Planners Get Briefing On Housing for Aged

A 1-hour briefing on the homes-for-the-aged project was given to the Town Planning Commission by Atty. Herman Yules at a meeting last night in the Municipal Building. The proposed site is 111 1/2 acres in the center of the town.

The Commission has requested Yules counsel for the Manchester Housing Authority to give them the latest information on the project's progress so they could study the zoning change involved and also explore the feasibility of the federal government-owned land which would be used for that 100 housing units.

At the end of the briefing TPC Chairman Martin Alvord said it was the consensus of the Commission that it "would go along" with changing the area from an A-1-C zone to allow the small units to be built.

Great interest was also expressed by the Commission members in the 10-acre of the 28-acre tract which would be left over after the project is built.

To Use 18 Acres

Yules explained that tentative plans now call for using 18 acres for the housing project but that probably less land will actually be used. Since it is not yet known exactly how much land the federal government will require for the project, the Housing Authority figured on a maximum amount, he said.

The site would extend approximately 600 feet along W. Center St. and about 1,000 feet toward Hartford Rd. but would not border on the latter, Yules said. He added that an access street would lead to Hartford Rd. from the project.

In answer to a question from Alvord, Yules said the town would be given the first opportunity to buy the remainder of the land not used, and then, if the town did not do so, the property would be sold at auction.

The Manchester Housing Authority member, said he thought the idea of the town purchasing the additional land was a good one in order to prepare for possible future expansion of the project.

"The number of elderly people is increasing more and more," he said, "and this should be taken into consideration." The other members of the Commission indicated they agree with him.

Yules said he would notify the Commission when the value of the extra land has been determined by an appraisal.

To Reveal Segues

The sewer lines already installed on the site of the former World War II housing project will not add to its value, Yules said, but will probably detract from it instead, as they are inadequate and must be dug up and replaced.

Yules also described the two types of units which will be built in the project.

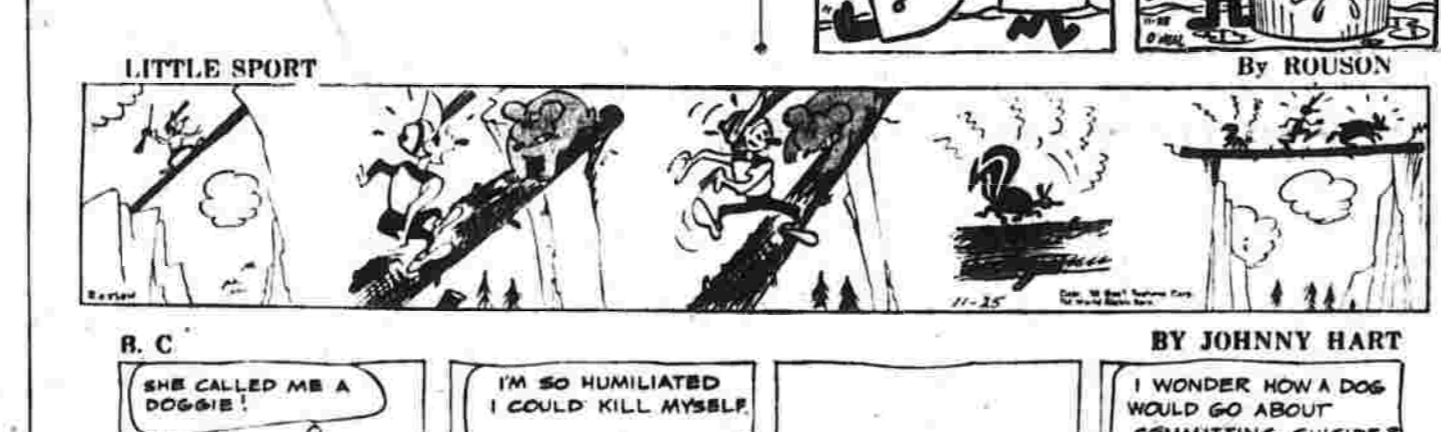
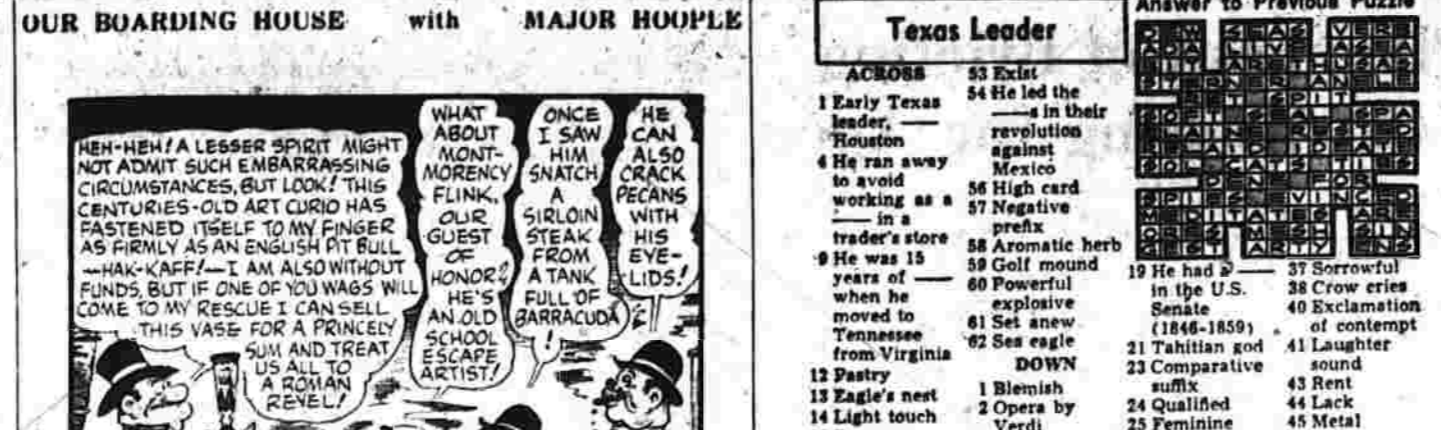
