Reds Propose 2 Treaties on A-Ban. Control

Geneva, Nov. 17 (AP)—Russia offered today to negotiate two separate treaties for handling nuclear tests and for controlling the ban-and suggest the agreement be signed simultaneously.

Soviet delegate Semyon Tsarapkin made the proposal at a document talks on nuclear test suspension.

His proposal failed to meet a basic requirement in these talks: the linking of test suspension to a control system in one treaty.

The 2-treaty approach advanced by the Russians raises the danger that the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union would negotiate two separate treaties.

The western side maintains that if the Russians insist on two treaties, the western side will agree to the all-inclusive single treaty.

Basically, the disagreement in the conference now has boiled down to this point: Shall the nuclear powers negotiate one treaty or two?

Delegations for the three powers met for 80 minutes, U.S. Ambassador to the Soviet Union, head of the American delegation.

At the 10-nation conference on prevention of surprise attack, both sides proposed a document treaty to prevent surprise attack.

The treaty proposal was submitted to the conference on the day after the Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister, Vasily V. Kouznetsov, said.

Western officials said the proposal was a "sensible" one, within the scope of the present talks.
