Hal Boyle What Could Be Done With \$40 Billion?

New York (AP) — "The biggest enemy of human progress is mental indolence," said Robert Maynard Hutchins, who will be 60 years old tomorrow.

"An Aristotle said, 'Learning is accompanied by pain.' Too many people won't go through that pain."

"The biggest mistake man makes is that he doesn't think through the question of just what is really worthwhile."

"The one-time 'boy wonder' of the educational world—he was secretary of Yale at 23, dean of

its law school at 28 and president of the University of Chicago at 30—is still a figure of controversy.

At 60 he looks 50. His crew cut hair is graying, but his 6-foot-3 frame shows no sign of a paunch. Nor does his mind. He is as ready as ever to fight for his ideas, but still professes surprise that his ideas stir up so much controversy.

"It is remarkable to me that people think of a critic in an adverse sense," he observed. "Criticism to me means appraisal. To most people it seems to mean at-

ack. But to lay the basis for improvement in any field you first have to point out that things aren't perfect."

Hutchins has been assailed as an iconoclast, a cynic and a pessimist. He regards himself as more of an optimist, feels the general level of the world today is better than it has ever been, and is strongly hopeful of human progress.

"Yes, I am hopeful," he said, smiling. "But if pressed 'or specific grounds for my optimism I might be at a loss to explain why."

"I don't believe, however, that things just get better and better by themselves every day. A tremendous exertion of human will and intelligence is necessary to achieve progress."

"And I think that everything that is called progress isn't necessarily real progress."

"I do feel, what many of my contemporaries don't feel, a sense of crisis — and it has very little

to do with the Russians. If all the Russians were to disappear tomorrow — or become Republicans — everything wouldn't be fine. We must find our own standards and our own purposes, and not measure our own effort by the activities of people we despise."

"The crisis I feel is a crisis about the whole American tradition. The question is whether our own democratic institutions can stand the strains and pressures of a large, heterogeneous, bureaucratic society — whether the individual can stay free."

Convinced that civilization cannot withstand another general war, Hutchins sees only final disaster in a continued armament race.

"The process of mutual intimidation can lead only to general bankruptcy," he said. "The world needs education, communication, organization and law. If we put the same attention and spent the same money to these things that we do

Hartford, Jan. 21 (AP)—A bill that would make it easier for office-seekers to get onto the ballot in their party's primary elections has been submitted to the State Legislature by State Rep. Robert Satter (D-Newington).

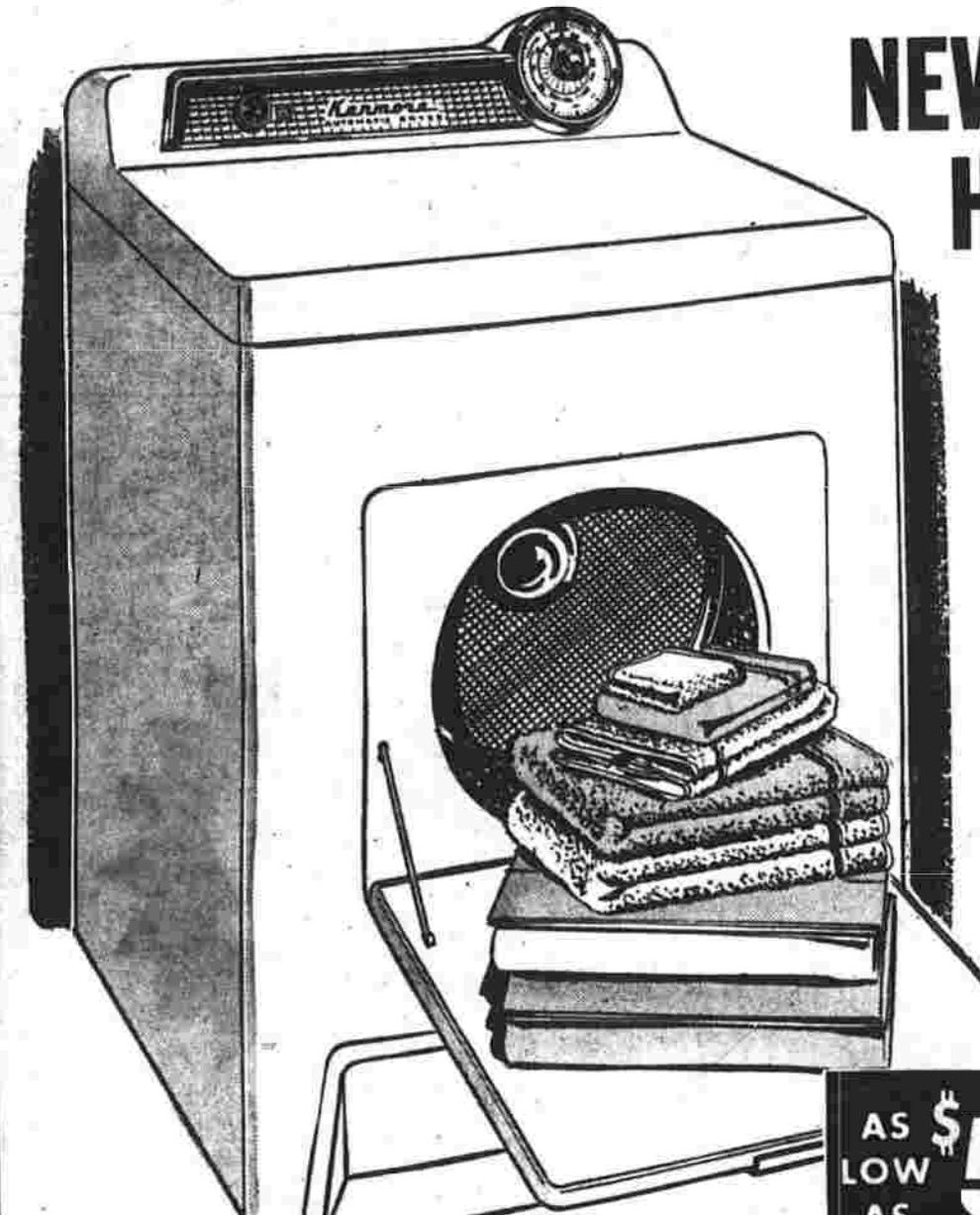
The measure provides that any person who makes a bid for a nomination at a party convention and loses to someone else may, if he got at least 20 per cent of the vote cast, challenge the nominee in a primary election just by asking for the chance. His request to enter the primary must be made to the secretary of state.

At present, those who get 20 per cent of the convention vote but are named out by someone else can get into a primary only if they run up signed petitions on behalf of their candidacy.

being doing everything it could to prevent and reduce the number of deaths that may be caused by the bad blood between us may have no more fundamental than the fact that we both have a climate which makes wheat and beef crops for us. We have driven Argentina beef to the European market, and the Argentine outlook and sentiment and even political inspiration has followed its lead. But we broke these European connections, and three us closer together, and when democracy in Argentina threw off its combination of Franco, Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin and began trying to find its own way toward stability, it found a natural instinct to look to us, for our example in democracy, and for our friendship and help. Perhaps, for the moment, our dollars are more important than our ideals. As a prelude to this, our Treasury and a group of private banks loaned Argentina the respectable sum of \$20,000,000. The Argentine domestic problem, which involves a search for economic stability and solvent which cannot be reached by the means whom Peru lavished special favors, indicates that a lot more of outside help and aid will be needed. But at least we are laying out ourselves and helping a new effort at democracy, and that holds more long-range promise and benefit, both ways, than some of our past Latin American special help, which has gone to dictatorship.

Balanced Insanity
 Only 24 cents of the dollar will in the President's budget submitted to Congress, be expended for purposes not connected with war, past, present and future. The main 76 cents of the tax dollar is eaten up by defense and security expenditures, by veterans' benefits, by interest on the cost of past wars, and by the 24 cents that doesn't go for war, eight cents goes to the national farm program, a basic folly we are trying to fight our way out of, without too much immediate success.
 By such fancy-free arithmetic, which ignores the fact that the cost of past wars can be written off the budget, no matter what we do about present and future wars, we arrive at an imaginary situation in which the national budget could be slashed to one-sixth of its present size, so that we could run the federal government on some 11 or 12 billion dollars a year instead of 77 billion. That, we guess, is the way to return to the "good old days," before the income tax began to hurt.
 Yet the only criticism we hear of this budget is that it is risky because it spends too little for war. When war takes 76 cents of our tax dollar that, we are told, is not enough.
 What kind of war is most of our new spending going to be for? The answer is that, once again, we are increasing our emphasis and dependence upon atomic war, which also happens to be the kind of war all men agree, in theory, must be prevented and abolished.
 This is, by this time, an unfortunate, becoming accustomed. We all profess our desire to outlaw atomic war. We all, at the same time, put more and more of our war eggs in the atomic basket.
 But here again the only criticism likely to be that we aren't putting enough eggs into a big enough basket.
 Military aspects of this budget are, then, much more eloquent than any arrangement of statistics and figures. They show us all eating up by the cost of war, past, present and future, and not really dreaming of any escape from having this go on forever. They show us all busy arming ourselves with weapons we may never be used except at the price of the survival of man himself, and not really imagining or doing anything about any way to escape from this fate.
 There is much talk about whether or not this whole budget is a "balanced" budget, about whether income will equal expenditures. But however it balances dollar-wise, within our own economy, it has to go outside itself, and into Russia, to balance the obvious inequality of its military outlook. The Russians are as insane as we are, which justifies us as we justify them, and keeps everything in balance.

Leisure Time Vs. Leisure
 V. keep reading of increased leisure time for modern man, and we keep reading how and how to use it. There is obviously a conflict between the labeled time and the reality.
 Leisure time does not become leisure if, just like work, it is operated by pace, schedule and goals. Leisure time is not leisure if it is filled with a drive to pack itself with measured accomplishments, pastimes, or even enjoyments. Leisure time is not leisure unless it can be passed as though it were all the time in the world, unless it that they are incapable of going loose when we find ourselves with workless time on our hands.
 Our ancestors, says our nostalgic imagination, never found themselves up to that tight in the first place, no matter how many hours a day or days a week they worked. They were, we are beginning to guess, leisurely in their very work itself, capable of putting it down, of walking away from it, of walking around it and enjoying it, of discussing it, or of hailing it altogether in order to discuss something else.
 We were reading such a piece of nostalgia the other day, in which the writer recalled a blacksmith shop where, he said, the smith always had time to answer the questions of small boys. When, of course, is the blacksmith shop today? But where, beyond that, is there anybody, in his own neighborhood, who has time to talk to small boys?
 Where is the man at work who has time to talk to anybody, or time to walk around his own job and take an overall look at it?
 Or where is the housewife who, when her slavery to the gadgets of a day is accomplished, can sit down and find her own mind not so busy writing and grinding as though it insisted on finding something else to do?
 No, perhaps it is the way we work, the systems we work by, which not only make the seven-hour day harder than the 10-hour day used to be, but also put some kind of curse on our labeled leisure time, so that it in turn becomes a force that, in itself, tends to force, tensely, to enjoy and amuse ourselves, until the while that calls us back to work, and we find some peaceful sound, as if work itself had become the comparatively relaxing thing.
 We shall continue, however, to live in hope, and on the lookout for somebody who seems to have time to talk to small boys. For the
