a bill promoting the expansion of the state. He also said he felt there was a strong possibility of a Republican victory in the state and there is now active feeling among Republicans that it will be a great GOP victory. Pritchard said.

At the same meeting mentioned above he called for a "Republican" state program under the Democratic administration.

Many candidates from Toland County towns were introduced at the meeting and a question and answer period followed.

Those introduced at the meeting included State Rep. Frank J. Cunniff, candidate for the State Senate from the 5th District, James Vandenberg, candidate for the general assembly, High Sheriff Paul Sweeney, candidate for reelection, and Ralph Glavin, candidate for Judge of Probate.

Meanwhile Democrats gathered at the Northeast School heard a report on the state constitution bill and a bill promoting the expansion of the state. He also said he felt there was a strong possibility of a Republican victory in the state and there is now active feeling among Democrats that it will be a great GOP victory. Pritchard said.

He said of the many Governors he has been associated with, he has never felt as sure as he feels about the Republican program in the state. He said a good deal of the Republican program in the state was put off and postponed from season to season by the Republicans.

He said he also feels that it is very important that Governor Chester Hovde be supported and sent to Congress this year. That they and he worked under Hovde in the state government and he feels he is the most sincere and conscientious individual he has known in public life.

Among the Democratic candidates introduced were David Dickson, candidate for the State Senate, Raymond J. Pritchard, candidate for the General Assembly, and William A. Pritchard, candidate for the office of High Sheriff of Toland County.

The talks were followed by a question and answer period.

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School Officials To See Machines DOOR CANOPIES

Members of the Board of Education, Superintendent of Schools Arthur H. Hing and Assistant Superintendent Raymond D. Stachfeld will look at tabulating machines in Hartford tomorrow afternoon with a view to installing them in the Manchester school system.

The board has been invited by the IBM company to view the machines for use in taking attendance, scheduling classes, and making report cards.

Other uses for the machines might be in taking a school census, making out paychecks, and general accounting in the central administrative office.

At the Board of Education meeting Monday night, filing cabinet members that a new tabulating machine will be needed at the high school so now is a favorable time to investigate the possibilities of installing the more complex and efficient machines.

The cost of renting a keypunch, a sorter, and a tabulating machine would be about \$500 a month. Contracts are renewed annually, and the company services the machines, trains personnel to use them, and replaces them with newer models as they are developed.

For though he can quote the Marxists as saying he is essentially a practical man.

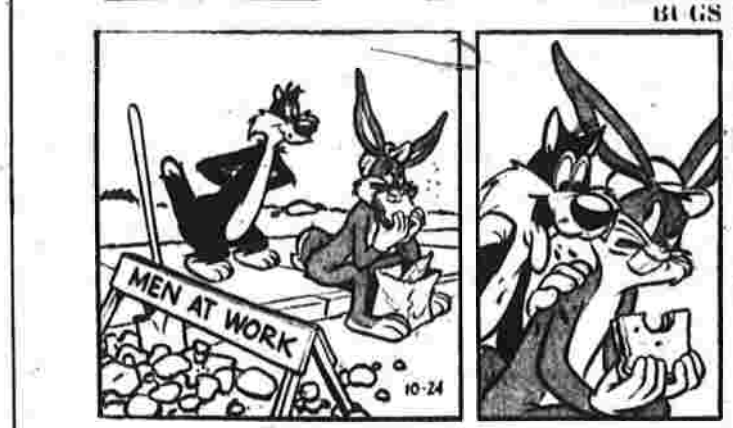

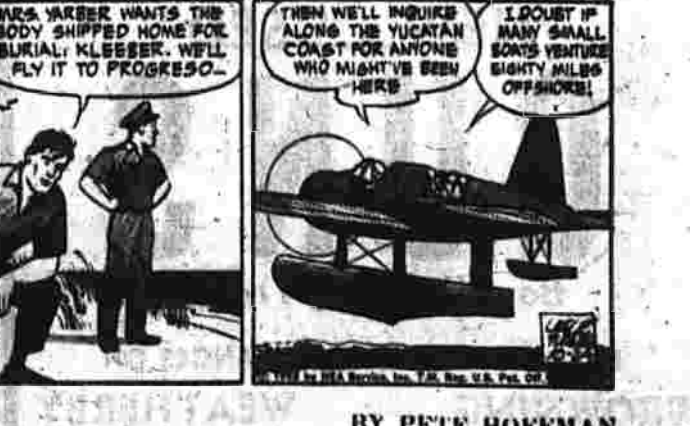
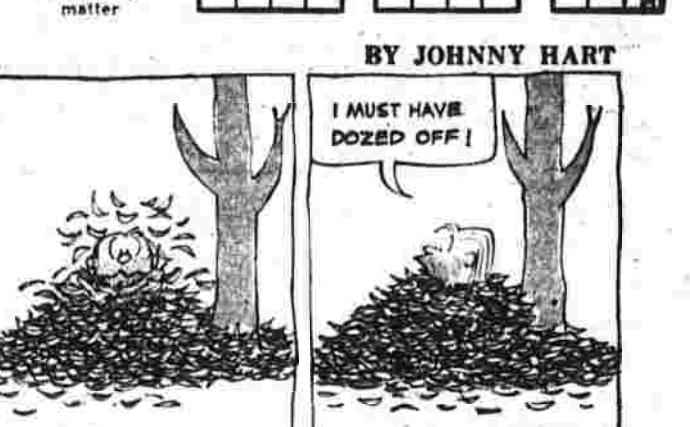
