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### Inaugural Address Highlights

Hartford, Jan. 7 (AP)—Highlights of Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff's inaugural address as prepared for delivery today:

"I am proud to be in a line with the amount of revenue we can reasonably expect from the tax system as it stands in 1957. This policy will be reflected in the executive budget that will be presented to you next month."

"It will be a balanced budget. It will be a budget that will enable us to take a breath without impairing the quality of our present high grade services or jeopardizing our future growth."

"We have allowed our government to spread in all directions in a piecemeal fashion. We have too often let things stay as they are long after they have outlived their usefulness or have become inefficient encumbrances."

"The 124 separate budgeted agencies which we now have in Connecticut constitute an unwieldy structure which we can be judicious and common sense trimming and regrouping, convert into practical business-like organizations which more clearly define the line of authority and responsibility."

"One immediate result that should be mentioned is that through the proposed changes, the number of budget agencies will be reduced from the present 124 to 60."

"The proposed reorganization call for the abolition of county government and the assignment of its functions to various state agencies."

"The limited functions it now performs can be done more efficiently and more economically by centralizing the work of these agencies better suited to do it by professional training and experience."

"Through the years it has developed overtones of political patronage that are not attuned to the concept of good government."

"A second major area that requires reorganization is our system of courts, especially the minor court system of municipal and trial justice courts."

"I urge that we do away with our 168 trial justice and municipal courts and replace them with a division of a reconstituted common pleas court, functioning as a state-maintained court."

"Our basic judicial system would then have:

"A Supreme Court of Errors and a Superior Court as we have them now, with the addition of a family court functioning as a division of the superior court."

"A reconstituted Common Pleas Court with one division doing substantially the work now being done by our Common Pleas Court and the second division hearing all cases now heard in our trial justice and municipal courts. The judge could be interchanged by the Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court of Errors and assigned to various areas in the state as case load requires."

"All the judges of these courts would be fully qualified persons of high legal competence, serving full-time with tenure."

"The question of bringing our probate courts into an integrated system will require consideration of a constitutional amendment since the constitution now provides for election of those judges."

"We should create a Department of Mental Retardation as a division in the Department of Health. Its principal objective will be to develop a total program for the entire state. With such

to expand the educational opportunities of as many young men and women as possible, we should ask the State Council on Higher Education to recommend a specific program for providing state scholarships to further their education. It would be desirable to have the chance to further their education. At the same time, the council should determine the potential benefits of extending state financial assistance to private colleges for the expansion of their facilities to accommodate more Connecticut students."

"Specifically, the council should establish whether such expansion will provide more room for disadvantaged students whose education, otherwise, would involve higher state capital and operating costs."

"Construction of a statewide highway system and the inclusion of our major bridges is a capital improvement project. Its benefits reach into the future and are shared in by tomorrow's citizens as well as today's."

"What we propose again is that we make more effective use of the revenues we receive from the state. It is now in order that we may, with greater economy and efficiency, build the roads we need on an over-all statewide and integrated basis. Most of our borrowing will be done against federal bonds."

"This use of federal funds means that outside of interest charges the total cost to Connecticut will amount to about 28 per cent of the total cost. Connecticut's share of the cost will be greatly outweighed by the impact of the program which will give to our economy, the convenience it will bring to our motorists and the reduction in traffic hazards."

"The highway program should emphasize specific steps for eliminating the Greater Hartford Bridge Authority and making the bridges in the Hartford area an integral part of our over-all state highway system. That's exactly what they are."

"During this session of the General Assembly, we should consider also legislation bringing Connecticut more completely in line with the Uniform Traffic Code, especially in respect to chemical tests for intoxication, an absolute maximum speed limit, a uniform traffic ticket and a standard accident report form."

"The far-reaching effects that the peaceful use of atomic energy will have on our economy also requires us to consider revisions in our workers' compensation law to cover occupational diseases resulting from exposure to radiation hazards which lay latent for many years."

"Tomorrow I intend to ask State Labor Commissioner Renato Ricciardi and our new state treasurer, John Sperdute, to work out cooperatively a procedure for paying unemployment insurance benefits with checks issued in local offices directly to claimants rather than being mailed from Hartford."

"I urge you... to continue into the next biennium both the \$21 per pupil voted in 1957 as an across-the-board increase (for State Aid to Education) and the \$9.50 per pupil voted as an extra grant for communities which have experienced exceptional growth in their school populations."

"In all fairness, we should insist that our towns in their turn, pay every cent of their state education grants for education alone."

### Wallace Sees State Losing Tax Position

Hartford, Jan. 7 (AP)—A Republican legislative leader warned yesterday that Connecticut's favorable tax advantage—which has been a big attraction to residents and business—"is fast disappearing."

This word of caution came from Rep. Anthony Wallace of Rimbury, who will be an assistant minority leader in the House of Representatives.

He told the GOP weekly luncheon at Hartford that one of the most critical problems facing the 1959 Legislature is "how much further to debt and how much more increase in taxes on Connecticut as a good place in which to live and do business."

"It is high time that the people of our state were told the unpleasant facts," he said. "They have been fooled too long and through campaign oratory led to believe that all is well in Connecticut."

"It is somewhat ironic that by virtue of their complete control of both houses of the Legislature, as well as the executive branch, the Democrats now have a mandate from the people to live up to their repeated promise of no new or increased taxes."

In support of his contention that the state is "dangerously close" to believing that all is well in Connecticut, Wallace made these points:

"The housing program for the needy enacted by the 1957 General Assembly in its special session is being paid with uncollectible provisions that not a single town has yet elected to participate in the plan. It should be revised that debt service payments are made more realistic to permit local housing authorities to set rents as a reasonable level of their own income."

"Chief among the things we must do to conserve and make fuller use of the great asset represented by our natural resources is to expand through land acquisition, our fish and game preserves and our park and forest systems and to improve the facilities in the parks and forests we now have. In this connection, we should look into the advisability of obtaining sites for two more shore parks."

"The beach erosion programs initiated in 1955 should be extended and a statewide program should be developed for the use and conservation of our waters."

"We must on our own initiative, and with the cooperation of the federal government and other states, continue our flood preventive and protective effort."

"Searching out and attracting new industry into our state must remain one of our prime jobs."

"As an added impetus to our economic growth, it is my recommendation that we create an office of urban renewal to assist our communities with their urban renewal and redevelopment programs."

"This message is intended as a chart that clearly marks the major objectives, both immediate and long-range toward which we should travel. It is not my purpose today, therefore, to lay before you an all-inclusive and detailed list of the many additional things we can do to keep Connecticut moving ahead. To cover these bills will be introduced during the next few weeks."

"SEVEN WONDERS of the Ancient World" is said to have

rose only 81 per cent. The fiscal problem ahead for the 1959 Legislature is a further complication by the elimination of approximately \$25 million surplus which existed in 1957.

Wallace labeled Governor Ribicoff's "pay as we grow" highway building program "a financed by bonds as 'just so much poetic sobriety'."

"Pay as we grow" is no solution," he added, "it merely postpones and compounds the problem."

He promised that the Republican minority in the session opening tomorrow will scrutinize "each proposal for new or increased spending in the cold light of necessity."

### Union Plans Quiz On Bus Strike

New Haven, Jan. 7 (AP)—Leaders of the AFL-CIO bus drivers' union, meeting in New Haven to make plans for a strike vote against the Connecticut Co. decided instead yesterday to consult the union membership more fully on the matter.

Joseph Fahy of Boston, representing the International union, will visit union locals throughout the state during the coming week to talk over the situation.

Fahy came here last month to take charge after the union's joint conference board, composed of leaders of state locals, split over the negotiations.

"Part of them have taken one position and part another," Fahy said. "I'm going to see if I can tell the members what the facts are."

At each meeting, he said, he will explain the stance taken by the union and the company and then answer questions. It is likely that the typical member's feeling will be taken into account.

After having made the circuit through the state, Fahy will return to New Haven to lead the union's campaign for a strike vote.

### Extended Forecast

Temperatures in Connecticut for the next five days, Thursday through Monday, are expected to be normal.

The normal mean temperature in the Hartford area for this period is 38 degrees ranging from a normal high temperature of about 37 to a normal low temperature of about 18. A warming trend is expected through Friday, cooler Saturday, and then warmer again Sunday and Monday.

Precipitation for the period is expected to average 5.0ths of an inch or less occurring as rain about Monday.

### Dried Bananas Coming

Monrovia, Liberia — German importers are developing a new sea-port in Liberia that will increase shipments of dried bananas to Europe and eventually permit the export of the typical African delicacy to the United States. The dried bananas resemble a dried fig, but keep the banana flavor.

### Archaeology Find Huge

Washington — The Smithsonian Institution reports that more than 8,000 archaeological sites of Indian and frontier settlements have been found in the past 12 years in areas scheduled to be flooded or otherwise destroyed by the nation's reservoir-rebuilding program. The sites are scattered over 310 reservoir areas in 42 states.

Board Sets Hearings, Appropriates Funds

The Board of Directors last night voted \$37,000 from the unexpended surplus of the 1958-59 fiscal year for payment of claims and refunds, Hartford County taxes, and insurance costs.

The Board also made an appointment, set dates for public hearings and authorized the general manager to prepare a plan for a force main and pump station for the West End.

The Board set Jan. 29 as the date for public hearings on the proposed \$2,139,000 bond issue for the Board of Education and \$700 from the Board of Directors for the Hartford Public Library.

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Funds Denied For Repairs To Town Hall

The Board of Directors last night rejected a request by General Manager Richard Martin to spend \$40,000 on expanding the second floor of the Municipal Building.

Director Gilbert Barnes cast the single vote in favor, saying that the building's open construction created waste space in the interior that should be used with the growth in the administration's space needs.

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Retailers Ask Fluoridation Vote Hit by Opponents

### ICY Report Card-2 Vital Discoveries Made About Weather, Ice, Sea

Meaning more rainfall a month or so after the Earth intercepts a stream of meteors.

Whatever the merit of such ideas, JOY is certain to produce far better and more basic understanding of the why and how of our weather. That means better forecasts, perhaps eventual methods of weather control.

Manned around the South Pole is the Earth's great icehouse. Antarctica. Ice is a factor in the balance of heat and water on Earth, hence a weather influence.

Advancing scientists discovered Antarctica contains nearly half again as much ice as first estimates—ice averages about 1 1/2 miles thick over the region's 14 million square miles. At one point in Marie Byrd Land ice lies nearly three miles deep.

Were it all suddenly to melt, sea levels would rise 300 feet or more. In disastrous floods Antarctica would strip off its ice-massaged—its apparently not a continent after all, but an ice-hidden system of even two separate systems of islands and mountains.

Recent weathering at a station in the Antarctic highlands measured a record low temperature of 124 degrees below zero. But temperatures on any given day can vary by 10 to 20 degrees. In the Antarctic, temperatures range as low as 100 below zero.

Signs were found that Antarctica is warming up, at least in places. Little America is about five degrees warmer now on the average than in 1912, reports Dr. Harry Wadell of the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Arctic Winters Warmer

At Spitzbergen in the Arctic, average winter temperature is 11 degrees warmer than 50 years ago.

Arctic studies find there is less ice in that region than half a century ago, but that the Arctic is being bathed with far more snow than Antarctic now.

Ocean currents shuttle vast amounts of the Earth's heat from place to place.

Seagoing scientists discovered three vital counter-currents flowing deep under the Gulf Stream under the Pacific Equatorial Current, and another north of the Equator. They influence not only weather, but the precious marine life services of the ocean.

At sea and on land, they sought to learn whether mankind is making the Earth grow warmer from the dioxide released by burning coal and oil. This gas, if it stays in the atmosphere, could exert a green house warming effect.

The preliminary verdict: All but 2 or 3 per cent of it is absorbed by the ocean.

Submerged Mountains

Ships of many nations sounding the watery bottom discovered new submerged mountains and valleys, recovered specimens of marine life long thought extinct, charted water temperatures, density and salinity to determine the course of ocean currents and the speed with which cold bottom waters rise to replenish and fertilize the sea life.

### Corks Fly in War of Grapes

London—(NEA)—If it had happened 800 years ago, France would have been at war with England and Spain, and the whole episode would be known as the War of the Grapes.

But this being the Age of Litigation, the three-nation hassle over the right of passage to produce and export to England a beverage labeled champagne has wound up in the law courts.

It all started a few weeks ago when a shipment of 18,000 bottles of Spanish champagne was turned back as unidentifiable by patrol-packing French frontier police.

The French of course maintain that Spanish champagne is an impostor, falsely named, and that the only true champagne comes from the Champagne district of France.

The "Bubbly" Got Through

The undaunted Spaniards' defense was that the wine was trucked to Barcelona where it was placed aboard a freighter which took it to London. In time to salvage the holiday, there of course, the Spaniards' defense is a popular seller here, since it is about half the price of the French product. It is known as "Bubbly" and is sold in bottles of 1.5 and 3 liters.

The French and the Champagne Association of Britain lost the first legal battle when a court found the Spaniards' champagne not genuine. The Spaniards then sued for a false label. The case is believed unlikely in that it was the first time British justice in its awesome role has been set in motion to press the price of a grape.

In Old Tuller's famed number 1 court, where some of the nation's most hardened criminals have been tried, the spot light was on a dark green bottle, the bearing the name "Perle de France," which is the 15th Century champagne brand of the Spanish Marquis de Rueda. Apparently many do. Some \$5,000 bottles were sold in Britain in 1958 by the two-year-old Costa wine house.

### South Windsor Case Submits 5 House Bills

Representative-elect John M. Casey has announced plans to submit five bills to the State Legislature during the coming session. They concern time payment plan, motor vehicle laws and court procedure.

One bill would require firms to make payments to a separate fund which could be turned over to the State Treasurer and not to the State Treasury. The aim is to protect buyers who may lose their business payments if the firm goes out of business or declares bankruptcy.

Another proposal would permit auto being driven on a lane divide highway to remain in the left hand lane unless closely followed by another vehicle. Casey said the bill would eliminate "hedgehopping" constant crossing and retreating from right to left hand lanes while passing — to motorists.

Another bill regarding motor vehicles would permit passing on the right when the vehicle ahead has indicated or is making a left turn. Present laws forbid leaving the traveled portion of the highway.

Other proposals concern court procedure and accident claims. One would permit judges trying minor court cases to use their own discretion in requiring appearance of parents of defendants under 21, and would permit them to appoint a guardian ad litem for the defendants. The other would allow a plaintiff to sue the estate of a deceased person without presenting a claim to use the estate if the claim is based on a tort, as might be the case in an auto accident.

Casey also announced he plans to hold another legislative session season before the Jan. 21 deadline for submitting bills. He said he would be invited to attend and recommend other possible bills.

### The Doctor Says

The three most common types of pneumonia are lobar pneumonia, bronchopneumonia, and atypical pneumonia. In this column I shall confine my remarks to bronchopneumonia.

Bronchopneumonia is not really a single disease. It can be caused by any of several germs, the irritating gases or other substances breathed in may also produce an inflamed condition of the bronchi and surrounding lung tissue.

The dividing line between bronchitis (infection of the bronchial tubes) and bronchopneumonia, which includes involvement of the lung tissue proper, is not sharp. The bronchitis can easily lead to pneumonia.

What, then, is it? The smaller breathing passages leading to the lungs are called bronchi. As they pass down toward the lungs they divide and become smaller and smaller. When the smaller bronchi become inflamed and swollen, the condition is called bronchitis. If the inflammation spreads to the lung tissue, it is called pneumonia.

Bronchopneumonia, when left untreated, does not end with a sudden disappearance of symptoms and drop in temperature as lobar pneumonia does. It may hang on for a long time without definite change.

The treatment of bronchopneumonia was formerly extremely difficult. Now penicillin and the sulfadiazine have brought about a change, although they frequently fail to exert such dramatic effect as they do in some other infections.

Bronchopneumonia is a dangerous disease. It damage done to the lung tissue cannot always be repaired. Even in those who recover, symptoms may persist for many months.

The maintenance of good general health and the avoidance of unnecessary exposure to respiratory infections are helpful preventive measures.

### Your Pocketbook

Every time you spot a '59 car, give it cheer.

Whether we are headed toward a vigorous expansion of the entire economy or merely coasting along on a pretty even keel is heavily dependent upon how you, the consumer, in coming months, accept the new car market.

If this statement sounds drastic, consider the following facts intended to show the dramatic effect of automobile sales to our economic health.

One out of every six businesses in the U.S. today depends on automobiles. That means that, automatically speaking, don't just start a party and stop it. Ford or Chrysler; they sell prosperity or depression to more than 700,000 businesses—most of them small, ranging from retail automobile stores to car repair services, gas stations, parking lots, drive-in theaters and movie houses.

Think of the companies that supply the car makers. In 1957 when 8,100,000 passenger cars were made, they consumed close to 19 percent of the nation's total steel output—44 percent of all sheet steel and 40 percent of all wire. In that year 64 percent of all natural synthetic rubber consumed that year. They used 43 percent of all upholstery leather made, 196 million square feet of glass and many, many more raw materials.

Insurance and finance companies are heavily dependent upon the automobile industry. The volume of automobile insurance for instance has increased three and a half times since 1948, standing at \$4.5 billion dollars in 1957. The year finance companies lent 16.7 billion to help some 65 per cent of all car buyers finance their car purchases.

Considerable federal and state tax money comes from the automobile industry. Say you lived in Michigan and bought a new \$2,000 car in 1957. Of that total amount \$201.60 was tax money. In that year all 48 states together collected \$2.9 billion dollars from gasoline tax receipts.

Local and urban highway tax receipts in 1957 totaled \$3 billion. Special motor user taxes that is taxes on license, motor fuel and such, contributed 28 per cent of total state tax revenues. Additionally the federal government received \$5 billion in excise tax money from automobiles.

To the experts 1959 looks like a good, but not a record year, for car output. The big question is this: Will it be a \$5 billion or a \$1 billion passenger car output year?

The U.S. Department of Commerce is predicting on the low side. It bases its prediction on a method which relates relative automobile prices and the number of cars scrapped. With a 2 per cent to 3 per cent increase in car prices, they expect 5.5 million to be sold for next year.

More optimistic is the National Industrial Conference Board. It relates new car sales to the number of spending units in the U.S. the level of income and the change in sales from the preceding year. In 1958 income rose at the same rate as it did after the 1954 recession. N.I.C.B. expects will be approximately 8,800,000 cars. This would mean a 15 per cent increase over 1958. The current low of 4 1/2 million cars sold this year.

## Congress Convenes, Battles Take Shape

(Continued from Page One)

Legislators were quick to get in their feet.

Rep. Lee Metcalf (D-Mont.) proposed a multi-billion dollar program of federal aid to the states for public school construction and teachers' salaries. He said Sen. James E. Murray (D-Mont.) would sponsor a similar bill in the Senate.

Grants would total an estimated \$1,100,000,000 the first year, almost \$2,000,000,000 by the fourth year.

And Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.) introduced a bill for federal aid to economically depressed areas. A bill to fund a hospital, sponsored by President Eisenhower last session.

On the other side of the political fence, Democratic leader Johnson was reported ready to take the play away from a bipartisan group of Civil Rights advocates who want a rules change to make it easier to kill off filibusters.

In the last session of Congress Johnson was reported ready to provide that two-thirds of those voting on and debate the present rules requires the affirmative votes of 66 Senators to accomplish this.

But Johnson's resolution also provided that the Senate recognize it as a continuing body with rules carried over from year to year.

Those who are ready to change the rules are challenging Johnson's resolution. They are seeking to make it possible for 50 Senators to cut off extended debate. Southern Democrats are opposing such change in the rules.

Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-NM), who had intended to offer a resolution to adopt new rules, said his effort may be delayed.

As a majority leader, Johnson has a right over those who seek to recognize by the president's officers and that with their first with any motion he might make. But he declined to say what he would do.

The pre-Congress jockeying over the rules of the House and Senate in ceremonies for the 438 House members and the 96 Senators elected to the 86th Congress. Many relatives and friends of the new members were on hand for the swearing in ceremonies.

With the addition of two Senators and a House member from Alaska, the 86th became the largest Congress in history.

Johnson's resolution would give control of both Houses, 283-153 in the House and 64-34 in the Senate. Not until later will the new Congress get down to actual work on legislation.

President Eisenhower will deliver his State of the Union message in person Friday, and will send a \$7 billion balanced budget bill to Congress on Jan. 10.

Meanwhile the Congress will go ahead with the routine of appointing and organizing committees and otherwise preparing to handle a flood of proposed legislation.

Democratic leaders have expressed their determination to write an independent legislative record on which their candidates can stand in 1960.

"Rayburn put it yesterday: 'We're going to bring out a great program of legislation as we did in the 84th and 85th Congresses that got us elected to the 86th.'"

Then Rayburn joined the Senate leader Johnson has been preaching: "The Democrats are a party of responsibility and not just of opposition."

But there seemed little doubt opposition would be forthcoming quickly after Eisenhower outlines his program.

He faced with swiftly mounting problems of space exploration, Russian missile advances and the rising cost of defense. Democrats have made it clear they will eye Eisenhower's budget with deep skepticism.

Until Eisenhower lays down his program, Democrats are expected to hold their fire on legislative proposals of their own.
