Armed Man Grabs \$461 In Hartford

Hartford, Nov. 11 (AP)—A lone bandit wearing a stocking mask held up the Elman Coal Co. office at 155 East Avon St. at 10:15 a.m. today, cowed four persons with a pearl-handled automatic and fled on foot with \$461.

William H. Wilcox, office manager, was seated at his desk in the small one-story building at the corner of North Front St., facing the East Avon St. front window. At a desk in front of him sat Marshall W. Eiman, vice president of the firm, whose 8-year-old daughter, Harriet, sat at a third desk pecking at a typewriter.

Mrs. Mary Norman, the bookkeeper, sat in a partitioned office section of the office at the rear, working at her own desk.

Nylon Stocking Over Head—The bandit, wearing what appeared to be Army shoes and a set of Army coveralls, suddenly appeared in the rear of the office. He had walked up a short flight of stairs on the North Front St. side of the building to a small porch and entered through the rear door.

A woman's brown nylon stocking was pulled over his head to his neck. A small, pearl-handled automatic was clutched in his right hand.

Standing just to the rear of Wilcox, who had just finished balancing the previous day's receipts in preparation for making up a bank deposit slip, the bandit said, "I'm sorry I have to do this."

He appeared nervous but his gun-hand did not tremble.

Turning slightly to his left, the bandit looked into the bookkeeper's section and told Mrs. Norman, "Come on over here and sit down."

Then his gaze fell on Harriet Eiman and he said to her, "You come along and sit down, too."

Mrs. Norman came out to the outer office and sat down as directed. Harriet, however, remained standing near Mrs. Norman.

Harriet's father and Wilcox were ordered to stand by Mrs. Norman and the girl in the center of the room. They all raised their hands above their heads as directed.

Nation Urged To Fight Soviet Blackmail Try

Washington, Nov. 11 (AP)—Big Gen. David Sarnoff called on the nation today for courage, sacrifice and preparedness to face up to what he called the Communist campaign of bluster and blackmail.

"The American cause has become inseparable from the cause of all mankind," he said in an address for Veterans Day services at Arlington National Cemetery.

The ceremony marked the first observance of the day since unknown of World War I and Korea were buried adjoining the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

World War I, the day marked the 40th anniversary of the World War I armistice, and the 50th anniversary of Veterans Day, established by Congress in 1948.

Sarnoff, chairman of the board of the Radio Corp. of America, recalled the sacrifices made by American fighting men in those wars and added:

"Perhaps beyond any prior generation we are now being asked to face a new and more menacing threat. It is the Soviet Union, which has become a world power, and which is now threatening the peace of the world."

Little Rock School Unit May Resign

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 11 (AP)—What happens to a community's schools when its school board quits?

Who operates the schools? These questions face Little Rock today.

Five of the six members of the school board have discussed resigning en masse, thus leaving their integration "hot seat." This report was confirmed yesterday by a member who declined to be identified by name.

Wayne Upton, board president, said the group would meet officially today, ostensibly to discuss the latest federal court ruling ordering integration at once in Little Rock's public schools.

But if the board resigns, who is left to handle the routine duties—such as signing paychecks—much less to attempt to carry out yesterday's edict from the U.S. Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, and should the board stay on, how can it operate the schools which are not operating?

Gov. Orval E. Faubus closed Little Rock's four high schools to avoid integration. He has shown no inclination to reopen them.

County Supervisor A. B. Wetherington said he is not sure just who can appoint a new school board.

When the number of members is reduced below a quorum, that becomes a different matter, Wetherington said, however, he thinks the appointing power may have been given to the County Board of Education in a 1912 pact.

Normally, only three of the members would be up for reelection.

So far only one candidate has announced for a board position, James T. Hargrave, Little Rock attorney.

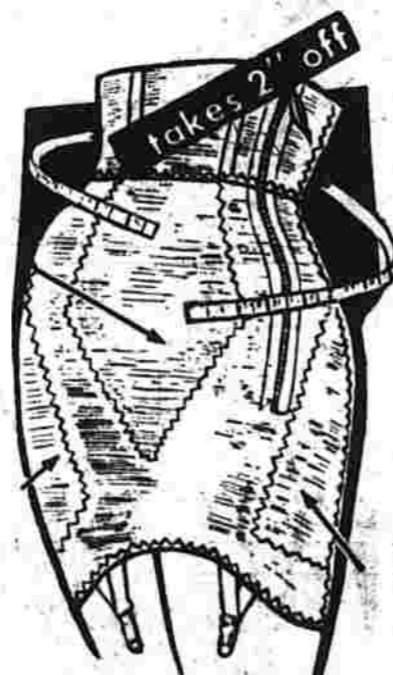

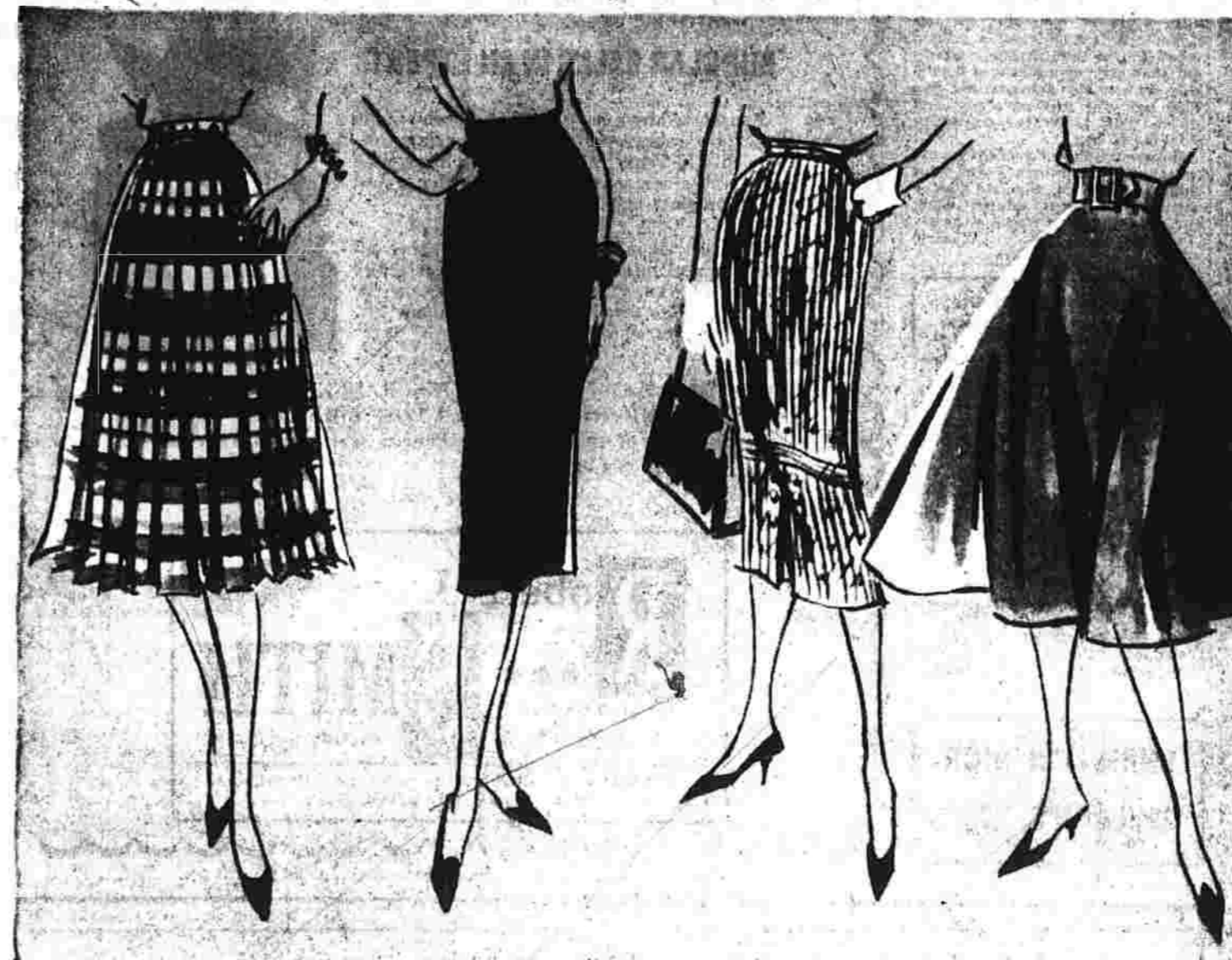

Accra, Ghana, Nov. 11 (AP)—The government accused 43 persons of plotting to kill Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah and two of his ministers. Twenty were arrested and police hunted the other 23 today. An official announcement last night said the group formed an underground movement known as "Zionist Seven." The aim was said to be the violent overthrow of the present regime following assassination of Nkrumah. The two ministers were reported to be Interior Minister Krobo Edumasi and Information Minister Kofi Baako. The scheduled program of the Opposition United Party attended a hastily summoned meeting to discuss the arrests. One Opposition leader, R.L.B. Danquah, told newsmen: "This is a further attempt by the government to cripple opposition and democracy in Ghana. I believe the allegations made against these men are untrue. Steel-headed politicians carrying out unscrupulous policies in the streets of Accra."

Job Description With the assistance of three other assistant clerks, Ferguson keeps the records of the court-making entries on case files and docketing of pleadings, checking all judgments prepared by lawyers for accuracy and sometimes preparing them himself.

He also takes bonds from plaintiffs who have been interrupted five years earlier by the economic dislocation caused by the depression. He has entered Catholic University in Washington, D. C., in 1928, but was forced to leave his studies in 1931.

Ferguson, a native of Plymouth, Mass., moved to Manchester with his parents when he was four years old, and has lived here ever since.

Was Active Democrat Until the Superior Court judges changed a ban on political activities by court personnel in 1950, Ferguson, a Democrat, had been active in local affairs. He was a member of the Democratic Town Committee, served on the Board of Education from 1944 until 1950, and at one time was an assistant prosecutor of the Town Court.

Ferguson also served on the Charter Revision Committee, which drafted the council-manager charter which became effective in 1947.

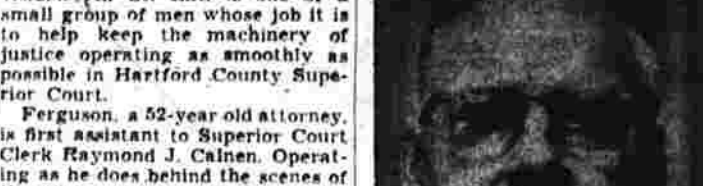
